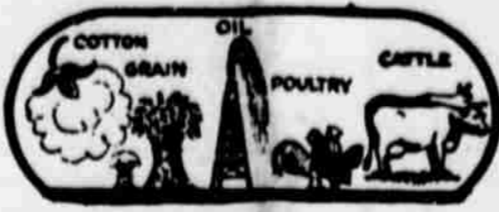

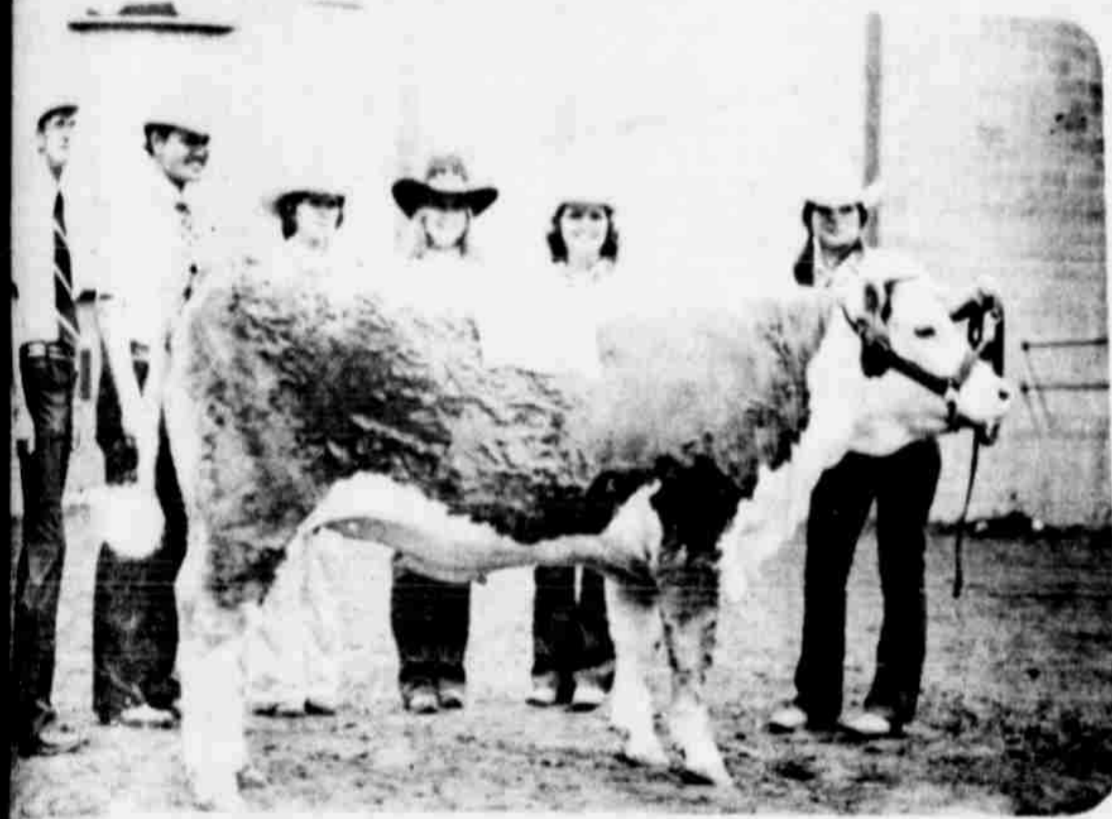

through Thursday nights. Bill Blakely will continue to serve as coordinator for the WTC extension center in Haskell. Dr. Ben Brock, vice president of WTC, is coordinator of the Haskell program on the WTC main campus.

"We are looking forward to another semester of classes with extension students in Haskell," Dr. Brock said. "WTC offered its first extension courses in Haskell in the fall of 1973 and we feel the

program has been successful. We are always interested in talking to students or prospective students about courses they would like to have offered at the extension center and invite inquiries at any time."

