Dikes Are True Guard In Dutch Defense Plan

HOLLAND, one of the smallest of Europe's war threatened countries, is one of the most solidly defended. For over a hundred years steadfastly neutral in all wars, Holland has not been lured into an ostrich-with-its-head-in-the-sand attitude toward the present war.

For years she has methodically prepared for any eventuality. Every road into Germany is cut, all bridges are mined, trees are underlaid with dynamite, fields are planted with explosives. Holland is determined to be let alone, but she is so determined that she is highly intelligent. There is, however, another enemy whom Holland has a reason to fear. In the East, would not be at all anxious to own the tremendously rich Dutch East Indies. Knowing that Queen Wilhelmina and her people have been building up a navy for the express purpose of seeing to it that Japan does not get too adventurous. Jerry Allen, in his article "Dutch Victory" in January Good Housekeeping, points out that Holland has figured things out about the present war in a serious, careful way which the ultimate decision that Hitler will have little to gain by invading Holland, except another enemy. However, again being methodical, they have taken no chances. If all of their foremost barricades fail to halt

The State of Texas, Counting Instruction; Wide Choice of Rations Possible

(By A. D. Jackson, Chief, Division of Publications, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station)

Simple instructions for combining a balanced ration for steers or lambs have recently been prepared by John H. Jones, agricultural husbandman, Texas agricultural experiment station. Mr. Jones observes that the beginning feeder is too often confused by the term balanced ration.

Mr. Jones remarks that a balanced ration consisting of amounts of grain, cottonseed meal and roughage recommended by feeding authorities, may be suitable when the animals are starting on feed or may be suitable only if they are on full feed and any one ration cannot be suitable for steers or lambs for the entire feeding period.

For Texas conditions this means that weaned calves should get about two pounds of cottonseed meal daily; yearlings three to three and one-half pounds, and aged steers three and one-half to five pounds, while lambs should receive from one-third to two-fifths pounds per day.

Cottonseed Meal After Roughage The practical procedure is to top the animals and give them a fill of roughage while they are getting used to being confined, then in a very few days after the animals are filled up on roughage the full allowance of cottonseed meal can be fed.

Only a very small amount of grain should be fed at first. For lambs a twentieth of a pound per head is sufficient; for a calf, one-half pound should be fed and for a steer begin with one pound of grain per day.

Red Cross Officers Helsinki, As War Relief Needs Grow Urgent

Washington — Expenditures by the American Red Cross for European war relief reached a total of more than \$500,000 in 1939, announced by organization officials as plans were completed to meet any contingencies that may arise over the Finish-Soviet conflict.

Wayne Chatfield-Taylor, former assistant Secretary of the Treasury and a member of the three-man delegation surveying relief needs in Europe for the American Red Cross, has set up headquarters in Helsinki to set up relief for the organization, Red Cross officials stated. He flew to the Finnish capital from Geneva.

Meanwhile other members of the delegation took posts in capitals of belligerent nations to report relief needs back to this country. Ernest J. Swift, Red Cross vice chairman in charge of foreign operations, was in London handling needs of the British and French Red Cross societies, while James T. Nicholson, another Red Cross official, stationed in Geneva had visited Berlin to arrange relief in German occupied Poland.

In his first official summary of relief operations, Chairman Norman H. Davis noted that the greatest need in the present theater of war was among civilian victims, particularly in Poland and Finland. He cited requests from the French, British, Polish and Finnish Red Cross for assistance; the German Red Cross declined aid, but later cabled for medicines and hospital equipment for sick and wounded Polish people.

In response to these requests donations of cash, medicines and hospital supplies were made, and many large city chapters have been engaged for three months in making surgical dressings for France and England from 900,000 yards of gauze purchased for that purpose, Mr. Davis said, adding that these surgical dressings are now going forward on every ship on which cargo space can be obtained.

By January 1, it was explained more than 200,000 sweaters and dresses and hospital garments will be ready through production in Red Cross Chapters by volunteers. Bedding, blankets, shoes and underwear have been sent for Polish refugees, Mr. Davis said.

Mr. Davis stated that large quantities of medicines had been bought in London by the American Red Cross and sent to the Finnish Red Cross, and 50,000 surgical dressings were going forward; also that he had notified the 3,700 chapters of the organization to accept contributions for relief of the people of Finland.

"I feel sure that the American people will want to do everything possible to alleviate the suffering among the war wounded and the civilians who have been forced by the threat of air bombings and marching armies to evacuate their homes in cities and villages," the Chairman stated. The chairman said that contributions to the Red Cross have totaled \$275,843 of which all but \$15,000 has been designated for use of the Polish war victims. The Central Committee of the Red Cross made available \$1,000,000 additional of which \$250,000 has
