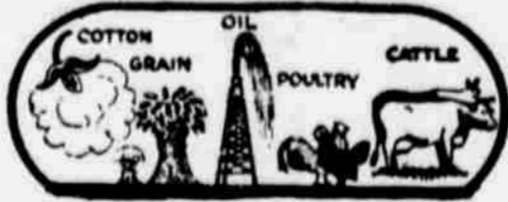

Rochester Loses Heartbreaker

Area football fans were in for a treat here Friday night as the Rochester Steers and the Gorman Panthers played to a 21-21 tie. The game was so close that it went down the wire to first downs before the winner could be named. Each team had three penetrations and Gorman ended up with 17 first downs to Rochester's 14.

It is hard to lose a game of this type, but you can't have two winners. It was one of the best games we have seen all season.

Gorman took the opening kickoff and picked up three first downs before having to give the ball up on a fourth down punt. On the first play for Rochester, halfback Rocky

Holmestook a handoff from brother Brian and covered 66 yards through a big hole in the middle of the line. Four plays later Jerry Don Hudgens crossed the goal line from the one to put the Steers on the score board. PAT failed.

This was the only score in the first period. It was a defensive battle. The Steers picked up four first downs and the Panthers picked up five.

The Steers started the second quarter with a bang and on the third play B. Holmes hit John Michaels for a 19 yard pass and six more points. Rod Townsend crossed

up the middle for two extra points, giving the Steers a 14-0 edge.

But the Panthers did not give up, with 5:00 left in the period James Webb traveled from the six for six. PAT failed. Score at halftime was 14-6 Rochester. The Steers had 6 first downs and the Panthers had 12 for the first half.

With 7:33 left in the third quarter the Panthers started a drive on the 49 and moved the ball to the 27 in six plays. James Webb scored on a 27 yard run. Billy Burgess carried the ball over for the two points tying the game 14-14.

The Steers came back with 10:00 left in the final period and Brian Holmes ran from the 1 to put the Steers ahead again. Derryl Howard kicked the extra point.

The Steers fumbled the ball and the Panthers took over. With 2:45 left Burgess ran from the 1 for six more points. Stacy Webb kicked the extra point. Tying the game 21-21.

G. E. D. Tests Set At Rule

General Educational Development Tests will be given in Rule High School Saturday Dec. 6th at 8:00 a.m.

Five tests will be given in English, Literature, Social Studies, Science and Mathematics. If a person passes these five tests, the Texas Education Agency will issue a High School Equivalency Diploma. This diploma meets the educational requirement for employment as well as partial requirement for College entrance or job training schools.

A fee of \$15 is charged for all five tests and it takes about two hours for each test. A person must be eighteen (or at least 17 years old) and has been out of school one full calendar year. If a person is seventeen when the tests are taken the diploma will not be issued until the person is eighteen.

Mental Retardation

Editor—This is the eighth in a series of articles about Mental Retardation prepared by Mrs. Eugene Cochran and the Public Education Committee of the Texas Association for Retarded Citizens.

The Association for Retarded Citizens is a volunteer organization of parents, interested citizens and professional persons interested in promoting programs and services to help the mentally retarded. Begun in the late 1940's and early 1950's, Associations for Retarded Citizens (noted in this series as ARC'S), now number more than 1700 chapters and have in excess of one quarter million members, currently. As noted in the title, the organization is interested in all mentally retarded persons regardless of age, race, or place of residence. ARC'S began a program of public awareness and understanding in a day when few knew of the problems of mental retardation - most confused the condition with mental illness and many felt the retarded citizens were "hopeless".

Through the efforts of ARC'S at the state (Texas ARC) and national (NARC) levels (which are comprised of representatives from Local ARC'S), much has been done to begin new programs and enact laws of benefit to these handicapped citizens. Many services such as pre-school, day care, and special education in communities throughout the nation were begun by local associations.

ARC'S depend on the interest, support and financial contributions of citizens throughout the nation to accomplish their goal of seeing that all the mentally retarded are served and helped. Texas now has more than 80 local Associations for Retarded Citizens in communities throughout the state that are working to see that Texas' 330,000 retarded citizens will have a brighter tomorrow.

