## Blaze Damages Larned Home

Haskell Volunteer Fire Department battled a heartbreaking fire Tuesday that left an estimated \$22,000.00 damage at the John Larned home at 206 North Ave. E. Firemen were called to the scene about 12:55 and the fire was well underway, and seemed to have started in the downstairs equipment closet, toward the center of the home. The two-story stone home fire was difficult to fight, and 27 fire-

men combined professional efforts to keep most of the damage in the upper story. Most of the belongings in the first story were moved in ample time to prevent damage, and some were taken from upstairs. The damage estimate is a definite estimate, because inventory of belongings were still being taken at press time. The fire raged out of control for almost an hour, due to high whipping winds that kept fire-

men battling it from all directions. One fireman, Jack Medford, was taken to the hospital and treated and released, for smoke inhalation. Others suffered from the smoke that clung around the stone walls and the ladders they were using to fight the fire in the upper story of the home. By 2 p. m., the fire was under control, and the trucks returned to the station around 3 o'clock.

**SNYDER**—Veterans who plan to enroll at Western Texas College for the first time for the spring semester need to submit their applications to the Veterans Administration not later than Dec. 10, 1973, for their Certificates of Eligibility, Dan Dever, Veterans Outreach Coordinator at WTC, said.

Administration sufficient time to process the applications and to start allowance payments at the start of the semester.

The Veterans Outreach Coordinator Office at WTC is open from 6-9 p. m. each Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday evening to assist veterans in planning their educational programs and to help veterans in making application for VA educational benefits.

Veterans who were discharged or released from active duty after Jan. 1, 1965, but prior to June 1, 1966, are reminded that their VA educational benefits expire June 1, 1974. Veterans

discharged after June 1, 1966, have eight years from date of discharge or release from active duty to complete their educational programs under the GI Bill.

Many veterans believe that because they were discharged or released from active duty under conditions other than honorable they do not have GI educational benefits. This is not correct. Any person discharged or released from active duty under conditions other than dishonorable may be classified an eligible veteran for educational benefits.

The Veteran Outreach Coordinator Office is located in the Administration Building at WTC and veterans are invited to make use of the assistance available there by visiting the office or calling 573-8511, extension 270.

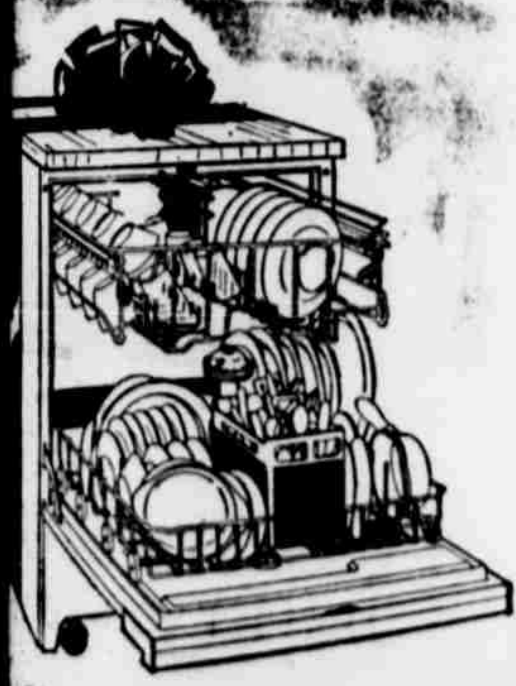

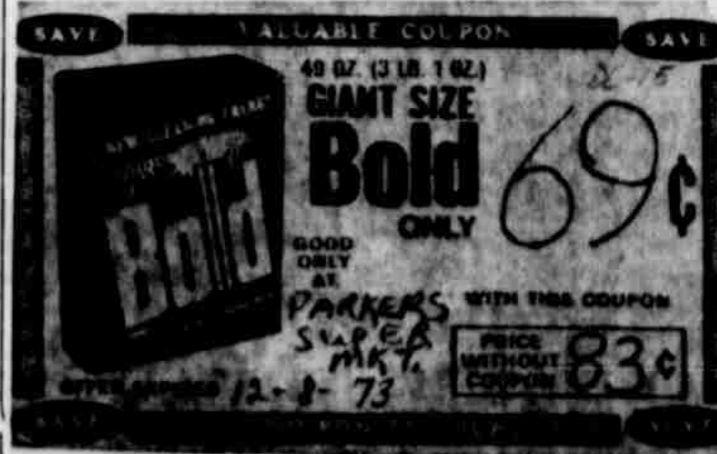

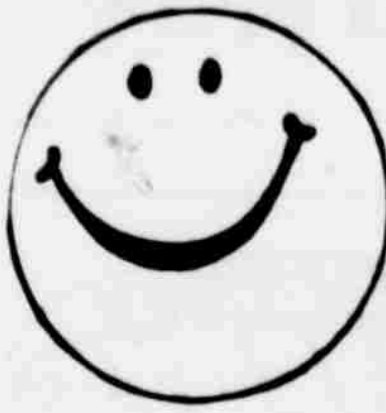
