Cotton ginned in Haskell County prior to Nov. 1 from the 1952 crop is running far behind the comparative figure last year, reflecting the serious inroad made by drouth on the county's cotton production, figures released this week by the bureau of the census

Virgil A. Brown, special agent for the bureau in Haskell County. Monday reported a total of 7,110 bales ginned in the county prior to Nov. 1. This compares with 20,893 bales on Nov. 1 last year. Ginners and many cotton producers estimate that at least 60 per cent of this year's crop has been gathered and ginned. These same sources estimate that total cotton production in the county will run around 13,000 bales, to make it the smallest crop since 1918 in Haskell County.