Students enrolled at WTC extension centers may earn as many as 12 college credit hours during a semester, and may enroll at an extension center while taking a course or courses on the Snyder campus. Students at WTC extension centers will pay fees of \$51 plus lab fees for one three-hour course, \$57 for two three-hour courses or \$92 for four three-hour courses, for example, with lab fees added when required.

All courses offered at WTC extension centers are freshmen or sophomore level courses, and credits earned are transferrable to other colleges and universities. Textbooks will be available at each extension center on the night classes begin.

Persons wishing additional information about the Haskell extension center may contact Blakely at the high school. Copies of class schedules are also available there.

Courses planned for Haskell during the fall semester are Anthropology 232, Business 131, English 131, Government 231, Mathematics 135, Sociology 231, Spanish 131, Speech 131, Speech 232, Law Enforcement 232, Law Enforcement 237, and Management 135, 136, 137 and 139.

She has carried projects in clothing, foods, money management, gardening, and food preservation. She has won the District Food Show and participated in the State Food Show where she won a blue ribbon and placed 3rd in State. She has also won the Junior Division of the District Food Show and she has been a county winner in numerous events.

Joanne Cloud, 15, is the

daughter of Mrs. Joe W. Cloud of Rule. Joanne has been a 4-H member for six years and has carried projects in Foods, Clothing, Horticulture, Photography, Conservation of Natural Resources and Needle craft. This year Joanne served as a Junior leader for Foods and Nutrition Project Group for younger 4-H members. She has placed 1st in the County Food Show for four years and has been 2nd in the District Food Show three years. She won 1st place in the Natural Resources Demonstration at District in 1974. ## Water Board Is Recording Water Level

Two recorders to measure groundwater levels are in operation in Knox and Haskell Counties according to Ridge Kaiser, a hydrologist with the Rollin W. Harden consulting firm of Austin.

The instruments are used to record changes continuously in the underground water table, and have been installed as a part of an overall investigation of the waters in those two counties. The project is sponsored by the Texas Water Quality Board and the recorders, which will be in operation, for up to two years, were provided and installed by the Texas Water Development Board.

One is located 2 1/2 miles northeast of Munday on the Helen McClure property, farmed by Clarence Brown. The other is 1/2 mile east of Rochester on the Speck property farmed by Earl Alvis.

