400 Changes Made in Draft Classes

Haskell draft board has reclassified 297 men in the past few days and around 400 more are to be reclassified. Action of the board includes 16 inducted, 219 placed in 4-A (men over 38), 37 put in 1-A and 25 others reclassified. Board clerks estimated that the other 400 reclassifications would be completed in the next few days.

One Indictment Returned By Grand Jury

One bill charging a Haskell negro man with assault with intent to murder was returned by the Grand Jury late Thursday after a two-day session.

Charged in the indictment was Looney Foster and bond in the sum of \$2,000 was set. The case is the outgrowth of a beating which officers say Looney administered to his wife, who had to be rescued by officers who were forced to break down a door in the Looney home to affect the rescue. Looney was charged in a complaint prior to the grand jury's meeting and had been released on \$750 bond.

The term of court was adjourned Saturday and Monday Judge Ben Charlie Chapman, District Attorney Fred Stockdale and Court Reporter Sam Conner went to Aspermont for a term of district court there.

November 30 Is Turkey Day For Haskell

With two possible Thanksgiving dates to choose from Haskell merchants have elected to close for the traditional Thanksgiving, November 30.

The chamber of commerce conducted a survey of 75 merchants last week to determine the favored closing date for Thanksgiving, found the businessmen overwhelmingly in favor of the later Thanksgiving.

All firms contacted by Miss Verna Lee Matthews, secretary, agreed to close for the day.

Deadline On Canning Sugar Set

Deadline for the issuance of canning sugar has been set for November 23 by the OPA and persons who will need canning sugar are asked by the local ration board to apply not later than November 20.

The Haskell County board members said those who have already received 20 pounds will not be eligible for any more sugar, and that sugar coupons and sugar stamps 40 in ration book four remains valid until February 28, 1945.

One Amendment Carries With Small Majority

Haskell county voters turned out Tuesday to register an unprecedented total of ballots in a national election in expressing their choice for presidential electors and other party candidates. More than 3,100 votes were polled in the twenty-one voting boxes of the county, according to unofficial tabulations made early Wednesday morning.

From this total, Democratic electors and nominees were given approximately a 5-to-1 lead over their opposition—the Republicans and the Texas Regulars. Based

on unofficial returns, the total vote was divided as follows: Democrats 2592; Republicans 255; Texas Regulars 257. No voters were listed in the unofficial returns for electors for the Socialists, Prohibitionists, and American First parties.

A total of 77 absentee ballots were cast in the election, according to Mrs. Hettie Williams, county clerk. Of this number 36 were of soldiers, 41 of the number.

Of the soldier ballots 26 were the Federal ballots distributed by the army and navy and 10 were war ballots from the office.

son was given a total vote of 2599 against 132 credited to Republican nominee Peasley.

On the constitutional amendments, Haskell county voters polled 394 votes for the Municipal Pension Plan and 402 against; and for the State Pension Plan voted 375 for and 363 against. For County Tax Reallocation a majority of voters favored the proposition, casting 21 ballots for and 279 against the proposed amendment.

Post Office Receipts Show Gain

Continuing a trend evident for the last two years Haskell postal receipts registered a big gain this month over the same month of last year and over the preceding month, according to Postmaster J. M. Diggs.

Receipts for October were \$2,500 as compared with \$1,450 for October of a year ago. October money orders totaled \$17,891.31 last month. Diggs said that every month for the past two years postal receipts had shown increases.

He also urged people to mail Christmas packages now to the boys in service in the United States. Diggs said it was his opinion "that no chamber of commerce had ever done a better service than the Haskell organization in wrapping Christmas packages to be mailed overseas." He added, "Ninety percent of the packages wrapped by others than the chamber of commerce were improperly wrapped, addressed or etc., whereas we had no trouble at all with the ones fixed by the chamber of commerce."

40 by 50 Brick Building Is Started

Construction was started this week on a brick and tile addition to the Haskell Implement Company, adjoining their present building on the west. The addition is 40 by 50 feet and will add 2,000 square feet of floor space to the implement company, Bill Richey, owner, said.

Concrete foundations have been completed. When the addition is completed the west wall of the present building will be removed and the company's parts department will be housed in the new addition. Richey said he expected the addition to be ready for occupancy by January 1. The company has been in its present location for five years.

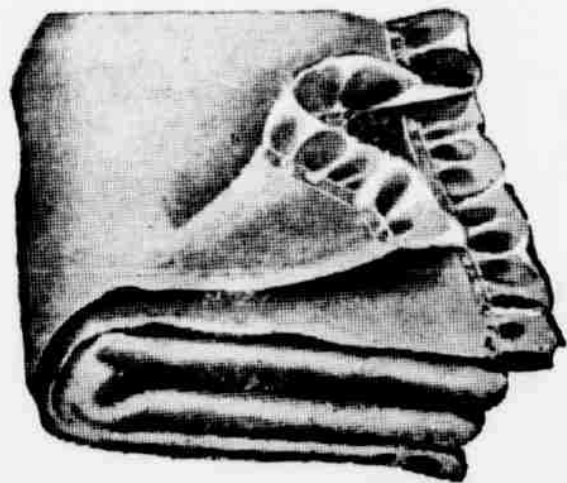
