Los Amigos Teach Mexican Children to Speak English

The Haskell High School Spanish Club, Los Amigos, has been studying Latin-American history and Inter-American relations in their club programs this year.

Los Amigos are now trying to put the "good neighbor policy" into actual practice in helping the North Ward teachers teach some fifteen Mexican children to speak English. When the Mexican children entered school at mid-term about half of them had not been to school before and could not speak or understand English.

During the first week, Miss Riley, the Spanish teacher, talked to all the children in Spanish and taught them some English words. After the first week under the direction of Senorita Riley, the Mexican children were divided into groups. By this means each Mexican child has a chance to get more actual practice in speaking English, and incidentally the girls in the Spanish Class are increasing their Spanish vocabulary by talking to the Mexican children.

This is an interesting project for the Spanish Club and an interesting experiment for their teacher. Miss Riley has worked in the Spanish church at Albuquerque, New Mexico, three summers with Spanish young people of high school and college age, but this is her first experience in teaching small Mexican children to speak English.

Do You Need 400 Pounds of Cottonseed Meal?

About 400 pounds of cottonseed meal, or cake, plus about 240 pounds of cottonseed hulls, are produced from the seed from a 500-pound bale of lint cotton.

Although few people realize it, cotton produces more pounds of feed per acre than pounds of lint. Because not enough cotton was produced in 1942, many livestock producers have not had as much cottonseed meal and hulls as they needed.