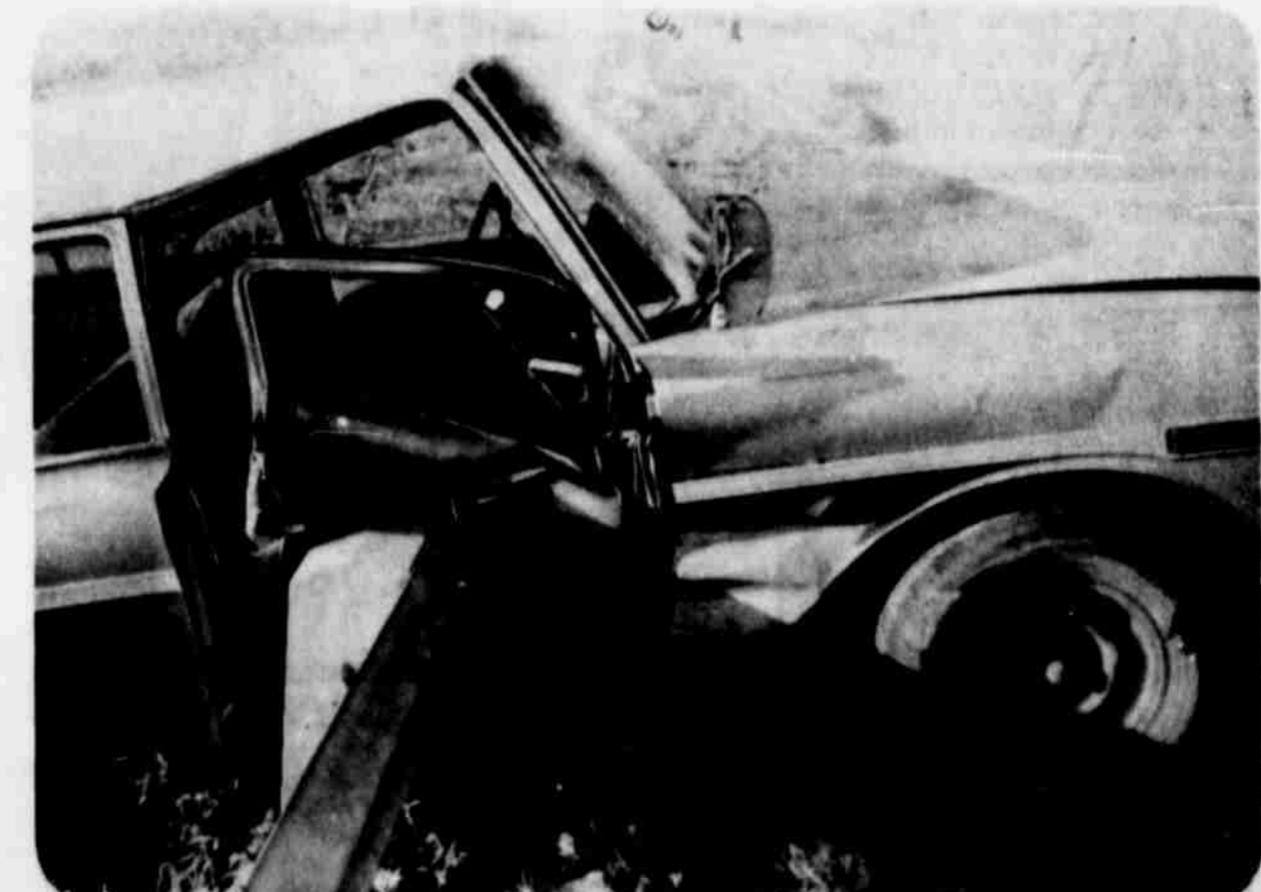
Information provided by the recorders to date shows that the water table at the Munday site is unchanged over the past six weeks, while the water table at Rochester has risen more than 3 1/2 feet.

Hydrologists will use the recorders to determine seasonal fluctuations, help estimate recharge and measure effects of pumping from the underground aquifer.

**Haskell Bicentennial Happenings**

One of the permanent buildings that has remained in use since the closing of the Hemisfair in San Antonio is the Texas Hall of Cultures. Every native Texan and every adopted Texan should view the marvelous exhibits which depict the history of the people from different cultures, ethnic groups and backgrounds who contributed to the making of Texas.

There are many families in Haskell County whose history did not get in the Bicentennial publication, "Haskell County and Its Pioneers", to be

released soon, but who made contributions to the life of the county in early days and right up to the present. Some of these had European backgrounds.

Traces of a German accent are not uncommon, and names in the phone book reflect German heritage—Moeller, Peiser, Schwartz, Stiewert and many more. Sprinkled all over Texas are towns with names like Fredricksburg, New Braunfels, Giddings, Kaufman, and in our own area are Rhineland, Sagerton and others. By the way, did you

know that prior to World War I Old Glory was called Brandenburg? A recent issue of "Scene", the Sunday magazine of the Dallas Morning News featured a story "Hoe-down in Old Glory" that made most interesting reading.

An afternoon spent in the home of Mr. and Mrs. George Klose afforded the opportunity to learn something of the life of those of German descent who helped settle Haskell County seventy years ago.

In 1884 F. A. Klose, age eleven, came from Schlasian Quaritz, Germany to the United States with his father and mother. They settled in Lott, a German community in Fall County. Several years later Emma Hanneke, who was 19 years old, was brought to Lott by her sister from Germany. Their parents had come several years before and sent for Emma as they had found a young man with money whom they chose for her to marry. Emma did not agree with her parents' choice and was told, "Take this young man with money or take the road". So Emma chose the road, going to live with a friend, Louise Klose. She soon fell in love with her friend's brother, F. A., and they were married. (One reason she was attracted to him was because he was such a fine looking cowboy!)

