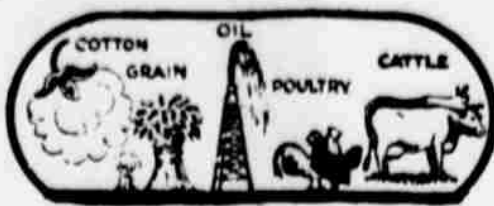

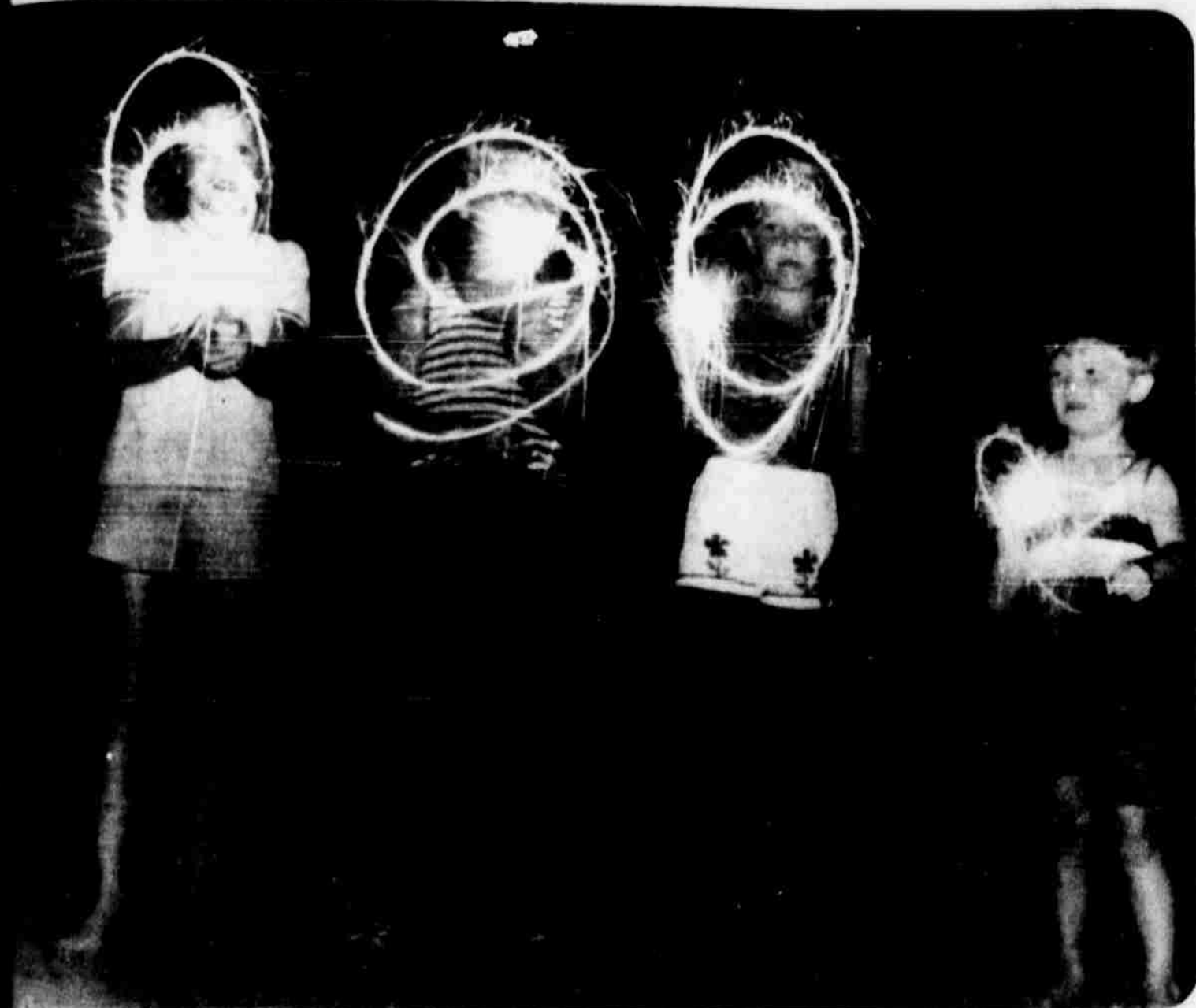

Phone Rate Increase Request Tabled By City Councilmen

To grant or not to grant was the major question before members of the City Council Tuesday during their regular meeting. After over two and a half hours of discussion the question was tabled until the next council meeting.

Most of the business meeting was spent discussing a proposed rate increase requested by General Telephone in Haskell. Rule, Rochester, and Weinert.

Last fall the increase was requested and members of the City Council felt that they did not understand the information presented to them by General Telephone so they hired Bryan Sloan, a certified public accountant from Austin to conduct a study concerning the increase.

