OTHER OF HASKELL MAN KILLED HITCHHIKER NEAR MIDLAND

Treadwell, Big Lake oil worker and brother of Earl Treadwell, was shot to death Tuesday night, February 13, near Midland, Texas. The 42-year-old man was hitchhiking and was giving a ride to a woman from Big Lake to near Midland.

Mr. Treadwell was shot on a highway about 14 miles east of Midland. He was shot six times with a .38-caliber revolver. Identification was made by laundry marks on his hat and Mr. and Mrs. Earl Treadwell of Midland. The body was taken to the Haskell County Jail for identification.

Surviving the young soldier are his widow and their three children, Freddie Gene, Jessie Boyce and Wanda Marie, all of Haskell; mother, Mrs. Mamie Alley, Haskell; father, Amos Alley of Dallas; three sisters, Mrs. J. T. Raynes, Dallas; Mrs. A. A. Dotson, Weirton; Mrs. Garland Wood, Haskell and a brother, Pvt. Jessie Lee Alley, who is at Beaumont Hospital, El Paso.

Funeral service for Pvt. Alley was held at the First Baptist Church Wednesday afternoon at 3 o'clock, with Rev. Aubrey Short of Fort Worth and Rev. H. R. Whaley of this city officiating. During the service a quartet composed of W. B. Guess, H. H. McDonald, Hallie Chapman and Miss Vernie Lee Matthews sang special songs, with Elbert Fagan as pianist.

Interment was in Willow Cemetery with Holden funeral home in charge of arrangements. Pallbearers were Pete Raynes, Ft. Worth; Marble Martin, Rochester; M. L. Raynes Jr., Steve H. Sloan, Otis M. Matthews, Thea Free.

Plans For County-Wide Drive Outlined At Meeting Here

To Head Drive

With a minimum goal of \$11,000 to be raised in Haskell county, the 1945 War Fund Campaign will be launched throughout the nation March 1.

George Neely, chairman of the Haskell County Chapter of the Red Cross, has announced the appointment of Fred Stockdale, local attorney, as chairman of the 1945 War Fund campaign, and at a county-wide meeting of representatives from all towns and communities in the county, held in the district courtroom Thursday morning, plans to meet the county goal were outlined and community leaders from each town and area drafted final organization plans to put Haskell county "over the top" with its goal during the first few days of the campaign.

Haskell county has met and exceeded every quota in past War Fund campaigns, and campaign leaders and volunteer workers Thursday expressed confidence that the 1945 goal would be quickly raised.

It was pointed out at the meeting that the task in the next 12 months will be greater for Red Cross than ever before, for not only must it serve the men in the war zones, where mounting casualty lists are being recorded daily, but the organization will also be called upon more heavily in humanitarian activities on the home front.

Last-minute details in setting up the county-wide organization for the campaign will be completed this week, in order that the drive can get off to a full start on March 1.

Rain Tuesday Brings Inch Of Moisture

Hard showers which began falling Tuesday afternoon and continued at intervals throughout the night brought an inch of additional moisture to ready soaked fields and ranges, bringing total precipitation for the year to 2.51 inches, while the total for the fall and winter period since Oct. 1, 1944 to date is 11.97 inches—one of the wettest winter seasons on record.

As an aftermath to Tuesday night's rainfall, the weatherman gave this section a bewildering variety of weather. A heavy fog blanketed this immediate area Wednesday morning, followed by clear skies and sunshine until noon when overcast skies brought a trace of rain which turned to a flurry of snow which fell for a brief period.

CHAINS ENCOURAGE PRODUCER EFFICIENCY

Chain store critics occasionally claim that the buying methods of the chains end to force down prices paid producers, especially in the food field. It is hard to reconcile this claim with the report in a leading chain store publication to the effect that food chains want farmers to organize producer cooperatives. The chains, it added, believe in commissions, better facilities for icing and cooling, better packaging, and a medium for carrying "educational programs to growers in the ever advancing field of conditioning and handling of vegetables for market."

The producer co-op does all of these things. It also gives the farmer an effective bargaining agent for the sale of his produce, which assures him a fair price. If the chains generally were not in the habit of paying fair prices to producers, they could hardly be expected to encourage the producer co-op.

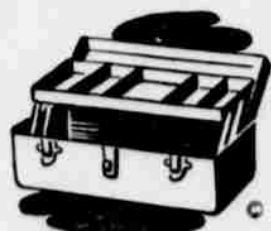
