Beginning next week it will become necessary for the Herald to solicit all advertising a day earlier as well as have a deadline on news by noon Tuesday.

Thanksgiving will be observed next Thursday co the paper will have to be printed on Tuesday night instead of Wednesday night.

The following week,, Dec. 1, Editor Jim Hill has to be in Fort Worth at the St. Joseph Hospital to undergo tests for surgery on Friday, Dec. 3.

Arrangements were completed Tuesday at Quanah to have the paper set there on Wednesday and Mrs. Hill will then take the pages to Amarillo to have them printed at midnight Wednes-

That is the schedule, if all goes according to plans. The paper will be printed under a new process for the weekly field in this area-Offset— and after the staff learns the ropes, it should be a much better paper, in every respect.



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
