

Contractors Bids Due June 4 \$350,000 Housing Project

Plans for a \$350,000 PHA housing project in Haskell are being published this week, when bids on the 50-unit project are called for. Advertisement for the project is being published in the Free Press. Plans and specifications have been completed by Fred & Nelson, Dallas, and are to be received by the Housing Authority and the local housing authority members of the W. R. Johnson, chairman, and H. M. Crawford, secretary, and other members of the committee. The project will include 20 units of brick construction, which will be a maintenance building located on a tract owned by Haskell, and four units on a tract located between A and Ave B on North

Haskell Airman One of Four Survivors In Fatal Crash of B-36 Bomber Friday

The crash of a B-36 bomber and a jet fighter plane over Oklahoma, near the town of Carney, Friday took a toll of 14 lives, while a Haskell airman, Sgt. William Blair, 31, was one of four airmen who survived the crash. Sgt. Blair's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Blair of this city, were advised late Friday that their son had escaped serious injury after parachuting from the stricken bomber. Sgt. Blair, who was born and reared in Haskell county, was the crew chief of the giant bomber when it crashed after colliding in mid-air with a fighter plane during a mock air raid on Oklahoma. The huge six-engine bomber was from Carswell Air Base. He served four years in the last war, with a bomber group overseas and has been stationed at Carswell Air Force Base in Fort Worth for the past five years. The Haskell airman and his wife live at 4117 Survey St., Fort Worth. In addition to Sgt. Blair, three other survivors were Lt. Elroy Melberg, T-Sgt. Ellis Maxson, and S-Sgt. Dick Thrasher, all of Carswell Air Base. Thirteen of 17 aboard the B-36, including a civilian engineer, were killed, along with the pilot of the Air National Guard fighter plane which rammed the bomber. Sgt. Blair and the other three survivors said they knew their giant, high altitude bomber had been hit, but didn't realize one of four maneuvering F-51 fighter planes had rammed them broadside. Crew chief Blair said he noticed small fragments of "something" flying past the after part of the bomber after the impact. All four of the surviving crewmen were in the after part of the ship, and bailed out at 20,000 feet seconds after the collision.

Tulsa Concern To Build Pipe Line To Haskell Field

A pipeline outlet for the increasing oil production in Haskell, Stonewall and Knox counties will be available with completion of a new system to be built by Service Pipeline Company of Tulsa, Okla., according to press dispatches from that city. Gathering systems will connect production in the Old Glory, Kiowa Peak and North Aspermont fields of Stonewall County, in South Haskell Field of Haskell County and in North Knox City Field of Knox County. J. L. Burke, president of Service Pipeline Company, announced Saturday. A 135-mile line of 8 and 10-inch pipe will be built from the vicinity of the Old Glory Field to Service's present system at Bowie, Texas. "Although the new line is being built to serve new development in the Stonewall-Haskell County area, the line to Bowie will traverse an area where active exploration is under way," Burke said. "We are confident that this area has a bright future." In describing plans for the new artery Burke said, "this is another step in our program to provide pipe line service for West Central Texas producers. Our first line from West Central Texas north, built in 1919, but we have been a major gatherer in the area since the days of Ranger flush production. In 1951, we have re-entered this increasingly important area." Service early in April began gathering oil produced from 1,633 wells on 320 leases in Throckmorton, Shackelford, Stephens and Haskell Counties. Gathering systems from several new fields in Rannels County now are under construction. Surveying parties are staking out routes for the sections of this program to be laid first. Construction will begin as soon as pipe and equipment can be moved in. "The pipe for this project is available," said Burke. Another gathering system serving wells in the Solourner Field west of Haskell is now being completed by Tidewater Pipe Line Company. The line extends from that field to a connection with the Humble pipe line north-east of Rulo. A 10,000 barrel storage unit was completed this week by Tidewater on the R. L. Teague farm as the central point in this system.

Indian Band Ties For Top Honors In Region Meet

The Haskell Indian Band, directed by Bill Dean, tied with Mason High School Band for top honors at the Interscholastic League's regional music festival held at Brownwood Friday, April 27. Eighteen bands in the Interscholastic region competed against standards, called division ratings, which ranged from division I through division V. A first division is a "superior" rating, 95 to 100. Second division is "excellent," 90 to 95.

The Haskell band won a first division rating in sight reading, and a first division rating in marching. The Indian band's only second division rating came in concert playing. Mason scored a first division rating in concert playing, but was topped by Haskell in sight reading, where Mason made a second division rating. Both bands scored two first division ratings and one second division rating. Santa Anna and Ozona bands were next with two first division ratings, and one third division score each.