In his report, completed July 5, Sloan said, "It is recommended no increase in present rates be granted".

The twelve page report contains seven pages of written explanation and five pages of schedules.

Mayor Duncan introduced Jerry Kehoe, district manager of General Telephone, and asked for comments.

Kehoe introduced three of the company representatives from San Angelo, Mike

Billings, revenue and earnings manager; Bobby Baucom, studies manager; and Steve Holt, associate general counciler.

Billings began his comments on the report filed by Sloan by saying, "I think Mr. Sloan's report is totally bias, totally inaccurate, and totally unfair".

The phone company officials then pointed out particular points in the report and explained why they considered them unfair. Most of the discussion was limited to phone company officials and Sloan.

Several times during the discussion the arguments became heated and at one point someone said that only Sloan and the men from the phone company understood what was being said.

The vast portion of the comment was very technical and dealt with accounting procedures.

Representing Rule City Council at the meeting was James Moore, Kenny Tanner, and W. G. Bishop. Weinert Mayor J. E. Jetton and Weinert City Secretary H. M. Walker, Rochester Mayor Alton Byrd, V. A. Mitchell, and O. R. Cox, both of

Rochester, also attended the meeting to hear arguments on the rate increase.

In other council action Shelby Johnson met with members to discuss the location of a part of his house which is in the street.

Members of the council opened bids on a tractor shredder and accepted the bid submitted from Hale Farm Supply of \$5,332.83.

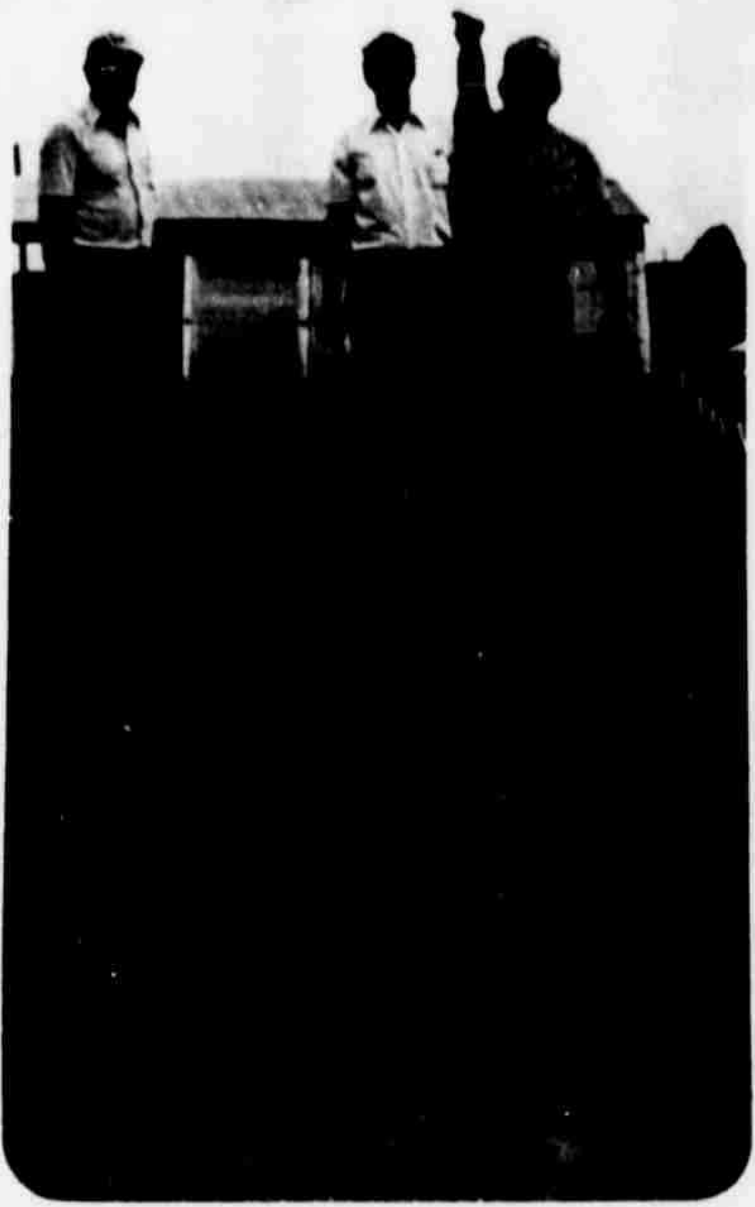

PROFITS AFFECTED
MANAGEMENT

The manager conveys responsibilities in business. You, as a co-operator, are no different. The concept of profit always indicates that the manager's profits depend on his decisions. They apply to the farm as well as to the merchant, hardware and farm supply business. The manager must recognize the problem. As said to exist if it is felt difficult, but the problem may not be difficult if it is felt. For lack of income may be difficult, but the manager may lie deep within himself or even with the pattern of the

you make.
5. Act and supervise. You, as manager, must be properly motivated before you take any action. Many intelligent and clever people fail because they are unable or unwilling to make decisions and take action.

