

The Knox County Chapter of the American Red Cross has made arrangements for anyone to send a tape recording to any overseas serviceman at no charge.

Mr. Jesse Smith, Knox Co. Red Cross Chairman, announced that a tape recorder would be available in Knox City at Hoge Pharmacy and in Munday at Eiland's Drug for the free use of anyone wishing to send a personal Christmas greeting to servicemen overseas.

Of course, anyone wishing to send a tape must have the complete military address of the serviceman. Due to the short time left before the Christmas holidays, Mr. Smith urged local citizens to prepare and mail the tape recordings promptly. The only cost the individual will be required to pay is the actual mailing expense (less than 25 cents in most cas-

Tapes can be prepared by a group such as a class in school or Sunday School classes.
