## Nathan Martin is CMN Miracle Kid

All parents know the agony of having a sick child, and the helpless feeling of not being able to make it immediately better. Last Sept., with H1N1, or "swine flu," making the news daily, and everyone concerned about contracting it, five year old Nathan Martin was desperately fighting to recover from the illness.

Martin is the son of Randall and Amy Martin of Haskell. After becoming ill on Sept. 24, Nathan was diagnosed with H1N1, by his Abilene pediatrician and was treated with the normal round of Tamiflu. Despite having a history of asthma, he seemed to be recovering, with only minimum respiratory symptoms. However, by the end of the week, he began wheezing and was in great pain when he moved. His parents rushed him back to Abilene, and by the next morning he was diagnosed with bilateral pneumonia and a pleural effusion, or fluid surrounding his lungs.

Nathan was admitted to Meek Children's Hospital, a part of Hendrick Medical Center, and soon had been taken into surgery to have chest tubes inserted to help drain the fluid from around his lungs. He was in the hospital for a total of twelve days on IV antibiotics and around the clock respiratory therapy.

The Martins were very pleased with the excellent care their son received while a patient at Meek Children's Hospital, from his pediatrician to the nurses, respiratory therapists and other staff. "They just do everything possible to make the children feel as comfortable and as at home as possible," says Nathan's mom, Amy.

While it took up to six weeks for Nathan to fully recover from his ordeal, and be released for normal activities, the story doesn't end there.

About a month after being dismissed from the hospital, they received word that Nathan had been chosen by a committee to be a Miracle Kid for 2010 for the Children's Miracle Network. He appeared on the 22nd annual Children's Miracle

Network Celebration on June 4-5. The CMN Celebration, highlighted the Miracle Kids who, thanks to generous donations, were treated with the highest quality and close to home. More than 29,000 children were treated last year through Hendrick Children's Hospital and their other related services.

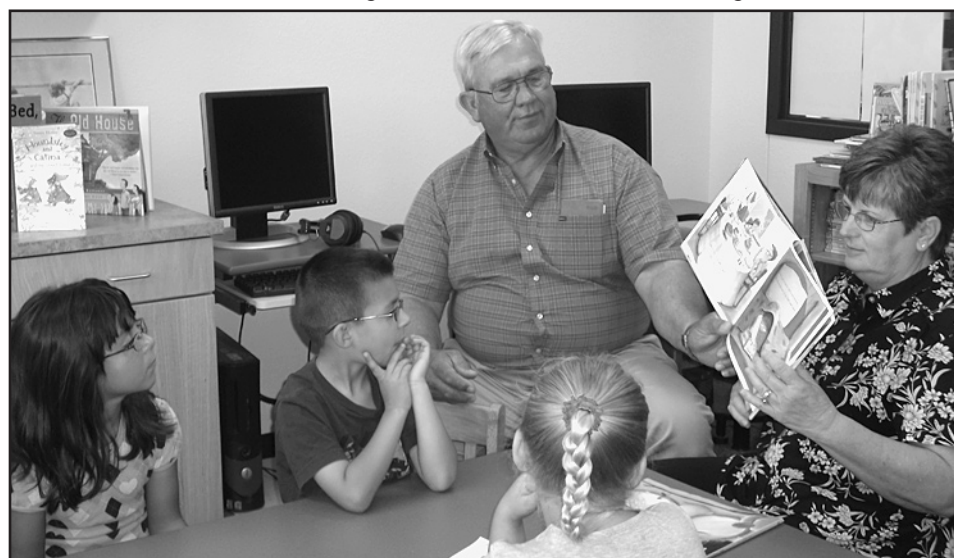
Since 1966, when the Children's Hospital was established, CMN has helped provide funds for room updates, monitors and

While this experience was very trying and scary for Nathan's parents, family and friends, they are very thankful the outcome was good, and they were honored for Nathan to have been chosen as the 2010 Miracle Kid.

Bible stories, music, crafts, movies and water activities will be held. Each activity will emphasize the importance of building Christian character in our daily lives.

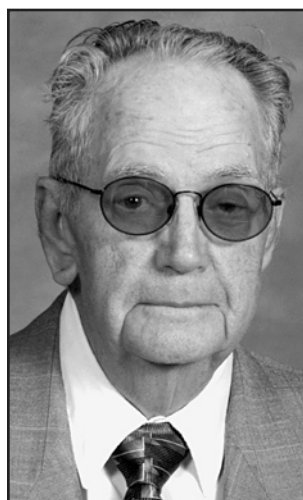
Those attending should bring a beach towel with the child's name on it and should wear clothes that can get wet.

