HASKELL COUNTY HISTORY

Brief News Taken from Old Copies of The Free Press

20 Years Ago—Jan. 7, 1913

A slow rain which began falling Sunday and continued all day Monday amounted to one inch of moisture, and brought total rainfall here since the first of October to more than 10 inches.

Losses estimated at \$10,000 were caused in two fires at Rule early New Year's Day. The May Mill, Grain and Elevator Company was swept by flames, resulting in \$8,000 damage, and a stucco house owned by Clarence Leon was destroyed with an estimated loss of \$4,000. Causes of the fires were unknown.

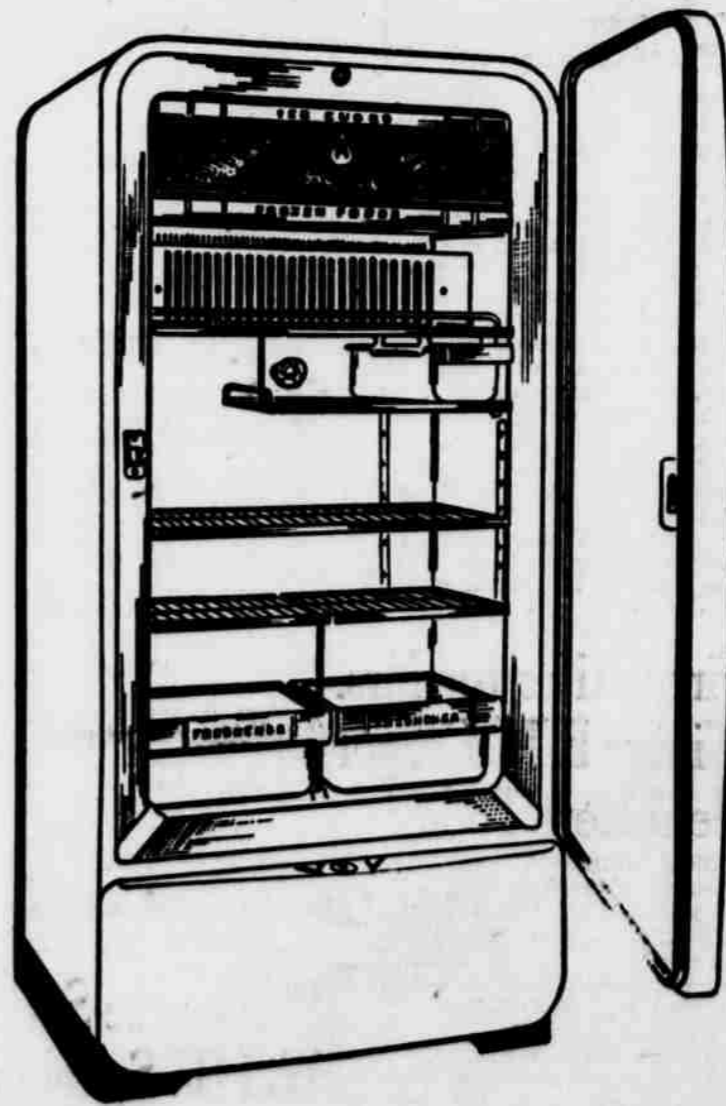

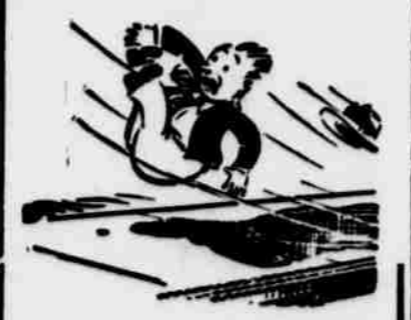

Is Victim of Gun
Received Xmas

Donnie Ray Vickers, 13 year
 old son of Lueders farm cou-
 ple, was killed instantly Dec. 25
 morning by a blast from a 16-
 gauge shotgun he had received
 for Christmas.

An inquest verdict ruled the
 death due to an accidental shot.

 was discharged and struck the
 Vickers youth in the right side.
