

cause more than 500,000 disabling injuries and 6,000 deaths each year. According to the Texas A&M University System specialist,

the "education or knowledge" factor of developing a safety system is of utmost importance as it is based on locating accident hazards and then correcting them.

Almost two-thirds of the injuries of farm and ranch families are work-related. About 20 percent occur in barns and other structures around the home, 15 percent in home yards, 14 percent in both barn yards and fields, 10 percent in homes and 8 percent on public roads.

Farm machinery is involved in 20 percent of all injuries, with tractors having a hand in one-fourth of these accidents. Power and hand tools and motor vehicles each cause 12 per-
