H. A. Glasgow bought of R. H. McKee this week 60 head of stock cattle at \$15 around. It being the season when flies are almost sure to cause worms in any wound on an animal, the question arose as to how the cattle were to be put in Glasgow's brand without incurring this risk. He and Henry Johnson finally evolved the idea of bobbing the animals' tails, which would not grow out before cool weather and they can be branded then.

Matt Walker has bought H. E. Keister's interest in their meat market and has secured the services of Will Dickenson as butcher.

W. H. Parsons and Mr. Kirby spent several days on the river this week fishing and hunting.

H. S. Post has had the misfortune to lose several head of his fine graded Hereford yearlings in recent days. It seems they died of fever contracted from being put in a pasture where tick-infested cattle had been pastured some time previously.

A petition signed by 227 qualified voters was presented to the Commissioners Court Monday, requesting that election be held to determine whether or not the sale of intoxicating liquor would be permitted in Haskell county. After checking the petition, the Court ordered the election held on July 9, 1901.

Caution Advised In Use of New Insecticide

Recently a new insecticide highly poisonous not only for insects but also for man and animals has become available commercially said Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer. It is known as "Parathion" and has proven quite effective for certain agricultural uses.

"Parathion in the pure state is toxic to man and animals if its use could be restricted to a few individuals who could make a business of applying it and educate themselves so as to insure the maximum of safety. In Texas and a number of other states, however, there are no laws making such restricted use possible.

Therefore, a brief statement of warning is being offered. "Parathion in the pure state is a brownish liquid with a high boiling point and peculiar odor. It mixes but slightly with water, but is completely soluble in alcohol, acetone and certain similar solvents. Under factory conditions it is usually mixed with a powder such as talc or bentonite as a carrier and appears on the market as a powder which has absorbed in parathion.

"Its toxic effect may result from breathing the dust, as a result of swallowing contaminated substances, or by absorption through the skin. The latter may be indirect absorption such as from contaminated clothing.

Safe use is dependent on the use of precautionary measures so as to prevent contact. The user should seriously study and observe these precautions. The user should be alert for symptoms of poisoning so that a physician may be in attendance without delay should he be needed. Atropine, a potent medicine, has been mentioned as an antidote. It should be borne in mind that this is another poison about as dangerous, if improperly used, as is parathion. It should only be used under competent medical direction."

More Cotton Used In Feminine Frocks

The greatest amount of cotton in ten years went into women's dresses in 1950, the National Cotton Council reports. Eighteen thousand more bales were used in cotton dresses last year than during the previous year. The increasing number of women's cotton dresses is attributed chiefly to new fabric finishes and to cotton's rising popularity for high fashion clothing both winter and summer.

Cotton farmers are urged to make regular inspections of their fields of growing cotton for harmful insects. Get them early.

