### Pfc. Paul Overby Awarded Silver Star

Private First Class Paul Overby of Company B, 58th Armored Infantry Battalion, recently was awarded the Silver Star Medal for gallantry in action against the enemy in Germany on March 30, 1945.

Pfc. Overby arrived home Sunday on a 30-day furlough to visit his wife and daughter, who are making their home in Stamford, and his parents, Mr. and Mrs. R. D. Overby. He was returned from the European theater of war to a hospital in California for treatment of a wound in his arm.

Pfc. Overby's platoon was held up by enemy riflemen, who, from their entrenched positions, controlled a large area. Upon receiving an order to disperse to this enemy, Pfc. Overby exposed himself and opened fire with his BAR (automatic rifle). Although wounded in the arm, and suffering intense pain from an activated smoke grenade attached to his person, he continued to fire until the enemy had been wiped out.

Pfc. Overby has the Purple Heart in addition to the Silver Star Medal.

### Haskell Woman Faces Charges At Odessa

### S-Sgt. Glydol Lewis Awarded Silver Star Medal

With the 90th Infantry Division in Germany—Staff Sergeant Glydol V. Lewis of O'Brien, Texas, has been awarded the Silver Star Medal for gallantry in action against the enemy.

During an attack, Sgt. Lewis' rifle company was pinned down by cross fire from two Nazi machine guns and then subjected to an intense barrage of artillery and mortar fire. Without hesitation, Sgt. Lewis, at the risk of his life, accompanied two companions in a frontal bayonet charge in the face of the direct machine gun fire, killing two of the enemy crew and routing the third. With this threat eliminated, Sgt. Lewis' platoon was able to advance to their objective, materially aiding the entire company in resuming its movement. His bravery was a contributing factor in the success of the company's mission and was in accordance with high military tradition.

### WAR BOND BULL TO BE GIVEN AWAY JULY 10

Haskell county's "War Bond Bull" a registered Hereford donated by Brown & Davis Ranch to be given some War Bond purchaser when the county's quota in the Seventh War Loan was reached, will be given away in this city Tuesday evening at 8 o'clock, county war finance chairman R. C. Couch has announced.

Numbered tickets were given with each \$25 in War Bonds purchased during the drive, and the bull will be given away in the following manner: Ticket stub must be present to match the ticket drawn to prove ownership. If the stub is not present another ticket will be drawn and so on until the bull is given away.

Five to ten minutes will be given between drawings. When the bull is given away the crowd is asked to remain because the party drawing him may want to sell him at once and if so the auction will be held while the crowd is gathered.

Dennis P. Ratliff will be master of ceremonies and T. R. Odell will introduce the donors of the registered animal. N. L. B. Davis and R. A. Brown of Throckmorton. Judges of the drawing will be Fritz Stegemoller of Sagerton, Jack Mills of Rule, Felix Mullino of Rochester, Bunyan Cooner or Sam Reed of O'Brien, Earnest Griffith of Weigert and J. M. Crawford of Haskell.

Keeping intact Haskell county's record in meeting every goal in War Bond subscriptions during World War II, the county's quota in the Seventh War Loan has been met and oversubscribed, County War Finance Chairman R. C. Couch announced Monday after he had received and tabulated reports of Bond sales throughout the county for the preceding week.

First community in the county to meet its quota was Weinert, the county chairman said, with O'Brien a close second. Both communities had the same quota and residents of the two small towns evidenced spirited interest in meeting the War Loan goals assigned their sections, Couch declared.

An added incentive for War Bond buyers was the fact that the Brown & Davis ranch had donated a registered Hereford bull to be given some Bond buyer of Haskell county when the county's quota was raised, and Mr. Couch expressed his thanks to Messrs. Brown and Davis for their contribution to the drive. "We want them to be our special guests when the registered animal is given away at the drawing," Mr. Couch said. Date for the drawing will be announced next week, the war finance chairman said.