J. U. Fields, 81, Prominent Retired Merchant, Dies Saturday Morning

Death early Saturday morning brought to a close the long and useful career of J. U. Fields, prominent Haskell businessman for almost half a century, and one of the county's outstanding citizens. Mr. Fields, 81, and a member of a pioneer Haskell county family, died at 4:50 a. m. Saturday at the family home in this city. He had been in declining health for several years. Funeral service for Mr. Fields was held Sunday at 4 p. m. at the First Christian Church, of which he was a member. Conducting the rites were the Rev. F. C. Nickerson, pastor; Rev. T. G. Craft, Methodist minister; and Dennis P. Ratliff, Haskell attorney who gave a special tribute to Mr. Fields; and A. C. Pierson, an intimate business associate of the deceased. Interment was in Willow Cemetery under the direction of Holten Funeral Home. James Upton Fields was born Nov. 23, 1869, near Marshall, Texas, the son of the late Capt. and Mrs. W. W. Fields. He came from Kaufman county to Haskell in 1890, and as a young man entered the business field with his father in this city. Mr. Fields became one of the city's most prominent merchants, and was engaged in the grocery business here in the same location for 45 years, until his retirement several years ago. Mr. Fields was married to Miss Florence Baldwin of Honey Grove May 21, 1910. Mrs. Fields is an outstanding club woman, and is a past president of the Texas Federation of Women's Clubs. A leader in business activities of the county for almost 60 years, Mr. Fields also held a keen interest in the civic affairs and the encouragement and development of the section as a farming area. For many years he was a director in the Haskell National Bank.

His predominating interest, however, was the development of the soil, and he became the owner of extensive farmland holdings in the county. During his long career he was always eager to encourage and willing to help those who came to this section to develop and establish farms. A civic minded citizen, he took an active part in promotion of any worthy undertaking which was for the betterment of his community. He was instrumental in securing the first paving done in Haskell, working with a small group of business associates to inaugurate and promote the improvement project. Mr. Fields is survived by his widow; one sister, Mrs. Annie Parish of Haskell; and one brother, H. E. Fields of Dallas. Active pallbearers were named from his former friends, and included: Willard Mitchell, Rochester; C. A. Wheeler, Bill Cochran, Leon Burson, Nathan Foster, Jersey Walker, Milton Walker, Paul Cochran.

Warning Sounded Against Dumping Trash On Roads

Dumping of cans, bottles and other rubbish along the right of way and bar ditches of rural roads in the county, especially in Precinct No. 1 resulted in a warning request from Commissioner A. C. (Pete) Sego that the practice be stopped. "It is a violation of State laws to dump rubbish on a public road, and a severe penalty can be imposed if the complaint is filed against a violator," Commissioner Sego said, in asking cooperation of the people in helping keep the roadways free from rubbish. He also said that some instances of plowing in the right of way on roads adjacent to unfenced fields had occurred in his precinct. This often causes undue expense to the precinct in rebuilding grades on the roads, and Commissioner Sego calls attention to this damaging practice in the hope that it will be stopped.

Haskell residents keeping hogs on their premises will be given "reasonable time" to sell or otherwise dispose of the animals in compliance with the ordinance, Mayor Hunt said this week.

Two Men and Boy Implicated In Egg Theft Here

Two Haskell men, who officers said were implicated in the theft of several cases of eggs from a local produce concern Tuesday night of last week, have been released under \$500 bond each to await action of the Grand Jury. Court officials said that a 14-year-old boy, also implicated in the burglary and theft, had been remanded to the custody of his mother to await possible action of juvenile authorities. Investigation by the Sheriff's department revealed that the eggs stolen from the Haskell concern were sold to a Mineral Wells produce house Wednesday.

Aspermont Man Is Fined \$500 For Hauling Beer

The cargo of 63 cases of beer being hauled in a light pickup truck was confiscated, and an Aspermont man driving the vehicle was fined \$500 and costs Saturday, after he had entered a plea of guilty to transporting beer in a dry territory when arraigned before County Judge Alfred Turnbow. Total fine and costs amounted \$522.20. The Stonewall county man was arrested about 3:30 a. m. Saturday by Sheriff Bob Cousins in a short distance from town on the Haskell-Rule highway.

