He has been very active in youth work in the district and each year has taught in the youth assembly at McMurry College in Abilene. At present he is a director of young adult work for the conference.

Mrs. Grooms received her A. B. and M. A. degrees from Oklahoma University and was a history professor in Bethel college when they married. She is a conference director of youth work in the woman's society.

Both Mr. and Mrs. Grooms have said they were well pleased with Haskell and were enthusiastic over working and living in Haskell.

Terracing Program Is Planned

Farmers needing terraces built should contact the AAA office immediately as they have made arrangements for four terracing machines for county work.

Two of the machines have already arrived and two others are due to arrive in a few days. In addition to these machines there are others owned by county men who are employed to do the work, Bob Crocker, AAA secretary, said.

Crocker said that terracing payments would equal, in most instances, the cost of doing the terracing. Payments amount to \$1.50 per hundred feet. Cost in the county ranged from \$1.25 to \$1.50 per hundred feet, Crocker said.

A meeting was held Wednesday night in the Sagerton schoolhouse to make plans for more terraces in the community. Crocker said there had been more terraces built in that community than in any other part of the county.

C. Couch, drive chairman, following a meeting at the chamber of commerce office. Couch said all committeemen were enthusiastic about completion of the drive in the shortest time possible.

Following the meeting committeemen promised the quickest cooperation in selling the bond quota assigned the county, which is lower than in previous drives. However, wet and muddy roads the first part of the week hampered efforts.

At noon Thursday, bond sales amounting to approximately \$75,000 had been reported, the county chairman said. By the close of the week, committeemen are expected to be able to report active progress toward meeting the quota, Couch said.

Notice To Farmers Desiring Terrace Lines

In the past the County Agent has personally run terrace lines for the farmers of Haskell County who desired to have terracing done and who were not eligible to get this service from the Soil and Water Conservation engineers. But due to the increased demand for lines and the increase in the amount of terracing machinery in the County and more machines due to come into the county in the near future, this work has grown to such an extent that it is not possible for the County Agent to do the work without help and in as much as there is no other person available to do the work without a charge being made therefor and since it would not be fair to charge one and not all, in the future the County Agent will supervise the work and consult with the various engineers who run the terrace lines but will run no lines himself in the future until conditions change to such an extent that extra help is not needed, then the old system of the County Agent running the lines may be resumed.

Full Parity Price To Be Paid By CCC For Cotton

Full parity price to farmers for their 1944 crop of upland cotton is assured under the new Commodity Credit Corporation purchase program regardless of whether or not it is under a government loan, Robert Crocker, AAA secretary, said Monday.

The CCC will purchase all upland cotton for which a loan rate schedule has been announced, offered to it up to June 30, 1945. The cotton will be purchased at the following prices: (1944 crop) Middling 15-16 inch, basis gross weight flat cotton at Memphis, Tenn.: October, 21.90 cents per pound; November, 21.95; December, 22.00; January 22.05; February, 22.10; March, 22.15; April, 22.20; May, 22.25; and June, 22.25.

The five-point increase per month has been added to the price as allowance to the farmer for storage and carrying charges. Premiums and discounts are the same as those of 1944 loan program, based on Middling 15-16 purchase rates, gross weight.

Purchasing agents, mostly local banks and warehousemen, will be approved by CCC.

Purchasing agents will buy at CCC prices if warehouse receipts and sales agreement are turned over to them within 10 days after issuance. Agent's fee of 50 cents per bale will be paid by CCC.

Purchases will be made only from farmers who produced cotton in 1944. Cotton must be stored in CCC-approved warehouses. Farmers with cotton in loan may sell it to CCC by repaying their loan.



3,621 Quarts Food Canned by 21 Families

Reports tabulated from only 21 families out of approximately 300 who are to report, indicate that Haskell County farm folks have preserved an enormous amount of food this year.
 The 21 families whose reports have been received have canned 3,621 quarts of foods, have preserved and frozen 5,330 pounds of meat and in addition have frozen some fruit and canned other items. Two farm women of the county have put up 15 gallons of lard each.
 Canning reported by the 21 families include 1,231 quarts of fruit, 1,525 quarts of vegetables, 468 quarts of meat and 320 other quarts of fruit juices have been canned by ten of the families.
 Three families have also put up 49 quarts of fruit pickles and 39 quarts of vegetable pickles.
 Reports from 12 families include 2,830 pounds of cured meats, with one woman, Mrs. Tolliver, reporting 1,000 pounds of cured meats in storage at their farm. Five families placed 1,500 pounds of meat in cold storage lockers and one family also has 20 pounds of fruit in cold storage.
 Miss Newman, county agent, urged all the farm families who have not reported to do so at once as she has to include their reports in her annual report and she must have these reports in by December 1.
 Mrs. S. G. Perrin and Mrs. Ted Jettison each reported that they had rendered 15 gallons of lard for family use.

F.S.A. Offers Farmers Loans For Water Tanks

The Federal Government has made funds available through the Department of Agriculture for the past several years to help Western farmers and ranchers make better use of the water resources they have.
 The Farm Security Administration administers this program. Loans are made, and engineering and other technical services are offered to farmers and ranchers to help them repair and construct various kinds of water facilities. The program is designed for agriculture, and it includes only those types of water facilities which make it possible for farmers and ranchers to store or utilize water for livestock, farm gardens, crop and hay lands, ranges and pastures, or other lands used for agricultural purposes.
 The Government offers farmers and ranchers assistance in building, installing, repairing and keeping in use the following kinds of facilities: Farm distribution systems; farmstead water; ponds; reservoirs; wells; pump installations, including windmills; spring developments; stock water tanks, etc.