**NOTICE TO THE PUBLIC**

Haskell Memorial Hospital District will use the following application procedure in compliance with the Indigent Health Care and Treatment Act:

- All applicants must complete an application for assistance. Supporting documentation must also be supplied upon request.
- Haskell County residency must be established.
- Income eligibility will be subject to current indigent income guidelines as noted in the CIHCP Program Handbook.
- Ineligibility for other health programs (i.e. Medicaid, Texas Rehabilitation Commission, etc.) must be presented in writing.
- Applicants will be notified of additional items needed to determine indigent status. If required, information that is not provided within fourteen (14) days, the application will be denied.
- A supplemental authorization to verify eligibility must be signed by the applicant.
- On request of an applicant, a Hospital district employee shall assist an applicant in the completion of forms. Each applicant will be informed of the availability of assistance.
- The Hospital District shall provide a process for reviewing the application and allowing applicants to appeal a denial of assistance. An appeals process shall accompany each denial. Appeals may be offered to the Governing Body of the Hospital District at the next scheduled meeting of the Board of Directors following notification of intent to appeal.
- The Hospital District shall maintain the records relating to each application for at least three (3) years after the date on which the application was submitted.

Applications may be obtained at Haskell Memorial Hospital, 1 North Avenue N, Haskell, Texas 79521.

Assistance with completing the application is available by appointment. Please call 940-864-2621 for an appointment.

#### State agencies play role in Gulf oil spill response

AUSTIN—Birds and other Texas coastal wildlife have not been affected by the Deepwater Horizon oil spill in the Gulf of Mexico, according to the Texas General Land Office.

And, if any tarballs from the spill make it to Texas shores, the Land Office will work with the U.S. Coast Guard and BP to clean them up, Land Commissioner Jerry Patterson said on June 7.

Governor Rick Perry's office, according to its June 10 news release, participates in daily conference calls about the spill with the White House, Coast Guard, Department of Homeland Security, National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration and gulf state governors.

Texas Workforce Commission on June 8 announced it had sent mobile units to sites on the Louisiana coast. The two 34-foot-long units provide job search and referral services to people whose jobs have been affected by the disaster.

The Texas Commission on Environmental Quality activated 12 Mobile Response Spill Assessment Teams to monitor air quality, collect sediment and water samples, offer advice on waste disposal and provide training in shoreline clean-up techniques.

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department has its own oil spill response team and is conducting weekly conference calls with the Texas Department of Agriculture, Texas Sea Grant College Program and commercial fisheries. No fisheries have been closed along the Texas coast due to this oil spill, the agency said.

Meanwhile, the governor's office said, Texas beaches remain open for summer recreation and business.

#### Group's site puts spotlight on I-35

The Texas Department of Transportation on Oct. 7, 2009, officially pronounced it would no longer pursue the Trans-Texas Corridor project, a plan to transform Interstate 35 into a conduit for vehicles, rail and utilities.

But, improvements are still on the drawing board for I-35, which runs from Laredo to the Oklahoma border north of Gainesville.

The web site launched June 9 by the I-35 Corridor Advisory Committee focuses on efforts to plan future improvements and on current activities, such as construction on the stretch between the central Texas communities of Salado and

Hillsboro.

#### White responds to poke by Perry

Bill White, Democratic candidate for governor, disclosed in his tax return and financial statement that he invested in a Houston-based company, BTEC Turbines LP, in 2006.

After White released his financial information, incumbent Gov. Perry said White should end his candidacy because while White was mayor of Houston, he personally profited as a result of public money spent with BTEC because of Hurricane Rita.

White rejected Perry's suggestion, pointing out the investment was made a year after hurricanes Rita and Katrina hit in fall 2005.

In White's response to Perry's accusation, he said, "Perry took no issue with my leadership in the wake of Hurricanes Katrina and Rita until this election year."

In other political news, U.S. Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison, Perry's chief opponent in the Republican primary, on June 11 publicly stated she supports Perry's re-election campaign.

On June 12 at the Republican Party of Texas convention in Dallas, delegates voted to elect Houston attorney Steve Munisteri as party chairman.

The Texas Democratic Party on June 10 filed a lawsuit to learn who funded a petition drive to put the Green Party of Texas on the Nov. 2 election ballot.

The Green Party agreed to wait to submit its list of candidates to the state for ballot certification until a court rules on the lawsuit. At its convention in San Antonio, the Green Party nominated retired teacher Deb Shafto of Houston as its candidate for governor.