Believing that Haskell county people will be interested in knowing the outside assistance given during the Seventh War Loan, Mr. Couch listed the following Bond purchasers by non-resident companies and individuals:

The largest single purchaser was the Shell Pipe Line Corporation of Houston in the amount of \$12,000. They bought bonds in each of 105 counties or parishes where they had either property or representation. They have approximately 1350 employees, who, since the beginning of the war have bought more than \$1,750,000 worth of Bonds through the payroll allotment plan and through direct purchases, and in addition to this have made other purchases through the organized bond drives. ### Canning Sugar Cut To 5 Pounds Per Person

The allowance of canning sugar has been cut to 5 pounds per person, and even under that meager allowance there will not be enough sugar available for every person in the county to receive that quantity during the month of July, the War Price and Rationing Board announced this week.

Haskell county has been allowed a quota of 10,000 pounds of sugar for the month of July, and already more than 1,000 applications have been filed with the Rationing Board, it was pointed out. Applications made by the average family include the allotment for four persons, so it can readily be seen that the July quota will be far short of requirements.

Procedure to be followed by the Rationing Board under these circumstances will be to issue allotments in the order the applications are received, and no person will be allowed more than 5 pounds of canning sugar.

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Sidelights From Washington

The President last week, prior to leaving for the Pacific coast by plane, made a recommendation to Congress that the law be changed so as to provide that in the event of his death or inability to act, the Speaker of the House should succeed him as President.

The President's recommendation was apparently prompted by the fact that in the near future he plans to make many trips by plane, somewhat hazardous in nature, including a flight over the Atlantic to the Big Three Conference.

The presidential plane is a four engine C-54. We have many of them in the Air Transport Command. In fact, every thirteen minutes of the day, a C-54 takes off on a hop across the Atlantic.

The ATC planes fly on schedule

in fair weather or foul, but the presidential plane would only fly in good weather, thus, fortunately, reducing the hazards to the very lowest minimum.

The C-54's of the Air Transport Command will have a big part in flying home from Europe 50,000 soldiers per month. Loved ones of these men can be thankful that the trips will not only be speedy but also relatively safe.

Bringing 50,000 men home by plane from Europe per month will require a half million barrels of gasoline. The big planes require an average of one gallon per mile.

Our men who return home by boat will cross the Atlantic in five days if they are luck enough to be aboard the Queen Mary or the Queen Elizabeth. But the Victory Cargo ships which are being converted into troop carriers will make only fifteen knots and will require fourteen days.

The shifting of the war in Europe to the all-out effort in the Pacific will not only tax to the limit our transcontinental railroads, but will also gibe the Panama Canal its biggest war job. I had a talk not long ago with Gen. Joseph Mchaffey, Governor of the Canal Zone, and he said he was ready for the task.

Writes of Arrival At Island Base In Pacific

Mr. and Mrs. B. M. Whiteker of this city have received a letter from their son, B. M. (Bill) Whiteker, Jr., who is stationed in the Pacific theater of war, telling them of his arrival at a new base. They had received several letters written while he was en route, but this was the first he had written since reaching his destination on June 7th. Bill wrote, in part:

"We are finally ashore, after 43 days on the ship. This is a swell place, in my opinion. It is really cool and I slept under two blankets last night. Today is just like a fall day.

"Everything is going to be fine here until it rains. We are sleeping in pup tents right now, and I can see where the mud has been three feet deep here before.

"The war seems to be going along fine—it sounds just like the one did in France the latter part of June last year. We can see it at night, but other than that it is very peaceful here. Some of the men started to work this morning and the rest of us will probably begin in the morning. It looks as if we will be unloading ships for the next month or so.

"Have not heard from Clarence, though he is not on this island, according to the Army report. However, they may be here soon. We had some rough weather on the way over, as Clarence says they had. And as for ships, I believe that I saw most of the ships in the Pacific, at one time or another. Probably saw the very one he was on if I had only known it."

Bill is an Electrician's Mate, First Class, with the 28th U. S. Naval Construction Battalion and is at present assigned to a Landing Supply Unit. Reference in the letter was made to Sgt. Clarence W. Whiteker, a brother who is in the Pacific with a bomber squadron but not yet located.