They "set up housekeeping" in Lott where seven of their eight children were born.

In 1904 Mr. Klose heard that land could be bought cheap in Haskell County and so he purchased 100 acres in the Irby community for \$8 an acre from a land agent. In December of that year the family left Lott by train with their household goods and two mules in boxcars and moved into a house between Anson and Stamford. They lived there until completion of the house in Irby, a two-room structure built of lumber which they hauled by wagon from Stamford. A favorite Klose story concerns their one hog which they butchered and placed in a box to be moved with other family possessions. The first night in the new home the box was left on the front porch and during the night coyotes came up and devoured half the meat, which was no small loss to the family!

The Klose farm was planted in cotton, wheat and maize. When the children worked in the fields their mother would bring their lunch in the buggy. George recalled, "She might have the mule's harness on him backward, but she would get there with our dinner!" The family spoke only German in the home and the children did not speak English until they started school.

The Irby school had one teacher, usually a woman, and sometimes as many as sixty pupils who went from the first through the eighth grades. All the Klose children attended, with the boys getting in on the fights that sometimes broke out; punishment was confinement to the room or wash the schoolhouse windows, and "We couldn't go out and play 'Wolf Over The River'." George said. They all loved walking barefoot and hunting and swimming.

Members of the Klose

family were Lutherans and there was no church building in Irby so they met in the school house; the pastor came from Sagerton and preached once a month. The Irby congregation later became the Trinity Lutheran Church, now in Haskell.

There was always good German food on the table, most of it raised on the farm. Mrs. Klose baked their bread, made sauerkraut and cottage cheese. The supper menu seldom varied—almost always there was butter-bread, cottage cheese and salt cucumbers—salzgerken.

With the passage of time Mr. Klose added 400 acres to his original land purchase, and also bought two farms in the Matson community. All the land still belongs to various members of the Klose family.

In 1925 the parents moved to Haskell and left George, Herbert and Felix on the home place. (Felix was the one child born in Haskell County.) Tiring of bachelorhood and fending for themselves, the boys one by one married and left home.

In 1926 George and Dora Eschberger were married in the Haskell County courthouse and bought the home place from his parents. They lived there until they sold it to their son and wife, Elton and Ruth Ann Klose, thus continuing to keep in the family the home established on the land bought in 1904. After 45 years in the same house—they had added onto the original two rooms—George and Dora moved to their present home on F Street in Haskell.

Mr. and Mrs. Klose showed me a prized heirloom—a 105-year old German Bible, brought to Texas by his father when he came in 1884. The young German lad had limited schooling but could read, write and "figure" quite well. George recalled. In Germany all school children were required to study the Bible. The book was marked many times at verses in the Psalms and the Gospel of John. Also still in everyday use in their home is a crystal sugar bowl that belonged to Emma Hanneke Klose, and her white ironstone gravy bowl.

Making their contribution to the life of Haskell County since the first part of this 20th century are the sons and daughters of the German immigrants, Mr. and Mrs. F.

A. Klose. All were farmers, working hard and living productive lives. Still living in the county are Albert, George, Herbert, and Felix, and Mrs. Laura Parker and Mrs. Lena Stiewert. One sister died in 1897 and the brother, Herman lives near Stamford.

Before my visit ended, I found out what salzgerken is like as slices were served me by Mrs. Klose. Whole cucumbers are cured a week in salt water and dill to which peach leaves and grape leaves have been added. It was different—but good!

