

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

The long-time exponent of clean environment said the State Department of Health would, on request, send a team of sanitation experts to survey any Texas town for health hazards.
"An untrained person might

fail to see the significance of horse lots, surface toilets, or stagnant water holes where flies and mosquitoes can breed, Our people, by training and experience, know how to locate and correct hazards to community health," the health officer said.

The survey would include a check on the manner of garbage storage, collection, and disposal, and a look into foodhandling establishments to see if their foods are coming from safe sources.

The team, according to the doctor's plan, would make a survey of the local water supply.

Contaminated? If so, what's the reason and how can it be corrected most efficiently?

They would investigate the sewerage system. Do lines extend into all areas of the city? Are all residences connected? Is the plant itself adequate to accomodate the city? How is the sewage





Establishment of National Guard Unit Being Studied As Possibility Here

Service to the community as well as the nation, a payroll of approximately \$35,000 per year, and opportunity f o record to the service of the young Haskell men to obtain military training at home.

Those are the major contribu-tions a National Guard unit will make to the City of Haskell and its surrounding area if plans now underway are fulfilled.

Col. Vaiden Hines and Lt. Col. Jack K. Walker, both of the Abilene National Guard unit, the 131st Field Artillery, were in Haskell last week end in the interest of establishing a unit in

this city.

The Abilene officers conferred with Mayer Courtney Hunt, the Chamber of Commerce officials and members of the American Legion and VFW posts, all of whom endorsed the approval. An information kit is available at the Chamber of Commerce office for all interested persons.

Efforts to secure a National Guard field artillery firing battery-composed of eight officers warrant officer and 96 enlisted men-depend on three

1. Haskell's ability to get sufficient officers and young men interested in enlisting in the organization. Persons who join the Guard before they are 181/2 years of age are deferred from education or their civic employment while taking their military training at home.

2. Adequate facilities training the unit. An armory must be provided for storing a large amount of equipment: 105 millimeter howitzers (artillery weapons with approximately a four inch wide muzzle), jeeps trucks, radios, telephones, switch boards, surveying equipment and a large number of tools, clothing and other supplies. The armory also must provide class-room space, particularly for use

during winter months.

3. Approval by the State Adjutant General. This has already been indicated if the first two

They also receive retirement benefits and National Guardsmen draw retirement pay just as do Regular Army personnel. The National Guard provides

The unit would be commanded by a captain, At full strengththe unit will have six howitzers.

Main duty of the field artillery unit in time of war or mobilization is to provide artillery support for the infan'ry. These

Training chiefly is for cannoneers-persons who fire and handle ammunition for the big guns. In addition, many persons must e trained in communicationsboth radio and telephone—as well as in survey, fire direction (controlling the firing of the howitzers), mo or maintenance and driving, cooking, supply and administration.

Units are also trained to control riots or handle other civilan emergencies.

National Guardsmen are deferred from the draft, if they join the unit before becoming 1812 years old. This means a person can continue his college education or civilian employment while training at home.

Reason for this is that' the military is unable to keep as many units in active full time training as is necessary to keep the United States safe from attack. Consequently, the government saw fit to keep Guard units functioning for use in case of war or emergency. Eight of the nation's 27 National Guard Divisions have already been mobilized because of the present emergency. But the other divisions are still at work drilling at home should additional units be

Individuals cannot be taken ndividually from a Guard unit The unit is mobilized as a whole whenever the Pentagon

he word. Thus, if a National Guard unit is called, the men who enlisted in it have the benefit of serving with their buddles in their home town outfit. They also retain ratings earned since their enlistment in the Guard and thus avoid being called to active service at only a private's pay.

Both veterans and young men with no military background beween the ages of 17 and 35 years of age are desirable to start a Guard unit. Veterans with artillery knowledge particularly useful in getting valuable training underway in the unit's early history. Even raw recruits may be-

come officers.

1. By having served as a first

Ellis H. Boyd, OPS district director, refused to state if any of the reports have been made from Haskell County, but added that the alleged sales have taken place in several counties of the 50-county Fort Worth district which includes Haskell County.

"We have had several complaints from junk dealers that numerous sellers of used batteres are demanding above the ceiling price for these batteries. Boyd said. He explained that under the Defense Production Act both seller and purchaser can be prosecuted for such illegal trans-

The ceiling price for junk pas-senger car batteries is \$2.80 per battery on an as is basis. The celling does not apply to the tradein allowance a retailer may grant the purchaser of a new battery. Reports list some as high as \$3.15 per battery, which is 35

The demand for junk batteries has increased because the bat-teries are a source of lead, a cri:ical item in the defense program. Boyd said.




