

chandise stocks and fixtures were three business concerns: Jones Dry Goods Store, Roach Shoe Store, and the Fashion Shoppe, all located in the two adjoining two-story buildings owned by George Neely and T. R. Odell.

Also destroyed was the cotton office of Ralph Raney, in an adjoining building, while extensive smoke and water damage was sustained by Blohm Studio and Frazier's Radio & Record Shop, also in adjoining buildings on the north and east.

Heaviest estimated loss was suffered by Jones Dry Goods Store. All merchandise stocks and fixtures were a total loss, with damage estimated at between \$40,000 and \$50,000 on contents, and \$10,000 building damage.

Roach Shoe Store loss was estimated at between \$8,000 and \$10,000 by Burl Roach, owner. The Fashion Shoppe, ladies dress shop owned by Mrs. Thea Free and Mrs. Pat Weaver also suffered total loss on merchandise, estimated at \$10,000.

Offices on the second floor of the large two-story buildings also suffered extensive damage. These included office of Dr. Wm. Ponder, optometrist, with extensive damage to equipment and fixtures; office of the Haskell Red Cross Chapter; Dr. J. D. Smith dental office, and the Barnes Insurance Agency.

The Ralph Raney Cotton Office lost all office fixtures, with loss estimated at \$500, while Blohm Studio suffered estimated damage of \$4,500 from smoke and water.

Frazier Radio & Record Shop estimated loss of several hundred dollars to merchandise, when part of the store's stocks were moved as a precaution when it was feared fire would spread to the Cahill Building in which the store is located.

The fire started in the Raney Cotton Office, when a Negro porter, Tom Wiley, lighted a gas stove in the office preparatory to readying the office for the day's business. He said the fire "just flashed up," and after attempting to smother the flames, he called the fire department.

Flames spread throughout the small building quickly, and to the adjoining Jones Dry Goods Store by the time fire equipment arrived.

Haskell firemen, using all equipment and helped by Rule firemen who rushed a pump truck to Haskell fought the stubborn blaze for two hours before bringing it under control at 8:30 a. m. Firemen remained on duty to prevent possible further outbreak, and will remain on temporary shifts, Chief Ray Lusk said as long as necessary.

George Neely, owner of the building occupied by his store Jones Dry Goods, said the store would be re-opened as soon as possible. Mr. Roach, owner of the Roach shoe store, and Mrs. Free and Mrs. Weaver, have not announced definite plans.

### Civil Case, Tried Three Times, Set For Fourth Hearing

Fourth trial of a compensation suit, in which three previous hearings have resulted in a mistrial in each instance, has been set for Jan. 22 in 39th District Court at Aspermont. District Judge Ben Charlie Chapman of this city will preside in hearing the case for his fourth time.

Style of the case is Marvin Sherrod vs. Superior Insurance Company of Dallas. The plaintiff, a resident of Swenson in Stonewall County, seeks judgment for total and permanent disability in the amount of between \$8,000 and \$9,000, based on injuries sustained while allegedly employed at a gin plant in Swenson.

Counsel for the plaintiff is composed of the Abilene law firm of Scarbrough, Yates, Scarbrough & Black, and A. J. Smith, Jr. of Anson. Defense counsel is composed of McMahan, Springer, Smart & Walker, of Abilene, assisted by a Dallas attorney for the insurance company.

Three previous hearings were held during 1951, all at Aspermont, and in each instance a "hung jury" resulted. Local attorneys and court officials do not recall a similar instance in which three consecutive mistrials have occurred in the same court action.

# Leaders Urge Dimes Drive Support Here

But much of the terror it inspires has been, and is being taken away—thanks to the March of Dimes."  
Harold Spain, Haskell postmaster: "The more we can do to keep youngsters healthy or bring them back to health, the better off our community will be. The March of Dimes has done a great job, but it can't continue to do the job unless everyone backs it to the limit."

Mayor Courtney Hunt: "I like that March of Dimes slogan—'This fight is Yours.' And by 'yours' that means every individual in Haskell County and across the United States. Every dollar given to this polio fight has work to do. Our local boys and girls have a staunch friend at their side, in the event polio should strike."

A. C. Pierson, president Haskell National Bank: "Like costs of everything today, polio patient-care costs have soared. While some cases may require perhaps only \$50, according to John H. Banks, chairman of the National Foundation's Haskell County Chapter, severely involved patients often require round-the-clock nursing, and the bills can come to \$60 per day. With tripled case incidence during the past few years, and the diminished buying power of the dollar, it is easy to see why the 1952 March of Dimes must win increased public support."


