> South Vietnam is the key to the safety and independence of nations made up of 325 million free people. As the Sergeant pointed out Laos, Burma, Cambodia, Thailand, and the Philippines could all be forced into serfdom with the collapse of South Vietnam and the expulsion of the US forces.

Southeast Asia, however, leads to the real purpose of the present conflict—the Strait of Malis one of the prime shipping bottlenecks of the world. 