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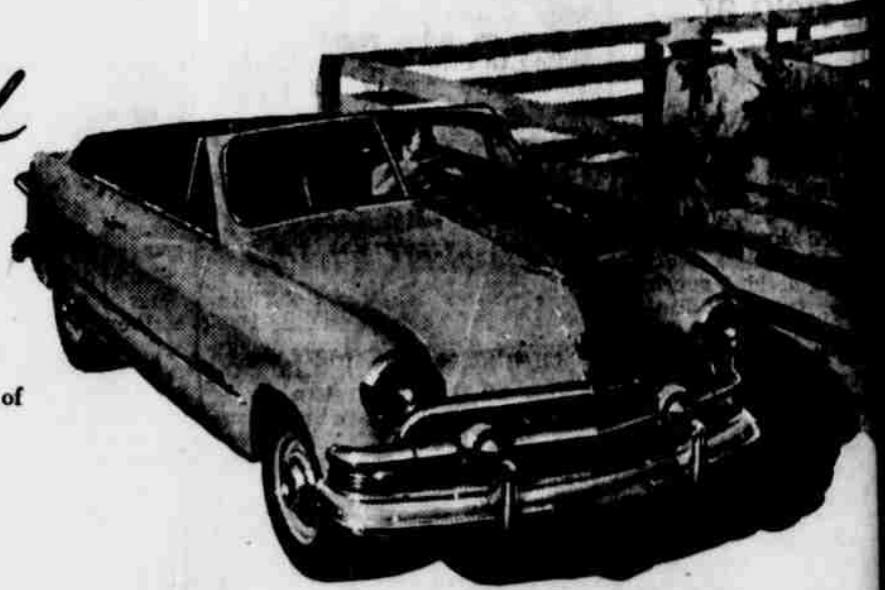

C. R. Chamberlain, Goree Postmaster, Is Accident Victim

Cecil R. (Buster) Chamberlain, Goree postmaster and also president of the Goree school board, was accidentally killed on Saturday afternoon when a piece of a dragline machine broke while volunteer workers were changing the location of poles of the lighted football field.

Mr. Chamberlain, 37, died instantly when struck on the head by the piece of broken equipment. The accident occurred about 2 p. m.

Injured and later hospitalized at Seymour was F. O. Sturgeon, 26, REA employe at Seymour, who suffered bruises of the back and hip and a small laceration of the neck.

Mrs. Chamberlain, at home taking a nap when Chamberlain left the house to join the group at the school grounds, was awakened by carriers of the message that he had been killed. Her husband had been gone only a few minutes.

A doctor two blocks away when Chamberlain was hit, quickly summoned to the scene, said that death had been instantaneous.

Chamberlain had been postmaster at Goree since 1944. Previous to his appointment he had been bookkeeper for the Pendleton Gin.

He was born near Goree and had lived all his life in that vicinity. His father, M. T. Chamberlain of Munday, is county clerk of Knox County, officing in the courthouse at Benjamin.

Other men at the scene said that several screamed a warning when they saw the machinery was a high wind and apparently they were not heard.

Chamberlain was standing near the base of the machine.

Survivors are his wife and two sons, Keith, 13, and Gaylon, 10; three brothers, Pete Chamberlain of Dallas, Jimmy Chamberlain of Kansas City, Mo., and D. G. Chamberlain a student at North Texas State College in Denton; four sisters, Mrs. Athlene Martin, civil service employe in Wichita Falls; Mrs. Merle Moore of Goree; Mrs. Avis Denton of Dickens and Mrs. Edna Pearl Maddox of Oklahoma City; and his parents, Mr. and Mrs. M. T. Chamberlain.

Funeral services will be held at 2 p. m. Saturday at the First Baptist church, with burial in the Goree cemetery.

Chief Urges Fire Check-Up In Stores During Observance of Clean-Up Week

A fire check-up for a store is important as a periodic physical examination for an individual. Fire Chief Ray Lusk said today in urging business men to join in the city-wide observance of Spring Clean-Up Week in Haskell, which will begin Monday, May 7.

"Trouble spots in a store are easy to discover, and some serious fire hazards can be corrected in a few minutes time," he said. "Those few minutes invested in safety can often save a business from bankruptcy."

The Fire Chief offered local merchants this eight-point program for a fire-safety inspection:

1. Clean out basements or storage rooms to get rid of combustible rubbish.
2. Use covered metal bins for rags and packing materials.
3. Store flammable liquids in bulk in metal cabinets, fire-resistant rooms, or outside the building.
4. Get an experienced electrician to check your wiring, and have him check wiring periodically.
5. Replace worn extension cords.
6. Have air conditioning systems checked or inspected before placing them in use for the summer.

7. Work out a "safe smoking" plan with your employes to prevent needless fires.

8. Inspect your shop or store carefully before leaving for the day. Many serious fires break out when the store is closed.