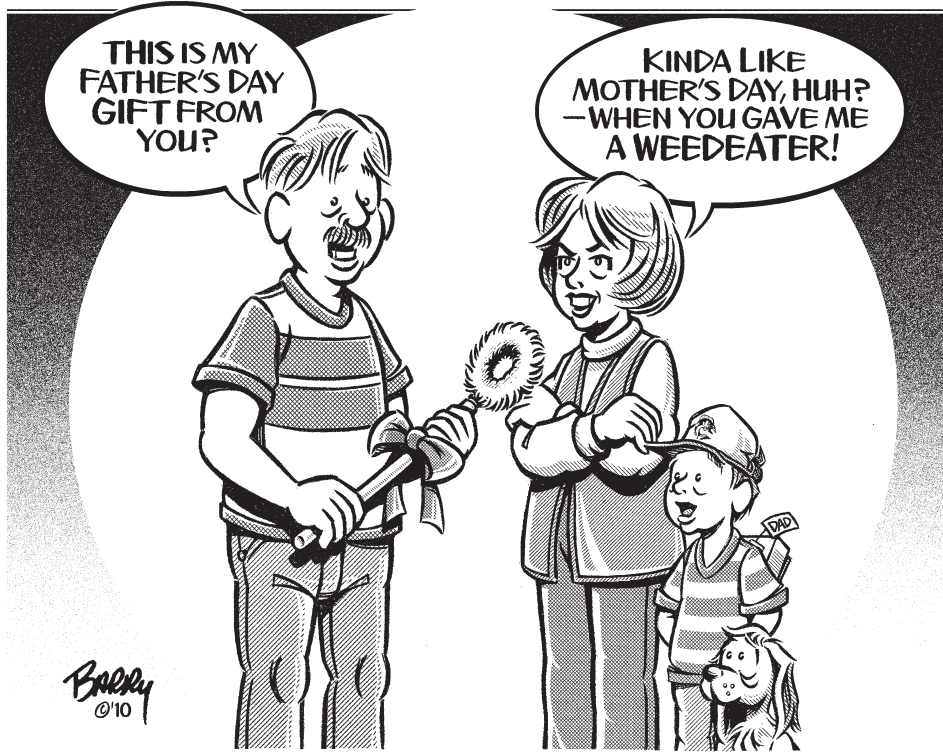
The Libertarian Party, at its convention in Austin on June 12 nominated Kathie Glass, a Houston attorney, as its candidate for governor.

Our goal at the City of Haskell is to provide you with high-quality, safe drinking water that exceed every federal and state standard. As mandated by the Safe Drinking Water Act (SDWA), this "Consumer Confidence Report" (CCR) details our water sources, the results of our water tests and other information. For quality tap water, you can count on the City of Haskell to provide its citizens with only the best.

We are glad to report that the water provided by the North Central Texas Municipal Water Authority (NCTMWA), water treatment plant meets or exceeds water quality standards.

### Overview

The City of Haskell receives its water supply from the Miller Creek Reservoir located in Baylor and Throckmorton Counties on FM 1608 approximately 10 miles southeast of Goree.

This CCR report is based on test conducted in the year 2009 by the City of Haskell. The City of Haskell collects samples each month which is 46 per year. One random sample was taken for a business and results were good. This is to ensure the safety and quality of our water. These samples are to ensure that the City of Haskell is providing a safe drinking water to our customers. We are checking for microbiological contaminant. Lead and copper tests are conducted every three years.

### Additional Health Information

To ensure that tap water is safe to drink, the EPA prescribes limits on the amount of certain contaminant in bottled water. Drinking water, including bottled water, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminant. The presence of contaminant does not necessarily indicate that hot water poses a health risk. If only comments are received on the application, the response to comments, along with notice of the executive director's action on the application, will be mailed to everyone who submitted comments or is on the mailing list for this application.

If a hearing request is timely filed, the executive director will complete the technical review, issue a preliminary decision on the application, and a Notice of the Application and Preliminary Decision will be published and mailed to those who are on the mailing list for this application. That notice will contain the final deadline for submitting public comments.

After the final deadline for public comments following any required Notice of Application and Preliminary Decision, the executive director will consider the comments and prepare a response to all relevant and material, or significant public comments. If any comments are received, the response to comments, along with the executive director's decision on the application, will then be mailed to everyone who submitted public comments or who is on a mailing list for this application.

**OPPORTUNITY FOR A CONTESTED CASE HEARING** You may request a contested case hearing. A contested case hearing is a legal proceeding similar to a civil trial in state district court. Unless a written request for a contested case hearing is filed within 15 days from this notice, the executive director may

approve the application. If no hearing request is received within this 15-day period, no further opportunity for hearing will be provided. A contested case hearing will only be granted based on disputed issues of fact that are relevant and material to the Commission's decision on the application. Further, the Commission will only grant a hearing on those issues raised during the public comment period and not withdrawn.

A person who may be affected by emissions of air contaminants from the facility is entitled to request a hearing. To request a hearing, a person must actually reside in a permanent residence within 440 yards of the proposed plant. If requesting a contested case hearing, you must submit the following: (1) your name (or for a group or association, an official representative), mailing address, daytime phone number, and fax number, if any; (2) applicant's name and Registration Number; (3) the statement "[I/we] request a contested case hearing;" (4) a specific description of how you would be adversely affected by the application and air emissions from the facility in a way not common to the general public; (5) the location and distance of your property relative to the facility; and (6) a description of how you use the property which may be impacted by the facility. If the request is made by a group or association, the one or more members who have standing to request a hearing, and the interests which the group or association seek to protect, must also be identified. Requests for

a contested case hearing must be submitted in writing within 15 days following this notice to the Office of the Chief Clerk, at the address below.

If a hearing request is timely filed, additional notice will be provided. Following the close of all applicable comment and request periods, the executive director will forward the application and any requests for contested case hearing to the Commissioners for their consideration at a scheduled Commission meeting. If a hearing is granted, the subject of a hearing will be limited to disputed issues of fact relating to relevant and material air quality concerns raised during the comment period. Issues such as property values, noise, traffic safety, and zoning are outside of the Commission's jurisdiction to address in

this proceeding.
