

Science degree. The new degree is not recommended for students who intend to transfer into a four-year degree program, Dr. Ben Brock, WTC vice president said. It may be earned by students who "amplete a minimum of 62 semester hours in courses selected from the total curricular offerings of the college. There will be guidelines for the degree and college counselors will work with students in selecting courses to be applied toward the degree.

#### Four Accidents Investigated

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated four accidents on rural highways in Haskell County during the month of September, 1975, according to Sergeant Frank Jircik, Highway Patrol supervisor of this

These crashes resulted in no persons killed and one person injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first nine months of 1975 shows a total of 35 accidents resulting in three persons killed and 25 persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for September, 1975, shows a total of 551 accidents resulting in 29 persons killed and 314 persons injured, as compared to September, 1974, with 471 accidents resulting in 17 persons killed and 213 persons injured. This was 80 more accidents, 12 more killed, and 101 more injured in 1975 at the same period of time.

The 29 traffic deaths for the month of September 1975, occurred in the following counties: Six in Wise; three each in Donley and Moore; Two each in Archer, Floyd, Lynn, and Gray; and one each in Jack, Lamb, Lubbock. Wichita, Young, Castro, Potter, Sherman, and Wheeler.

Environmental Pollution. That's the big topic today. On the street corner, in school, at the office, out on the farm ...even in the White House. Did something happen in the last year or so to suddenly cause "Pollution?" Of course not. Pollution is at least as old as man. However, it's probably true that some factors in the environmental situation have become much more obvious during recent years. In too many cases, pollution has been the by-product of progress.

The pollution that has resulted from our quest for a more civilized existence has come in part from our desire to have the very best of

everything, at the least possible cost. So, if we wanted a new and better product, we concentrated on making one. Such goals are no longer adequate. Our health and the health of other living creatures, the air, water, food and land we need for life, and the very climate that surrounds us must receive closer attention.

What about agriculture? How has the agricultural community contributed to environmental contamination and what is it doing to correct it? Basically, agricultural pollution could occur from four areas: soil erosion, fertilizers, animal wastes and pesticides.

Perhaps you never thought of soil erosion as an area of

agricultural pollution, but uncontrolled water runoff can sap the nutrients and productivity of our fields, accumulating sediments in reservoirs and contaminating water supplies. Yet since the creation of the Soil Conservation Service during the Dust Bowl days of the 30's, close cooperation between government and agriculture has helped to cure this once major source of agricultural pollution. Continued education, soil and water conservation practices, and inspired farm management have all played a role in controlling soil erosion.

Fertilizers and pesticides have been under attack for some time now. It is said that when large amounts of fertilizers are used, nitrates and phosphates percolate through the soil, contaminating our streams and rivers. But, little is said about the nitrates and phosphates from detergents. municipal and industrial wastes, that run almost directly into our lakes and

While tending livestock may have been the very first agricultural practice, the waste disposal problems of the giant feedlots are a very new problem. Even with the depressed cattle markets of today, government and commercial research efforts are still being carried on for a solution to this agricultural pollution problem.

Pesticides, another of agricultures needed tools, is constantly under attack. To insure consumer safety, Government requires industry to conduct 7-10 year lab and field tests, on all new chemicals before they can be sold and used. Without effective modern pesticides to control agricultural pests, crop and livestock production would drop by 40%.

Whatever the source of our environmental ills, the solution will lie in broad-purpose planning and use of our agricultural facilities. If you need assistance in controlling soil erosion on your land or don't know just how much fertilizer you need apply or you need assistance of another type, contact your SWCD Director or your Soil Conservation Service Technician.

There are 23 Mental Health-Mental Retardation Centers in programs. Texas and more planning is being done to serve the 330,000 mentally retarded persons residing in Texas on a Regional basis.

Community and Regional MH-MR Centers, under the supervision of the Texas Department of Mental Health-Mental Retardation (TDM HMR), are financed by combinations of local state, and federal funds. In addition to specialized medical and psychiatric services, some centers also provide special educational services, self-help and social development training. vocational training, sheltered workshop training and counselling for the family and parents of the mentally retarded. Through such community centers, the State's mentally retarded persons can be evaluated and placed in training programs within the community.

Diagnostic and Evaluation services are also necessary for placement of persons in one of the Texas (state's) 10 special schools. Extensive tests are given to determine I.O., behavior patterns and acquired skills. The family is interviewed and all available date gathered. This information is then evaluated to determine the proper placement for the retarded person.

It has become increasingly clear that while institutions can offer an important service. they can reach only a small per cent of the population of retarded persons of Texas. It is up to the community mental retardation centers to take the lead in providing services of all types.

With proper diagnosis of a retarded person's needs, he often can be given adequate training within his own community through special education programs in public schools, etc.