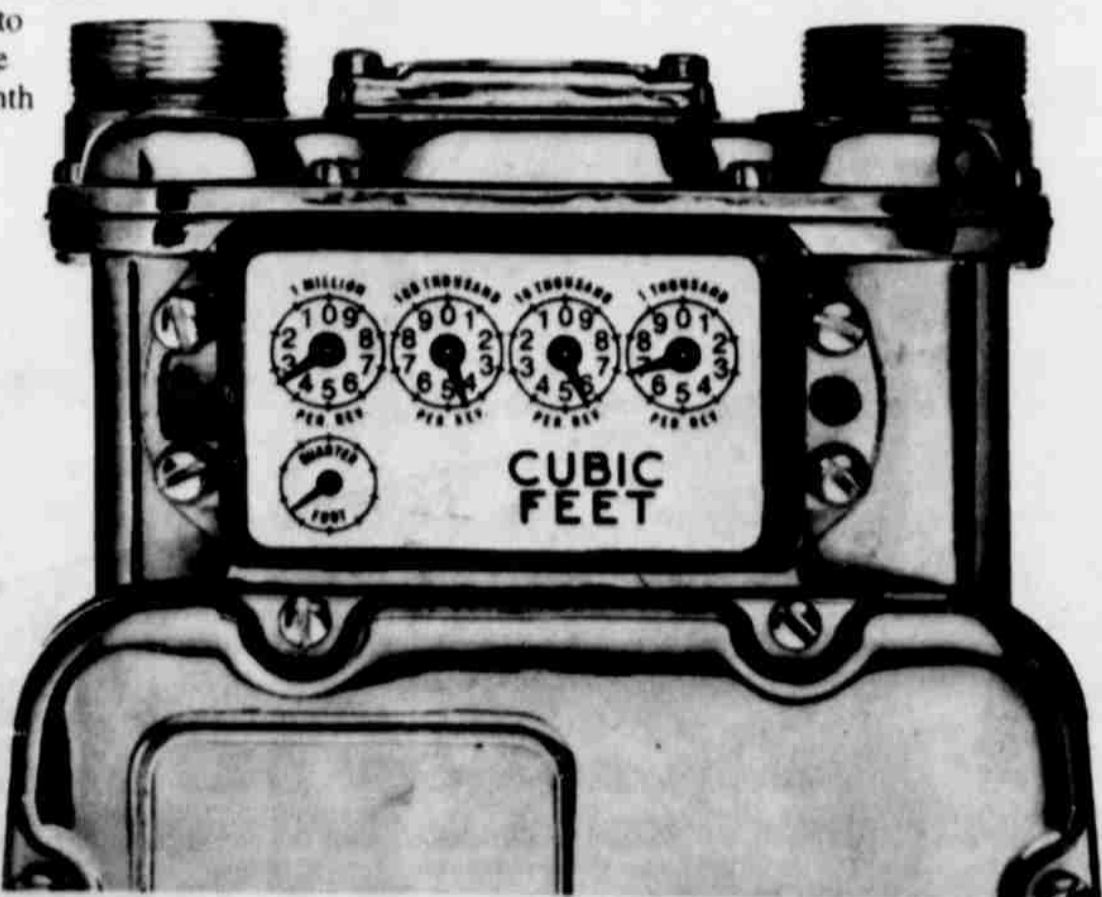

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# Appearance Deceptive With C-F

Larned is the son of Mrs. Jerry Larned of Haskell, and the grandson of Mrs. Joe Larned of Haskell. Jerry is the head athletic director at Haskell, and Todd being a year old boy has a great interest in all sports. But Todd has Cystic Fibrosis. He has Cystic Fibrosis instead of joining his father in a game of baseball, he takes inhalation treatments three or four times daily to help him breathe. He has an abnormally thick mucus in his lungs which prevents serious lung problems as is one in approximately 1,600 babies in the United States. Cystic Fibrosis is an inherited disease believed to be transmitted as a recessive trait, which means that both parents, even though healthy themselves, carry a gene for C/F. Children who receive two C/F genes, one from the mother and one from the father inherit the condition. Statistics show that one in every 20 persons is a carrier of the C/F gene. No test exists to find carriers. The cause for Cystic Fibrosis is not known. Many authorities believe that children like Todd are born lacking

