



# **Tour of Mesquite Control Tests** Shows Results of Chemcial 2,4,5-T

From observations made on the tour, the ester of 2.4,5-T still ap-pears to be the best chemical for the control of mesquite. Threefourth pound acid of 2,4,5-T in 3 gallons of water and 1 gallon of diesel oil gave the most consistent and promising results in all the tests studied. Included were sprouts, seedlings and small and large trees.

Mesquite on the ranches visited was sprayed by plane during the spring of 1950. A. H. Walker, range specialist for the Texas A. & M. Extension Service and one of the group making the tour, says that, although it is too soon to determine the final results of the spraying, the work definitely looks promising. Walker reminds ranchmen that

the present goal of this experimental work is to find a practical method of mesquite control, rather than mesquite eradication.
