



farm home. The septic tank, says W. S Allen, extension agricultural engineer-buildings of Texas A. part of any foundation wall. & M. College, is not a mysterious object. It is merely a holding

in a sanitary manner. He says sanitation authorities agree that a septic tank should

be made large enough to hold the maximum amount of sewage discharged into it in any given 24 hour period. The minimum sized tank should hold no less than 500 gallons. Tanks that are too small soon become overloaded with sludge and raw sewage and

this will pass into the disposal field and clog up the system. He says a grease trap is not con-

sidered necessary for the ordinary household if the tank has a capacity of 500 gallons or more. The location of the tank, however, is of primary importance. It is cheaper, he says, to build the tank close to the source of the sewage because less water tight line will be needed. It is not, however, a good practice to locate a septic tank too close to a building for this makes cleaning difficult. All septic tanks







Five Earthquakes Recorded at Tech Observatory


Five earthquakes of varying intensity were recorded at the Texas Technological College seismological observatory during recent weeks, Dr. Leroy T. Patton has reported.







County H. D. Agent **Gives Tips for Home** Washing Corduroy

Corduroy gets solled just the same as does any other clothing material and it should be washed or cleaned regularly if it is to look and wear well. Corduroy suits, coats and dresses can be successfully washed at home, says Mrs. Vee J. Howle, county Home Demonstration agent, if certain precautions are taken.


She says garments made from corduroy need a gentle washing and points out that lukewarm water and mild soapsuds should be used. The suds should be squeezed through the garments and twisting and rubbing should be avoided. They should be rins-ed in two or three changes of lukewarm water.

She doesn't recommend wring-ing but instead says the garment should be lifted from the tub and folded in a bath towel to remove the excess water, then hung on a wooden hanger to dry in shape. Corduroy garments should be dried rapidly and out-of-doors in

It was pointed out that research has shown enzyme activity is not stopped by low temperatures and ice formation and that vegetables frozen without scalding developed undesirable odors, flavors and colors. The enzyme action must be stopped if a frozen vegetable is to be palatable at the end of a resonable storage period. Corn-on-the ccb was better when frozen without scalding if it were frozen for no more than one month. Overscalded corn developed off-flavors. Steam scalding is not recommended for spinach because the thin leaves stick and clump.

Miss Mason says tests show that a high percentage of the acorbic acid and vitamin A content of frozen vegetables was retained then they were properly scalded elore freezing.