Prisoners of Germany Can Be Sent Packages Now

Common Cold Causes Many Work-Hour Losses
 Austin, Tex. — "The common cold is responsible for more lost working hours, with resulting loss in income and production, than any other illness prevalent in the United States," asserts Dr. George W. Cox, State Health Officer, in a statement just released. He stated that the number of victims remains, from year to year, practically the same.
 "One of the more common predisposing causes of a cold is the overheated living room, or office, in which much time is spent, especially when insufficient outdoor exercise is taken and when insufficient ventilation is provided," Dr. Cox said. "Such a living environment, when coupled with careless eating habits and too late hours, tends to lower resistance and invites the appearance of debilitating colds.
 The best thing to take when you are run down is the license number.

J. M. Diggs, postmaster, says that mail may now be sent to United States men who are now prisoners of war of Germany regardless of whether the permanent camp address is known or not.
 Under the new plan the post-office will accept mail for a prisoner of war immediately after official information is received that he has been captured by Germany.
 The correct address form for those prisoners not yet having permanent locations is as follows: name and rank, United States prisoner of war in Germany, care International Red Cross directory service, Geneva, Switzerland.

Texas Oil

A vigorous campaign to defeat ratification by the United States Senate of an Anglo-American petroleum treaty has been launched by a group of independent oil operators and their opposition has been endorsed by all three regional chambers of commerce of Texas.

The treaty, which would place American petroleum industry in an international oil cartel, is now pending before the Senate Foreign Relations Committee.

There are two great dangers lurking in the ratification of the treaty, according to the state

committee. The first danger is that the American oil industry will be made part and parcel of an international oil cartel. The second danger is that control of the industry may be taken over by the Federal government, taking it out of the hands of those who have developed it and the states who now regulate and control the industry, according to the organizations who are fighting to defeat ratification of the treaty.

Haskell's quota in the sixth War Loan drive has been the lowest quota in the drives that have been conducted—and Haskell county should be able to buy more bonds than the quota calls for in a very short period of time.

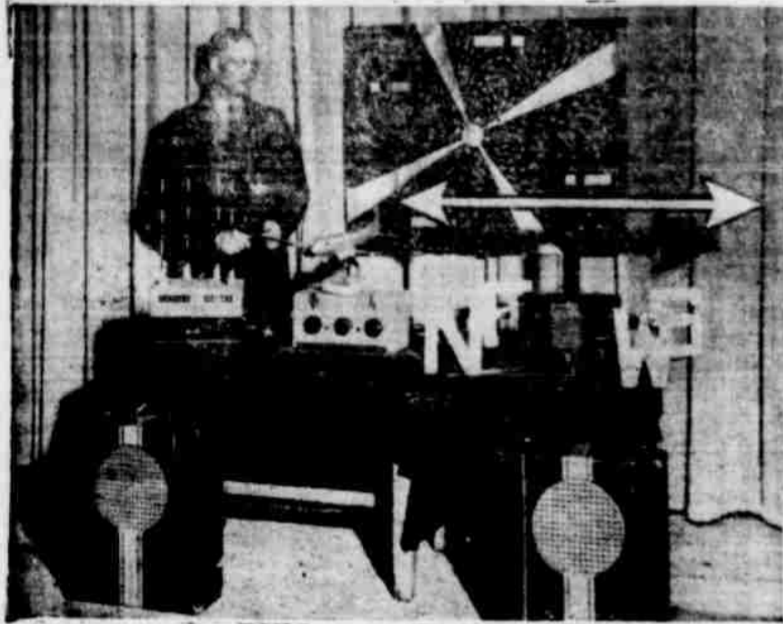

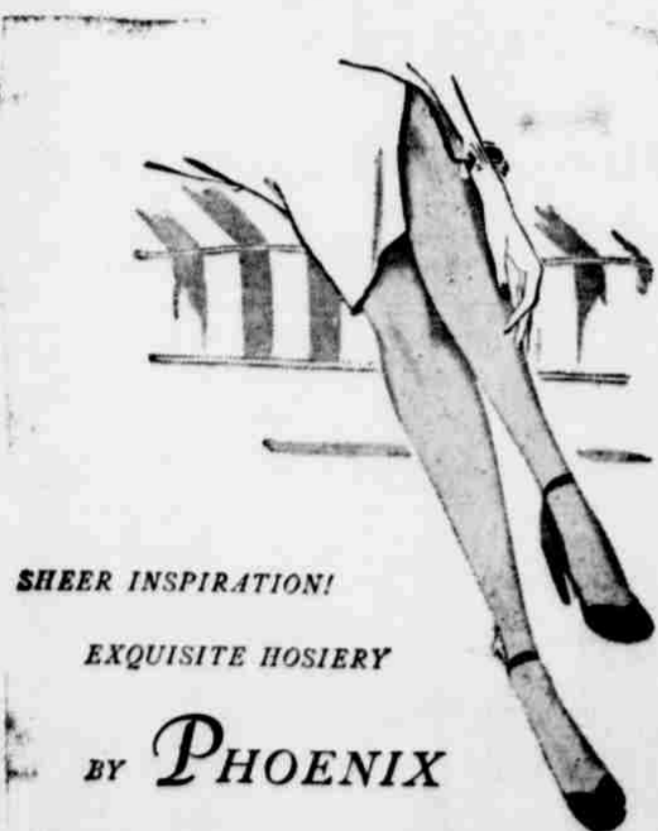
