## Tim Powell, 16, Killed In Crash

Tim Powell, 16, a sophomore at Haskell High School, died Thursday night, March 20, from injuries received in a one-car accident one-tenth of a mile south of Haskell on FM 600.

He was taken from the scene of the accident to Haskell Memorial Hospital and later transferred to Hendrick Memorial Hospital in Abilene where he was dead on arrival at 10:50 p.m.

The accident occurred as he was traveling west on a dirt road which dead-ends into Fm 600. He apparently lost control of the vehicle, crossed Fm 600, went into a wheat field and overturned, according to Highway patrolman Larry Gilbreath, who investigated the accident.

He was the first traffic fatality in Haskell County during 1975.

Services were held Saturday, March 22, in First Baptist Church in Haskell, with the Rev. Tom Robertson, pastor First Baptist Church in Red Springs and the Rev. Robert Brown Sr., pastor of First United Methodist Church in Haskell, officiating.

Burial was in Riverview Cemetery in Seymour directed by Holden-McCauley Funeral Home.

Born November 21, 1958 in Olney, he moved to Haskell with his family from Seymour in 1966.

He was a member of First Baptist Church in Haskell, a member of the Haskell High School FFA Chapter, and participated in Junior Varsity Football at Haskell High School.

Survivors include: his parents, Mr. and Mrs. James Powell, one brother, Sam Powell, all of Haskell, and his paternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. D. L. Powell of Seymour.

He was preceded in death

by one brother, David Neal Powell in 1952.

## Plate Deadline Is Nearing

"Are you plated or belated?"

That's the question motorists may be facing after midnight, April 1st, deadline for motor vehicle registration in Texas. After that time, law enforcement agencies have been instructed to stop motorists not displaying the 1975 plates to remind them of their licensing responsibilities.

Since February 1, county tax offices and selected substations throughout the state have been conducting registration business as usual. Early reports indicate the annual procedure, required of the state's 9.2 million motor vehicle owners, is running smoothly. However, many registrants traditionally wait until the "last minute" to react, resulting in longer lines and necessary delays.

According to a Highway Department spokesman, public response to the new five-year license plate, being issued for the first time in Texas, has been good. In fact, motorists have shown an uncommon interest in the "label" their motor vehicle will wear through 1979.

In lieu of annual replacement, motorists will be issued an adhesive-type sticker beginning in 1976, that will update their plate for another year of driving. The sticker will be placed in the debossed upper left corner of the plate. The following year, the tag will be stuck in the upper right corner to cover the debossed "75", and alternated for the ensuing years. Once in place, the tags cannot be easily removed without deterioration, a part of the plan to discourage vandalism or theft.

County tax offices will continue to issue annual plates to certain classes of motor vehicles. These include radio operators, dealers, government officials and those passenger cars displaying "personalized" plates.

Remember the registration deadline: **MIDNIGHT, APRIL 1ST!**

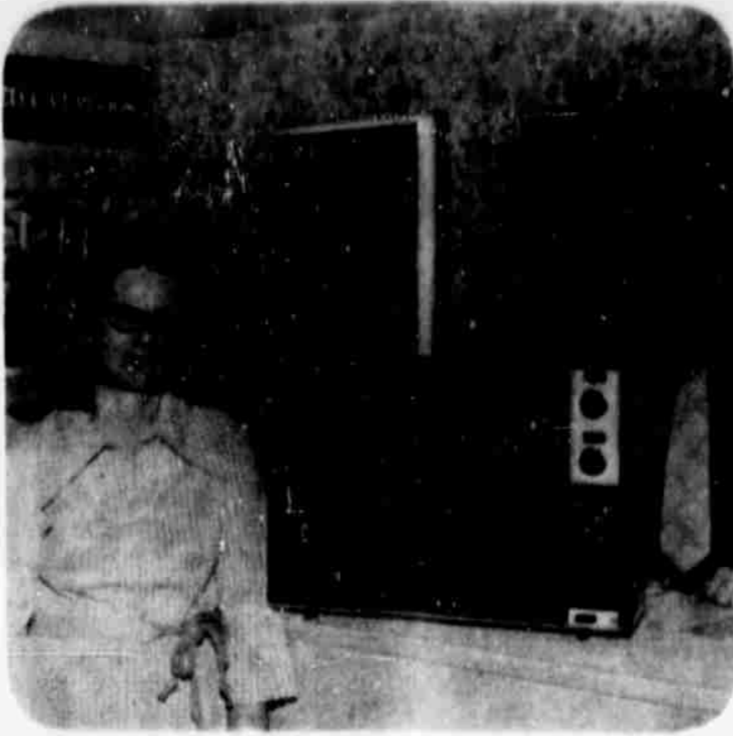

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

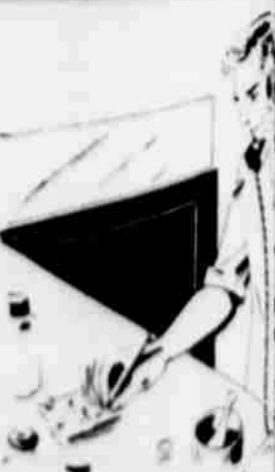

**CONSERVATION  
VIEW POINTS**

J. C. YEARY, JR.

We are again in the three month period of the year (March through May) when the wind blows and the soil goes.

The wind is frequently in excess of twenty miles per hour during the daylight hours and continually bombards the soil surface which is being readied for planting.

Residue from the previous crop has in many cases been destroyed by plowing to the extent that it affords only marginal if any protection from the forceful blast of high winds. Add a hard, quick "shower" to this equation of high winds and unprotected soil and you have the logical end product—a dust storm.

Soil movement by wind has occurred for centuries, as documented by soil scientists in their continuous exploration of soil profiles and studying of soil formations. The problem of wind erosion has multiplied a thousand fold since the advancement of intensified agriculture into the semi-arid

and arid regions of the Great Plains states, about the turn of the twentieth century.

The disastrous effects of soil blowing is best exemplified by the dust bowl of the 1930's and to a lesser extent the 1950's. During both periods we were experiencing an intensive drought across the Great Plains but a drought is not a prerequisite to a dust storm. A drought will intensify the storm and enlarge the area affected but very serious damage can occur in any local area when the three components of the previous mentioned equation are present.

Logic tells us that when the soil surface is covered by growing crops, crop residue or some organic mulch, the soil simply will not blow. It is hard to prepare a seedbed, apply herbicides and plant in all this trash but if we are to save the cream of our soil, we are going to have to improvise.

With the continuing improvement in equipment design along with better herbicides for weed control and a

**Choose Seeds  
With Care**

Attractive seed catalogs and colorful seed packets on store shelves are a great temptation to the impulse buyer. But, vegetable varieties and seed must be selected with great care, emphasizes Max Stapleton, county agent with the Texas Agriculture Extension Service.

Often the success or failure of a garden depends on the kind and variety of vegetables selected. Varieties differ in the time of maturity, quality and disease resistance. Such information is usually noted on seed packets. Some companies also indicate which varieties are best suited for preservation by canning or freezing.

Stapleton recommends choosing varieties with built-in resistance to diseases. This added protection can prevent many problems and assure a better crop. New disease resistant varieties are continually being developed, and
