hospital project can be started by February 1, and it is estimated that around eight months will be required for completion. New construction will include

the building of three additional wings to the present building. two on the east and one on the west side of the structure.
The southeast addition,

wing, will include additional patient rooms and a nursery. Another wing on the east side at the north of the building will include a materni'y room. Addition on the west center of the building will house the hospital kitchen, which will make available additional space in the main section of the building for patient rooms.

The present hospital building was erected and the institution opened in 1938. In recent years, facilities of the hospital have been taxed to capacity, and ex-pansion and enlargement of the institution has long been needed for some time.

Administration of the hospital is under the supervision of a sixmember board of directors, appointed by the Commissioners Court. At present the Hospital Board is composed of Claude Reid, Weinert; Gene Overton Haskell; Cliff LeFevre, Sagerton; Foyd Gauntt, Rule; Hap Smith and Bob Speck, Rochester.
