Haskell Will Send Large Delegation to WTCC Convention

ALL-DAY SESSION IS EXPECTED TO ATTRACT NUMBER OF VISITORS

MOTORCADE PLANNED TO CARRY MUNICIPAL BAND AND DELEGATES

Local C of C Officials Plan Active Participation In Annual Affair

Local Chamber of Commerce officials this week set in motion plans which they believe will assure full participation of a large delegation from this city in the coming annual convention of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, to be held in Abilene May 15 to 17th. Advance interest in the regional meet indicates that Haskell will send the largest delegation to Abilene that has ever attended a similar event, according to Ralph Duncan, secretary of the local organization.

Plans have already been made for Haskell's entry into all divisions of the annual convention, with a strong representation also in all business sessions. Announcement was made early in the week of the selection of Miss Frances Kaigler as this city's sponsor in the "Miss West Texas" revue, and of Paul Crawford as Haskell's entry in the "My Home Town" speaking contest. Assurance was given on Thursday that this city would enter at least five cars in the "Conservation Parade" in connection with Haskell county's entry in the WTCC Soil and Water Utilization contest.

PIONEER WOMAN OF COUNTY DIES AT HOME OF SON

Mrs. W. L. Mathis Buried In Willow Cemetery Here Saturday Afternoon

Mrs. W. L. Mathis, one of Haskell county's oldest residents in point of age and a pioneer citizen from present-day viewpoint, having lived in this section for almost half a century, passed away Friday April 28 at the home of her son L. H. Mathis in the Jud community. Mrs. Mathis had been ill for several months.

Funeral service for Mrs. Mathis was held at the Baptist Church in Rule Saturday afternoon at 2 o'clock, conducted by Otta Johnson, pastor of the Rule Church of Christ, who was assisted by Rev. J. W. Partin of Rule. Mrs. Mathis had been a member of the Church of Christ for a number of years. Burial was in Willow Cemetery in Haskell, with arrangements in charge of the Gauntt Funeral Home of Rule.

Born April 4, 1848, deceased was married to W. L. Mathis in 1872, who preceded her in death several years ago. Mr. and Mrs. Mathis came to Haskell county in 1892, and were identified with the early development of this section. Following the death of her husband, Mrs. Mathis had made her home with her children near Rule.

Amerada's Deep Oil Test Near Contract Depth

Contractors on the Amerada petroleum corporation's No. 1 Chas. Kleiner wildcat, neared the original contract depth of 5,000 feet this week without reporting any favorable show for production. Drilling had progressed Thursday to the 4,700 foot level, and continued ahead in shale and lime, with light sand slingers in the lower horizon. A light showing of gas was reported, encountered around 4,200 feet but was mudded off to continue drilling. The deep rotary test is located six miles east of Haskell, on the ranch holdings of Chas. Kleiner, Cisco oil operator and rancher.