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Haskell Bicentennial Happenings

A group of Students at Haskell High School will have good reason to remember the 200th birthday of our country in years to come since they are about to complete two semesters of work preparing Bicentennial notebooks.

The students, who are Sophomores, were given the assignment by Mrs. Brooks Middleton, their English II teacher, and I went last week to look at the notebooks after Chris Childress told me about them.

Mrs. Middleton had told me to come during a certain period when no class would be in the room, but I got so interested and absorbed in looking and reading that when the next class came Mrs. Middleton very kindly found me an empty room and moved the notebooks so I could keep looking!

The thing that made this such an important assignment, it seemed to me, is that it combined English and Geography and History so that even the poorest student should get something from it. The teacher said the students were told that the only criteria to be applied was to be: Will what you have collected and assembled be meaningful to anyone later?

Every aspect of the Bicentennial celebration seems to have been covered: the reason for it, how different communities are observing it, individuals involved in events, the structure of the government of our country, and so on.

Each student was assigned a state and encouraged to learn everything he could about it, its location in relation to surrounding states, its entrance into the Union and all were urged to write authorities in that state for information.

All the students included clippings from some of the most logical sources such as the Abilene Reporter-News, Reader's Digest, and Folklore and Historical magazines. It was nice to see several "Bicentennial Happenings" from the Haskell Free Press preserved for posterity! There were Steak House place mats and Bicentennial book covers and advertisements from every conceivable source - anything that pertained to the Bicentennial.

Because of the length of time spent on this project, one can understand why most of the notebooks are very thick, some with so many pages they are difficult to move around. I wish I could write something about every single one of them but I would have been there all day and half the night!

What I do think a good idea would be to have a gigantic Bicentennial Fair next Spring and have the work of all these students displayed, along with Arts and Crafts created by individuals this year, plus historical items of interest in Haskell County.

I am mentioning only a few names because of space limitation, but I think the whole class and their teacher deserves credit for the project.

David Huss used several

beautiful color pictures depicting Bicentennial or Colonial scenes with accompanying printed material such as "Paul Revere's Ride" and "Maxims From Poor Richard".

In her pages on the individual states Jeanette Randle used a lot of originality as she painted the flag across the state being highlighted, very effectively calling attention to it.

Jimmy Browning's notebook reflected a Boy Scout background, with much patriotic material, including a copy of "How To Respect and Display Our Flag".

Tami Rea had one of the neatest books and included many articles on Texas history, revealing an interest in our own state.

Kelly Clements' first page had a small Bicentennial Flag and going through her book I found a booklet, "Songs of Yesterday" that contained lots of oldies but goodies!

I loved the cover of Birdie Jordan's notebook; it had a big map of Texas with a blue square for Haskell and an Indian picture cut out and pasted on - thus her replica of our own Haskell County-Bicentennial symbol.

Among her clippings there was one of Haskell receiving approval as an official Bicentennial community.

Chris Colbert's book even contains some commemorative coins and quite extensive "Great Moments in United States Military History".

Sarah Cortez alternated her pages of red, white, and blue construction paper and had some interesting articles of U.S. History, including one with pictures of the American soldier's uniform from the Revolution to the present.

A booklet, "How We Elect Our President" was included in Gary Thomas' notebook along with a Reporter-News review of the Bicentennial production of the play "1776" at Abilene Christian College.

Also an article, "Homeland of the Choctaw", which I dared not pass up since this Indian tribe is included in my ancestry - sure enough, the story affirmed much of the histry as my family has known it!

An outstanding notebook was assembled by Liz Wilson who used her own very good art work and original poetry in addition to a great variety of other materials.

Her pages all had titles such as "God and Our Country," "The Press and The American Revolution" and, among many others, "Alaska, Rising Northern Star". Liz's family moved to Haskell from Alaska and she devoted space to pictures of its scenery and information about the state.

One picture she included which I think speaks volumes is one of the Liberty Bell with the caption, "200 Years At The Same Location".

A notebook that will surely be treasured was made by Kim Campbell, who not only is helping to keep the history of our country alive, but the history of her family as well. I was amazed at the way she had collected and assimilated

so much material, including photographs.

