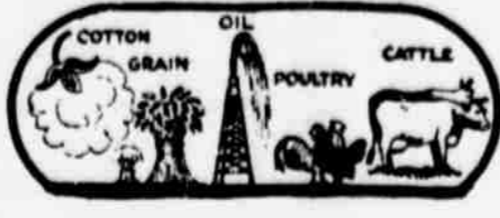

School Board Accepts Plans For Ag Building

Members of the board of trustees of the Haskell Independent School District met Tuesday night and voted to ask for bids on a new vocational agriculture building.

Plans for the building, which would be located between the band hall and the gym, were approved. Bill Cantrell of Lubbock, presented the plans to the board

members and stated that two different types of buildings were included in the plans. The first type was a concrete block building with a brick front and the second was a metal building with brick front.

Bids on the proposed building will be opened May 6, at 6:30 p.m.

In other action board members elected officers for the following year. They include: president, Charles McCauley; vice-president, Elbert Johnson; and secretary, Becky Richardson.

After canvassing the votes from the school board election held last Saturday it was announced that Becky Richardson received 32 votes and Kenneth Lane and Raymond Andrada each received 30 votes. All three were re-elected to the board.

Board members also voted to purchase new aluminum bleacher seatboards for the football stands. Cost of the new seats will be \$8,750.00. The decision to replace the present wooden seats with aluminum was made because it is expected to be much less expensive than painting and replacing the wooden seats periodically.

Appointed to serve on the board of equalization for next year was John Kimbrough, Willie Pieser, and Norman Nanny.

Light Vote In County

A light voter turnout was the case in all city and school elections in Haskell County last Saturday.

In the Haskell City Council election Loraine Johnson was re-elected with 43 votes and Guy Kennedy was re-elected with 46 votes.

In the Haskell School Board election Becky Richardson received 32 votes and Kenneth Lane and Raymond Andrada each received 30 votes. No write in votes were cast and all three were re-elected.

Rule voters elected Kenny Tanner, Larry Dennis and Lavon Beakley to the City Council. Tanner received 94 votes, Dennis received 88 and Beakley received 79. Incumbent Beakley received one more vote than Barry Hobbs to retain his seat on the council. Boyd Baird received 65 votes in that election.

Weldon Norman was elected Mayor of Rule with 81 votes to fulfill a one-year unexpired term of Roy Dean, who resigned the post. Herbert Rinn received 20 write-in votes in that election and R. C. Pool received 14. Seven other candidates received a total of 13 write-in votes for mayor.

In the Rule School board election two incumbents were re-elected. Sam Turner and Lee Roy Wilson each received 56 votes.

GED Tests Set April 19 In Rule

General Educational Development Tests will be given in Rule High School, Saturday, April 19th at 8:00 a. m.

Five tests will be given in English, Literature, Social Studies, Science and Mathematics. If a person passes these five tests, the Texas Education Agency will issue a High School Equivalency Diploma. This diploma meets the educational requirement for employment as well as partial requirement for College entrance or job training schools.

A fee of \$15. is charged for all five tests and it takes about two hours for each test. A person must be eighteen (or at least 17 years old) and has been out of school one full calendar year. If a person is seventeen when the tests are taken the diploma will not be issued until the person is eighteen.

Take advantage of sales. Avoid overstocking with commercially frozen food that's always available. Use your freezer as your own bargain counter and store foods you can buy on sale. But do allow space for short time baked goods, leftovers and special party foods.

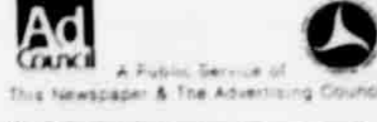
Savings Bond Report

**SHARING FUNDS
RELEASED**

Conservation cost-sharing programs administered by Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service have been announced. The programs had been requested by the President and approved for them by Congress. The programs are within the allotted and the programs are funded by ASCS.

Farmers can now apply for up to \$1 million in Water Conservation Grants, \$15 million in Conservation Grants, and \$190 million in Conservation Cost-Shares under the Agricultural Conservation Program. Of the latter \$100 million is for Conservation Practices, \$25 million for long-term conservation, and \$65 million for new 1975 long-term conservation. All funds are to be used to meet federal obligations for the life of the program and will be set aside for the procedure similar to that in the Great Conservation Program. Activities for district conservation in the programs are strengthened by the use of procedures recommended by the District Planning Committee. Regulations of the Agriculture called representatives of conservationists to be invited to ASCS County Development Groups

**Correct Address Needed
On Driver's License**

The Texas Department of Public Safety advises that all Texas drivers should examine their Texas drivers license to verify that the address on their license is correct.

If his address is incorrect, it will be necessary to contact the local Drivers License Office as soon as possible. It is a misdemeanor offense for not changing your address within 10 days after moving. This particular law is going to be enforced more strictly in the future. The procedure for changing an address on a license is to have a duplicate license made with a new picture and a \$1.00 fee. The Drivers License Law, V.C.S. 66876, Sec. 20, states that whenever any person after applying for or receiving an Operator's, Commercial Operator's or Chauffeur's license shall move from the address named in such application or in the license issued to him or when the

name of the licensee is changed by marriage or other wise, such person shall within ten (10) days thereafter notify the Department in writing of his old and new addresses or of such former and new names, of the number of any license then held by him, and such person shall apply for a duplicate license as set out in Section 14.

Section 14 states that in the event that an Operator's, Commercial Operator's or

Chauffeur's license issued under the provisions of this Act is lost, destroyed or there is a change in pertinent information, the person to whom the same was issued may obtain a duplicate or correction thereof upon furnishing proof satisfactory to the Department that such permit or license was lost or destroyed or upon the supplying of the required information which has changed, together with proof acceptable to the Department supporting such change, and upon the payment of a fee of one dollar (\$1.00).