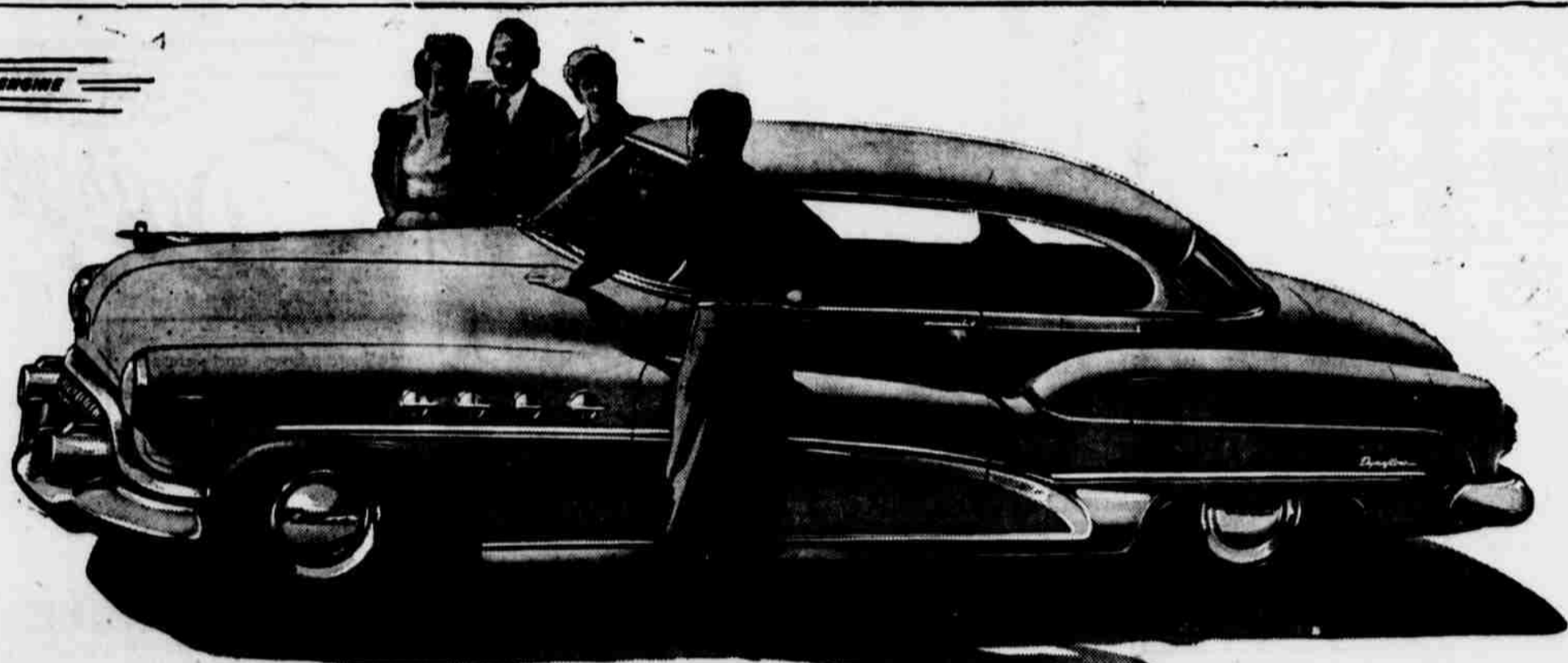

Posted Ceiling Prices Now Displayed In Several Retail Categories, OPS Reports

An important development in price regulations of consumer items, intended to benefit the consumer and the business community is under way.

Ellis H. Boyd, director of Fort Worth District Office of Price Stabilization points out that public posting or item marking of legal ceiling prices, or selling prices asserted by at low ceilings, enabling customers to tell at a glance just what prices can be charged legally by the retailer is now in process. Several retail categories already operating under publicly displayed prices under regulations pertaining to them and others are required to begin doing so in the near future. Within the two or three weeks, posted or ticketed prices will be displayed for commodities and services representing a major portion of the individual's consumer good expenditures.

Major fields in which consumer posting and item marking of prices are required under existing orders are:
Service Station Gasoline and Oil Sales
 Service stations have been required since March 26 to post their legal ceiling prices on gasoline and motor oil under terms of Ceiling Price Regulation 13. (Service stations soon must also post charges for service under the General Service Regulation—see below.)

Retail Grocer Stores
 Beginning April 30, and continuing each succeeding Monday, food stores are obliged to mark their selling prices on or near all items covered by CPR 15 and 16 (butter, packaged cheese, baby food, cocoa, breakfast cereals, coffee and tea flour, flour mixes, canned and frozen fruits and vegetables, jams and jellies, lard, mayonnaise and salad dressing, shortenings, canned meats and canned fish, etc.) Such displayed selling prices must always be at or below ceiling prices. By each Monday henceforth, the grocer must re-figure and put into effect a new ceiling price on any item whose net cost is different from the net cost on which his existing ceiling was based.

It is planned that dollars and cents prices will be ordered posted for retail grocery items in communities throughout the county as soon as possible after costs of raw products now below parity can be stabilized.

Beef Prices
 The first required posting of specific dollars and cents ceilings on food will become effective this month under CPR 25, the new retail beef order. By June 18, all retail meat sellers are required to display charts showing their legal ceiling prices for fresh beef. Koshers markets must post their prices by June 11. These prices are set nationally by OPS on a zone basis, varying slightly

for different types and classes of stores, and must not be exceeded by any seller. Posted charts may be obtained from OPS District office when printing is completed.

Services at Retail
 By June 15 retail service establishments—such as barber shops, beauty shops, auto repair shops, radio and appliance repair shops, laundries, dry cleaners, tailor shops, shoe shops, parking lots, filling stations (for services), checking accounts, bowling alleys, skating rinks, golf courses and amusement parks—must be post their ceiling prices for all customers to see. Each firm prepares its own posting chart.

Dry Goods, Household Furnishings, Etc.
 By July 1, sellers of retail dry goods, household furnishings, housewares, radios, and a vast variety of their items covered by CPR 7 and its amendments must mark their selling price on or near all such goods, and such displayed prices must always be at or below the legal ceilings. (Note: Some smaller dealers in these items, doing a limited gross volume of business as specified in the regulations, may elect to price under the Central Ceiling Price Regulation for the present, rather than under CPR 7. They are not yet required to mark prices at or below ceilings, but they must not sell at prices higher than they charged in the base period December 19-Jan. 26.)