One very interesting piece of family history she included is a copy of a letter from her great, great, great grandfather to his wife. Dated April 27, 1862, it was the last she received from him before his death 64 days later in a Civil War Battle near Richmond, Virginia. The original letter is in the United Daughters of the Confederacy museum in Austin.

To all you students whose names I didn't mention: I love you; it's simply that I just couldn't write it all down!

The last page in someone's notebook had a large sign printed: "Get Caught Up In the Spirit of '76. Think How Honored You Are To Be Able To Say: I Am An American. During This Bicentennial Year".

And so should we all be.

Klose Attends TNHA Conv.

Ruth Ann Klose, representing Rice Springs Care Home of Haskell joined colleagues in Ft. Worth last week for the 25th Annual Convention of the Texas Nursing Home Association.

While there she attended four sessions of lectures to earn six official hours of credit toward the continuing education requirements of the Texas Board of Licensing for Nursing Home Administrators. The classes, supervised by the Distributive Education Department Industrial and Business Training Bureau of the University of Texas at Austin, were based upon the theme "Silver Milestones of Progress" in observance of the founding of TNHA a quarter-century ago.

Keynote speaker for the occasion was Bill Clayton of Springlake, Texas, Speaker of the Texas House of Representatives. Faculty for the study sessions included Lewis Timberlake, president of Decision Dynamics, Inc., a nationwide concern specializing in motivation techniques, based at Austin, Texas, Carl F. Page, M.D., director of the Division of Geriatrics at the Texas Tech University School of Medicine, and Philip A. Gates, M.D., Deputy Commissioner of Medical Programs of the Texas State Department of Welfare.

Educational displays in the Hall of Exhibits at the Tarrant County Convention Center numbered more than 90, each related to the newest equipment and innovative techniques for the long-term care profession.

The House of Delegates of TNHA, of which Mrs. Klose is a member, elected a slate of officers headed by Doug Pendergras of Austin as the new president. An Installation banquet at the Ft. Worth Sheraton concluded the Silver Anniversary observance.

Texas Nursing Home Association, which reached its peak membership this year, has 610 member facilities with a total of over 54,000 licensed beds, making the State group second in size in the entire nation. Over 1100 members registered at the convention.

Mrs. Klose was accompanied by her husband, Elton. During the awards presentation, she received the 20-year service award for Corbie Johnston White who was unable to attend.