a single key chemical which could account for the faulty functioning of many organs of the body. The most serious effects of Cystic Fibrosis result from the abnormal mucus produced in the various organs. In C/F, the mucus is a thick, gluey substance which creates two major difficulties for Todd: it clogs the bronchial tubes in his lungs, interfering with breathing, and it plugs up his pancreatic ducts, preventing digestive enzymes from reaching his small intestine, thus preventing him from digesting his food properly. Outwardly, Todd hardly looks as if he is suffering from a serious disease. He is thin, smallish, and has somewhat discolored teeth from prolonged use of antibiotics—nothing very unusual. But appearances are often deceptive with a C/F child. Parents who suspect C/F should be aware of other symptoms such as persistent dry hacking coughs and repeated respiratory infections. Another symptom of C/F is a salty taste of the skin. Mothers of newborn babies often diagnose C/F by simply kissing their baby. Early diagnosis is important and helps prolong the lives of children who suffer from Cystic Fibrosis, a disease second only to Cancer as the most common killer in school age children. Todd is one example of a C/F child. But each of the many thousands of American boys and girls with Todd's disease is, of course, different. There are variations in

the severity of the disease. Since infancy when Todd was diagnosed as having C/F, he has undergone intensive treatment involving drugs, breathing equipment and diet supplements. The breathing equipment includes motors

and mist tents for night use and machines used for inhalation treatments during the day. A great burden is often placed on the parents of C/F children because of the expense of drugs, equipment, trips to C/F clinics, and frequent visits to the hospital. The expense varies as does the treatment for each individual. The average expense runs from \$1500-\$3000 yearly, but in some cases the expense is doubled or tripled as some families have more than one C/F child. Authorities say that even though research has made great strides in the control of Cystic Fibrosis, there is yet no cure for the disease. The money raised in C/F drives such as the one in Haskell County helps continue the Care, Teaching, and Research

Centers in the United States through which thousands of C/F children receive treatment and care. In the meantime, there is hope that a breakthrough will occur and Todd no longer will have to bother with treatments and medications, but can join his friends in a game of ball.

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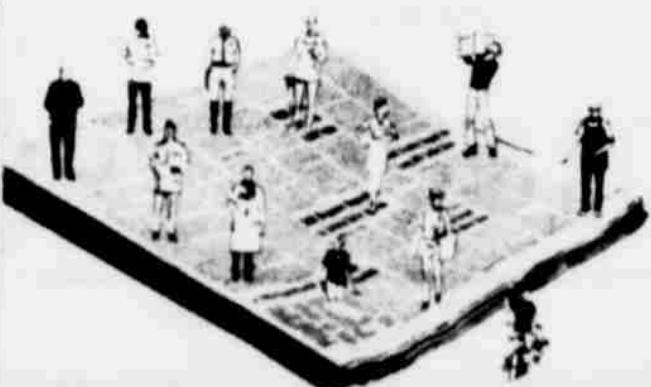

**INVITE BIRDS TO YOUR HOME**

People who enjoy having birds around their homes will find a new Soil Conservation brochure, "Invite Birds to Your Home", a big help in planning and landscaping for birds.

The brochure, written by Olan W. Dillon, Jr., SCS biologist, tells the birdlover how to satisfy habitat needs of nesting and wintering birds with trees, shrubs, and food. It tells how a conservation landscape plan used in the selection of trees and shrubs will beautify your yard and attract the kinds of birds you like.

A conservation landscape plan will guide you in placing bird-attracting features near a window, patio, or terrace so you can observe the many varieties of birds that accept your invitation.

Even birdlovers in dense residential areas can attract birds by providing water for drinking and bathing and living fences and other shrubs for cover. A single plant, the elderberry, is used by 51 species of birds and will dress your yard nine months out of the year with its white flower clusters and red-black berries.