### Robert R. Free Is Promoted to Rank Of Corporal



## Fire Losses During 1951 Lowest In Many Years

Insured property loss from fire in Haskell during 1951 amounted to only \$13,247, approximately one-sixth of the previous year's losses which totalled \$79,000, Fire Marshal John B. Martin reported.

Heaviest fire loss during any one month was in March, 1951, when \$4,105.00 was sustained, Martin said. No losses were recorded in February, April, May, July, September and October. Totals for remaining months included January, \$400; June, \$657; August, \$4,000; November, \$1,300; and December \$3,025.

Records kept by Floyd Lusk, fire department driver, show that the department was called out on 59 alarms during the year, including six out of town calls to rural sections or neighboring towns.

Making up the total calls were four false alarms, 28 grass fires, 14 residence fires, two commercial or fires involving business concerns, one barn fire, two gin fires and two automobile fires. From August 24 to October 2, last year, firemen had an easy task, with not a single alarm turned in during that period, Lusk reported.

## Observance of American Citizenship Week Urged in Proclamation by Mayor

Mayor Courtney Hunt has issued a proclamation designating the week of January 14 through January 19 as "American Citizenship Week." His action is in line with a recent "Official Memorandum" signed by Governor Shivers setting up the entire month of January, 1952, as "American Citizenship Month."

Stressing the responsibilities and duties of the individual citizen in preserving the democratic way of life, the event is part of an annual citizenship program sponsored by the lawyers of Texas. "Every individual should stop and think about the fact that we have obligations as well as privileges arising from our status as citizens of a free democratic nation," the mayor stated referring to his official decree. "We cannot expect to retain our liberties forever unless each of us personally shares in performing those obligations of citizenship."

Spearheaded by the State Bar of Texas, which is furnishing speakers for local programs throughout the state, the 1952 campaign has as its theme, "What Can I Do for Democracy?" Approximately 7500 local civic minded organizations are expected to cooperate in the drive, bar president, Cecil E. Burney has announced.

The State Bar committee on American Citizenship, responsible for planning and direction of the state wide crusade for better citizenship, is headed by co-chairman, David A. Witt's of Dallas and Jack Pope of San Antonio.

## Driver Law Goes Into Effect, But Many Car Owners Remain Unprotected

Texas' new driver responsibility law went into effect Jan. 1st, but less than half of Haskell County's 6,000 drivers appeared to be protected under provisions of the law. A survey last fall showed 15 to 25 per cent of Texas cars covered by insurance. It was estimated then an additional 15 to 20 per cent would be added to the list by the time the law became effective.

Only in case of accident does a driver have to prove he can meet a \$15,000 claim, enforcement officials point out. The law requires that a driver file evidence he can meet damage claims in event of an accident resulting in death, injury or property damage exceeding \$100.

Insurance men here say they have received a number of requests in the past few weeks to "check up" on drivers who wanted policies, and many have reported a rush of applicants during the last week of December. Many more are expected to purchase policies now that the law is in effect.

Responsibility insurance is available at \$25 for a \$15,000 policy, local insurance brokers said. Under provisions of the old uniform traffic code, drivers still must report accidents that result in death, injury or total property damage of \$25 or more.

New forms for filing the additional information are available at the city police station, sheriff's office, or from other enforcement officers. When an accident occurs in which injury or property damage occurs, the liability report must be filed in 10 days.



**Natural Resources Provide Basis For Community Growth**

If you want a boom in your community, check its natural resources, a University of Texas researcher says.

Wilfrid C. Bailey points to the oil boom at Snyder, the new aluminum plant at Rockdale—established because of lignite deposits—and the irrigated farming boom at Cotton Center as typical examples.

Under joint support of the University of Texas and Harvard University, he has spent two years surveying Cotton Center, a farming community of approximately 300 persons in Hale County, located in the High Plains' irrigation belt.

"Their boom occurred in the 1940's simply because farmers, taking stock of their water resources, discovered they could economically irrigate their land from wells, turning marginal-producing fields into real profit makers," Bailey says.

"Many Texas communities can do what Cotton Center has done by checking their resources scientifically," he adds.

"University of Texas researchers in such divisions as the Bureau of Business Research, Department of Anthropology and School of Architecture, which specializes in community planning, can give valuable assistance to any group wishing to