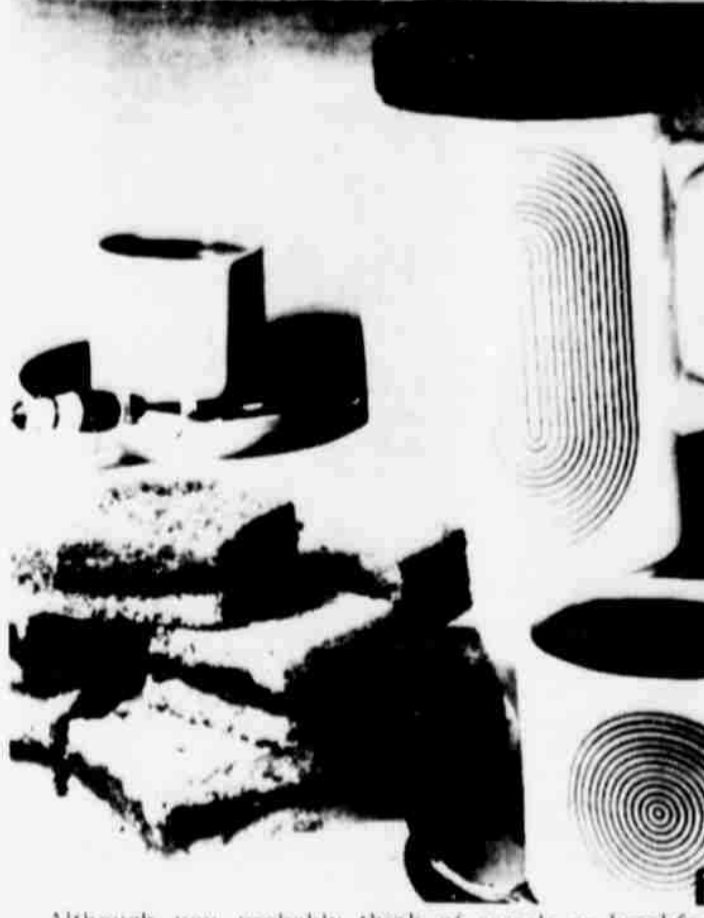

In another bowl, combine next six ingredients; cut in 6 tablespoons butter or margarine. Press half of cereal mixture firmly into the bottom of a greased 8-inch square baking pan. Top with apricot mixture, spreading evenly. Cover with remaining cereal mixture and press down firmly. Dot with remaining butter or margarine. Bake in a preheated moderate oven (375°F.) 40 to 45 minutes, or until lightly browned. Serve warm or cooled with ice cream, if desired. Makes 16 (about 2-inch) squares.

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TFB To Hold Annual Meet

SAN ANTONIO—Some 1,500 persons, including more than 1,000 voting delegates, are expected to attend the 42nd annual meeting of the Texas Farm Bureau at the Convention Center here Nov. 30-Dec. 3.

Highlighting the convention will be an address by Gov. Dolph Briscoe at the general session on Monday morning, Dec. 1. TFB President Carrol Chaloupka of Dalhart will also speak at the session.

Policies to guide the state's largest general farm organization next year and recommendations on national policies will be adopted during the final two days of the meeting. Election of directors and president will be the final order of business.

The Texas Farm Bureau has 180,470 member families in 210 organized county Farm Bureaus. The number of voting delegates from a county is based on the total number of members in that county.

The convention will get under way with registration beginning at 2 p.m., Sunday, Nov. 30 in the Convention Theater Lobby.

The Vesper Service, which traditionally opens the TFB annual meeting, will be held at 6 p.m. that day, featuring the Providence High School Choral Group from San Antonio. Speaker will be Rev. Delmas L. Luedke, pastor of Hope Lutheran Church in San Antonio. He was recently named Texas' 1975 "Rural Minister of the Year."

District finalists will compete in a state Discussion Meet that evening with the winner representing Texas at the annual meeting of the American Farm Bureau Federation in January in St. Louis.

The state finals of the TFB Talent Find will be held immediately following the Discussion Meet. A representative from this competition will be selected to perform at the national meeting in St. Louis.

The Monday morning general session, which features speeches by the Governor and the TFB president, will also include a report by Reed Lang of Rio Hondo, TFB secretary-treasurer.

The First Lady of Texas, Mrs. Janey S. Briscoe, will speak at a ladies luncheon on Monday at the Hilton Palacio del Rio Hotel.

Seven special conferences are scheduled for 1 p.m., Monday. These include Livestock and Animal Health,

Community Services, Cotton, Poultry, Wheat and Feed Grains, Rice, and Farm Bureau services.

Summer Job Examination Deadline Set

WASHINGTON, D.C.—Congressman Omar Burleson (D-Tex.) said today that the Civil Service Commission is now receiving applications for the 1976 competitive examination for summer employment with the United States Government. The examination leads to eligibility for appointment to most temporary summer jobs in the clerical field and as aides in engineering and science occupations.

The Commission has announced the filing deadlines. Those who file by December 12 will be tested in January. Those who file by January 16 will be tested in February. No test application postmarked after January 16 will be accepted. The Congressman urges students to file early for the test to enhance their chances for employment.

Complete instructions for filing and information on opportunities available are contained in CSC announcement No. 414, Summer Jobs in Federal Agencies, which may be obtained upon request through Congressman Burleson's Washington Office, 2369 Rayburn House Office Building, Washington, D. C.

29515, or from Federal Job Information Centers, most college placement offices, or from the Civil Service Commission, Washington, D. C. 20415.

The Commission will not automatically send forms to those who qualified in the previous year, and who wish to remain on the lists for consideration in 1976. Those who qualified for summer employment in 1975 must update their applications by submitting a form enclosed in the summer employment announcement by February 27, 1976. They are not required to retake the written test.

The U. S. Postal Service is not participating in the 1976 summer employment examination. Inquires regarding summer employment with the Postal Service should be sent to the post office where employment is desired.