"Invite Birds to Your Home" will tell you the kind of food preferred by different kinds of birds, and how you can provide for them during food-short winter months.

Single copies of "Invite Birds to Your Home", Program Aid 1093, are available free at the Haskell Soil Conservation Service Office as long as supply lasts. The booklet can also be purchased for 75 cents from the Superintendent of Documents, U.S. Government Printing Office, Washington, D.C. 20402.

**2 Fatalities Reported During July**

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated seven accidents on rural highways in Haskell County during the month of July, 1975, according to Sergeant Frank Jirick, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in two persons killed and ten persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first seven months of 1975, shows a total of 29 accidents resulting in three persons killed and 22 persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for July, 1975, shows a total of 568 accidents resulting in 22 persons killed and 398 persons injured as compared to July, 1974, with 485 accidents resulting in 18 persons killed and 280 persons injured. This was 83 more accidents, four more killed, and 118 more injured in 1975 at the same period of time.

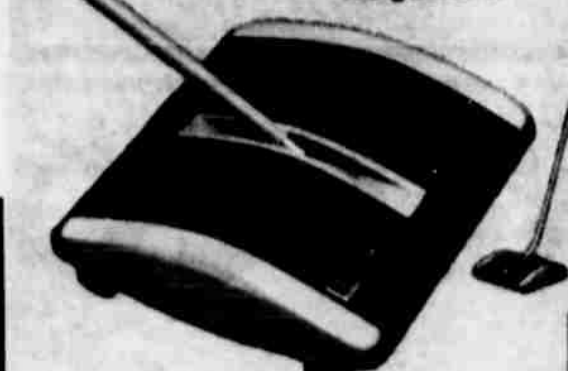

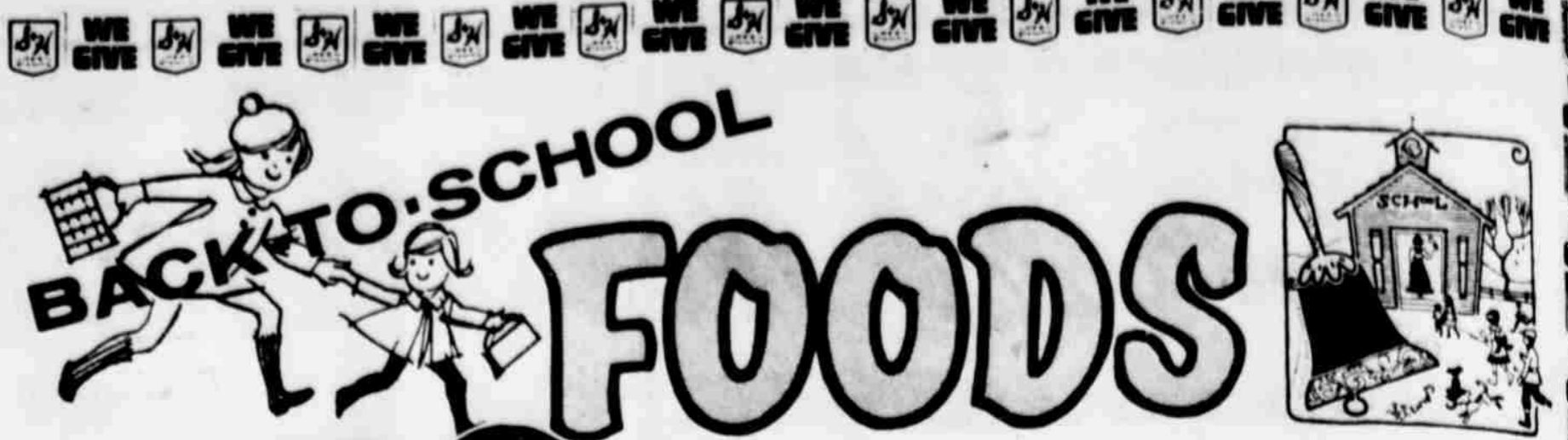