6. Evaluate and assume responsibility. A problem is never really solved until the results of decisions have been evaluated. This may not come until a year or so after decisions have been put into practice. The results generally show up as changes in production, income, net worth, or some other section of your record-keeping procedures.

How well do you as a manager follow these steps in your management decisions. All managers do, but some spend more time on some steps than others. As you review the management process think of which steps you would seek for improvement. Your operations may become more profitable.

Planning your farm, and farming your plan is a part of management. Let your SCS technician help you with your farm problems. He is trained to analyze problems, offer alternatives, then help you to implement your decisions.

Crop Reports Are Needed From Farmers

In early July, approximately 25,000 Texas Farmers will receive an acreage and production questionnaire from Charles Caudill, Agricultural Statistician for the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service, Austin, Texas.

Information from this survey will be used to determine harvested acreage and production of early harvested crops for the state of Texas and for each county. Farmers who receive questionnaires are urged to complete and return them by mail. All individual reports are confidential and will be used only for state and county totals.

This survey is a cooperative effort of the USDA's Statistical Reporting Service and the Texas Department of Agriculture.

According to J. C. Yearly, Jr., District Conservationist

for Haskell County, assisting the California Creek and Wichita-Brazos Soil and Water Conservation Districts. Soil Conservation Service personnel will be glad to assist you in making your report. Please contact them if you need help. Yearly urged all Haskell County farmers and ranchers receiving one of these questionnaires to complete it as promptly as possible and return it as directed.

"This information is vitally needed for Haskell County's portion of the report to be as accurate as possible", Yearly concluded.

Savings Bond Report

May sales of Series E and H United States Savings Bonds amounting to \$5,026 in Haskell County were reported today by County Bond Chairman R. W. Herren. Sales for the five-month period totaled \$30,716 for 19% of the 1975 sales goal of \$165,000.

Sales in Texas during the month were \$19,223,287 while the year-to-date sales totaled

\$101,591,941 with 43% of the \$234.3 million 1975 sales goal achieved.

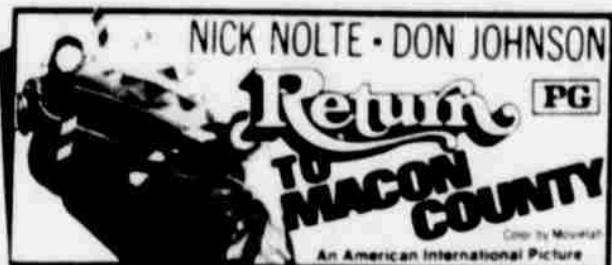

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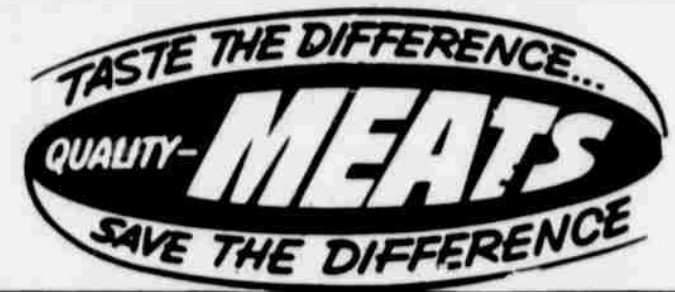

