The program is designed for students of exceptional ability and motivation and consists of three courses, transformation geometry, computers, and probability and statistics.


#### **Open House** Set At **Rice Springs**



ALSTIN-When most perple near the form "consumer protection, they realize that it usually refers to the elimination of traud in the marketplace, sometimes by legal ac-

Our Attorney General's Consumer Protection Division, for example, has a mandate from the Legislature to enforce the Texas Deceptive Trade Practices Consumer Protection Act, which makes any false, misleading, or deceptive business practice il-

But there is another type of consumer protection, too, one that deals not with protection from fraud, but protection from danger-danger from unsafe products. And this type of consumer protection is the responsibility of the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission

Of course our Consumer Protection Division also has the power to take action to stop the sale of unsafe products if they were marketed knowingly. For instance, if a furniture dealer had reason to believe that a particular type of chair was likely to break and cause injury to someone sitting in it, yet sold it anyway without mentioning this, our attorneys could take action because of the deception involved

Or if a toy manufacturer had noticed that a certain toy contained defective parts that might injure a child, yet sold the toy, he or she might be the object of a consumer protec-

Consumer protection in all its forms is important. And consumer protection from unsafe products is a major concern at present Spokesmen for

safe products cause 20 million personal injuries each year. with 110,000 injuries resulting in permanent disability and 30,000 in death

While much of the Commission's work centers around eliminating product hazards, it also provides information to help consumers decide which products may be safer, works to develop product safety standards, and promotes research into causes and prevention of product-related deaths, illnesses, and injuries

The Commission also can issue and enforce safety standards on design, construction. contents, performance. packaging, and labeling of more than 10,000 consumer products ranging from architectural glass, stairs, and power tools, to stoves, ladders, and lawnmowers

A Texas consumer who has a complaint about an unsafe product or who has been injured by a product, should call the agency's Dallas office at 214-353-8260

Once the agency gets a consumer complaint about product safety, it beings to test and evaluate the product. If a safety problem is confirmed, the agency informs the manufacturer who may be expected to notify all purchasers. to repair or replace the product, to refund the purchase price, or even to remove it from sale. Almost all manufacturers are cooperative, but if not, the agency can take legal



death. As a result of 20 outbreaks of foodborne botulism in 1974, involving 30 persons, seven died-five from home-canned foods. USDA is launching a massive information/education campaign to alert consumers to the dangers of improper home canning procedures.

Improper processing may be avoided by following these guidelines:

1. Don't take shortcuts or experiment in Home canning. Use only tested, currently approved methods.

2. Use only jars, cans and lids made especially for home canning. Never use ordinary jars as mayonnaise or coffee

3. Do not reuse sealing lids. The rubber ring deteriorates easily and prevents a tight seal. Get new rings for one-piece lids and new metal

lids with sealing compound for two-piece lids.

4. Do not use overripe food. Products change in chemical composition with age and lose acidity. Make sure the food is good quality, with no bruises or soft spots.

5. Do not overpack foods. Trying to get too much food into one jar may result in under-processing and spoil-

6. Follow exactly the time and temperature specifications for foods and container sizes listed in the instructions. Adjust processing times according to altitude.

7. Test the seal according to instructions.

8. Do not use canned foods showing signs of spoilage. Watch for bulging lids, leaks, off-odors, or mold. If in doubt, don't taste. Destroy out of reach of children and pets.

9. Boil home-canned vegetables, covered, for at least 10 minutes before serving.

10. With tomatoes, follow established, recommended canning procedures closely.

For additional information on home canning and food safety, contact Mrs. Barbara Elliott, Haskell County Home Demonstration Agent. If you live elsewhere than Haskell County, contact your local Extension Service Home Demonstration Agent. The fine people have many publication on Home gardening. canning, and freezing, and will be happy to assist you with your problems in this phase of conservation.