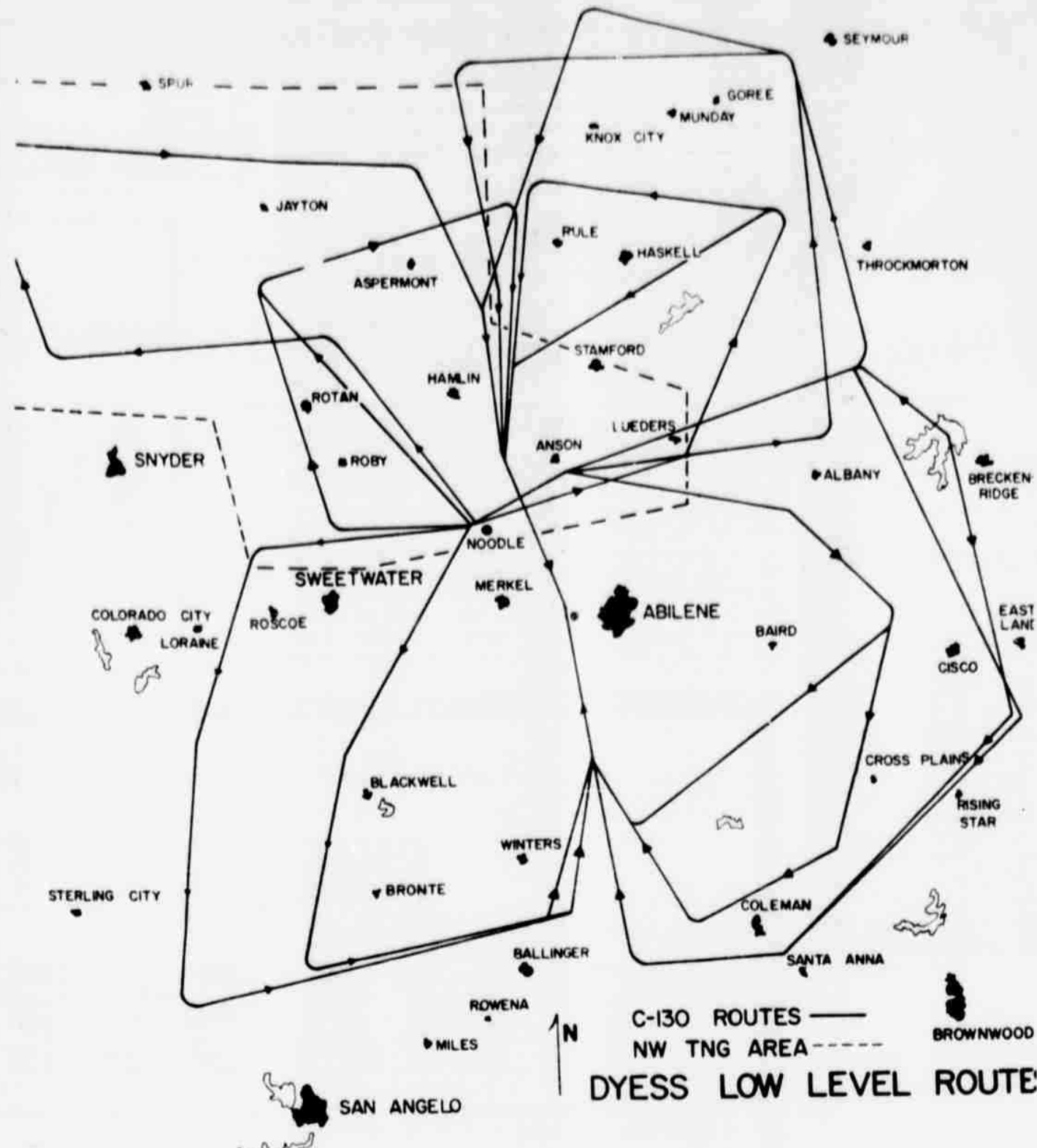

New Flight Routes Include Haskell County

The 463rd Tactical Airlift Wing (TAW) at Dyess AFB, has announced the establishment of a Northwestern Training Area and changes in two of the low-level routes flown frequently by the wing's C-130 turboprop aircraft for practice of all types of airlift operations. Lieutenant Colonel Ben Benigno, chief of weapons and tactics for the 463rd TAW, said that the two low-level

routes were modified to control noise and reduce flight hazards. They are established over sparsely populated areas as much as possible to provide minimum disturbance of farms, ranches and communities. The low-level routes and training areas are approved by the wing's higher headquarters and under normal circumstances bypass towns, resorts, hatcheries, stocker pens, and local airports.

following counties: Knox, Haskell, Stonewall, Throckmorton, Shackelford, Baylor, Garza, Scurry, Fisher, Jones, Stephens, Mitchell, Nolan, Taylor, Coke, Callahan, Eastland, Runnels, Coleman, Brown, Tom Green, Comanche, Mills, and Hamilton. The 463rd TAW uses the low-level

areas along with high-speed jet aircraft from other southwestern bases. The jets also conduct low-level missions but along different routes.

"Opening of the Training Area northwest of Abilene is an addition to the normal low-level routes which have been used all around Abilene for years," said Lt. Col. Benigno. "When we fly the specified low-level routes we stick to the preplanned route. In the new training area we may fly from point to point without regard to an established route. Use of this area allows our aircrews to practice avoidance tactics and threat control when we simulate surface to air missiles, fighter aircraft, and small arms fire along preplanned routes in the area," he added. Low-level flights may be scheduled between 8 a.m. and midnight, Monday through Friday, and occasionally on weekends. Daylight missions are flown at 500 feet altitude. Night flights are conducted at least 1,000 feet above any obstacle. Airspeeds in the 463rd's four-engine, propeller-driven aircraft will vary from 150 to 290 miles per hour. Training flights of the 463rd TAW will be over the
