Frank Reynolds and Sam Roberts were fortunate enough to bag their limit of two deer each. J. D. Montgomery, E. B. McDonald, R. E. Guess, Chas. Reese, B. M. Whiteker, Paul Frierson, Date Anderson, M. O. Field and Henry Atkinson each killed a deer.

At noon today, seven local gins report a total of 21,864 bales of cotton ginned in Haskell this season from the 1932 crop. This is an all-time record, ginner's report. Latest figures available on county ginnings show that 39,669 bales had been ginned to Nov. 1, compared with 26,801 bales on the same date last year.

Indians Down Munday, 41-0, For Fourth Conference Win

Continuing their drive for their first district title since 1949, the HHS Indians, undefeated and untied in conference play reeled off a championship performance Friday night in smashing the Munday Moguls of District 8A, 41-0 at Indian Stadium.

Although attendance was somewhat under the mark for previous games, the fans saw a contest that had everything—touchdown passes of 30 and 15 yards, near-perfect point-after-TD kicking, and a rolling offense that ran up 369 yards in four quarters.

The Moguls were kept on the defense for virtually the entire game, and managed to present only one scoring threat which came late in the fourth period. After taking over on the Indians 36, the Moguls worked down to the Haskell 12 on a 13-yard pass from QB Charles Ratliff to Left End Gene Haynie, and a 9-yard pick-up by Ratliff on a keeper.

A Mogul fumble recovered by Tackle Jackie Cox and Guard John Flinary ended the Munday threat.

First score for the Indians came midway in the first period, when Tail Back Larry Stratton took a pitchout and stepped off 29 yards and two plays later carried over for a TD. Wingback Thomas Holland's kick for extra point was the first of five he had in store for the Moguls during the game.

In the second, QB Jimmy White on a "keeper" play through the line, picked up 18 yards and a TD, with Holland converting. Again in the second, White fired a perfect 30 yard aerial to Holland on the goal for a TD, with Holland adding the extra point.

Fourth tally for the Tribe came in the third quarter after they had rolled on successive downs from the 50 to Munday's 15. QB White's pass to Back Mabry Brock in the end zone netted the counter, and Holland's kick was good.

Early in the fourth stanza, Indian Back Bill Thomas skirted right end on the Munday 48 and raced all the way to pay dirt and the Indian's fifth tally. The point-after try failed.

The Tribe's final tally came late in the fourth, when QB White picked up 38 yards around right end, carrying to Munday's 17. Walter Holly, Indian Fullback powered through for 11 on his first carry, and five more and a TD on his second effort. Holland's

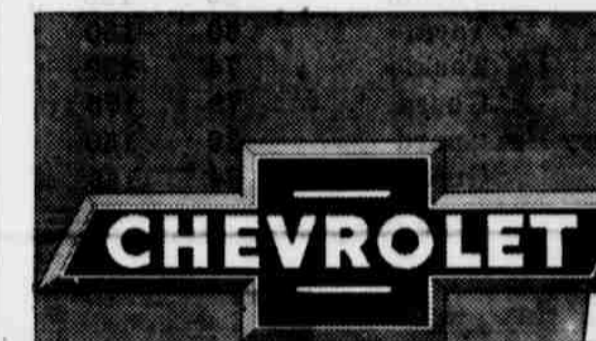
The student body considers these the highest honors awarded during the year since they are bestowed by secret ballot by the football team and pep squad respectively.

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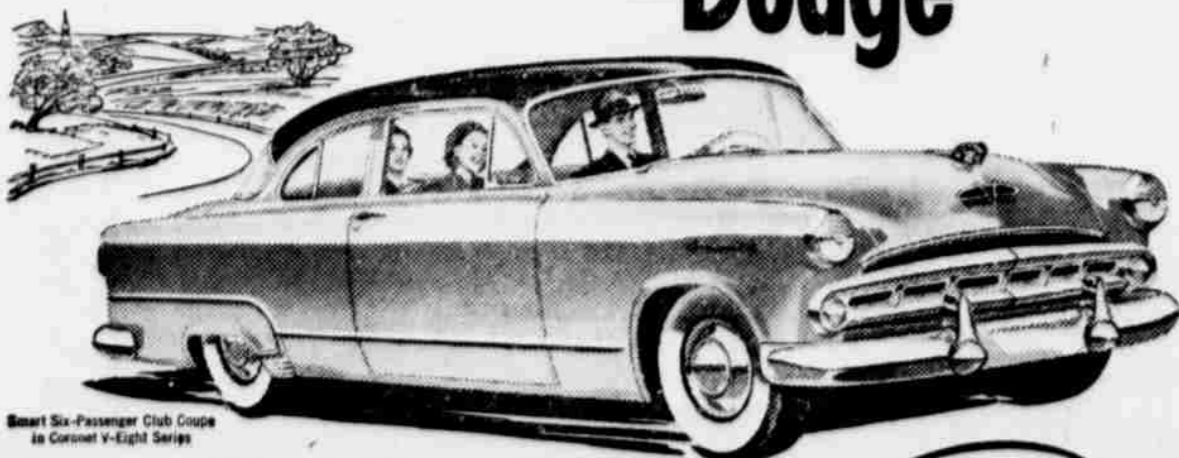

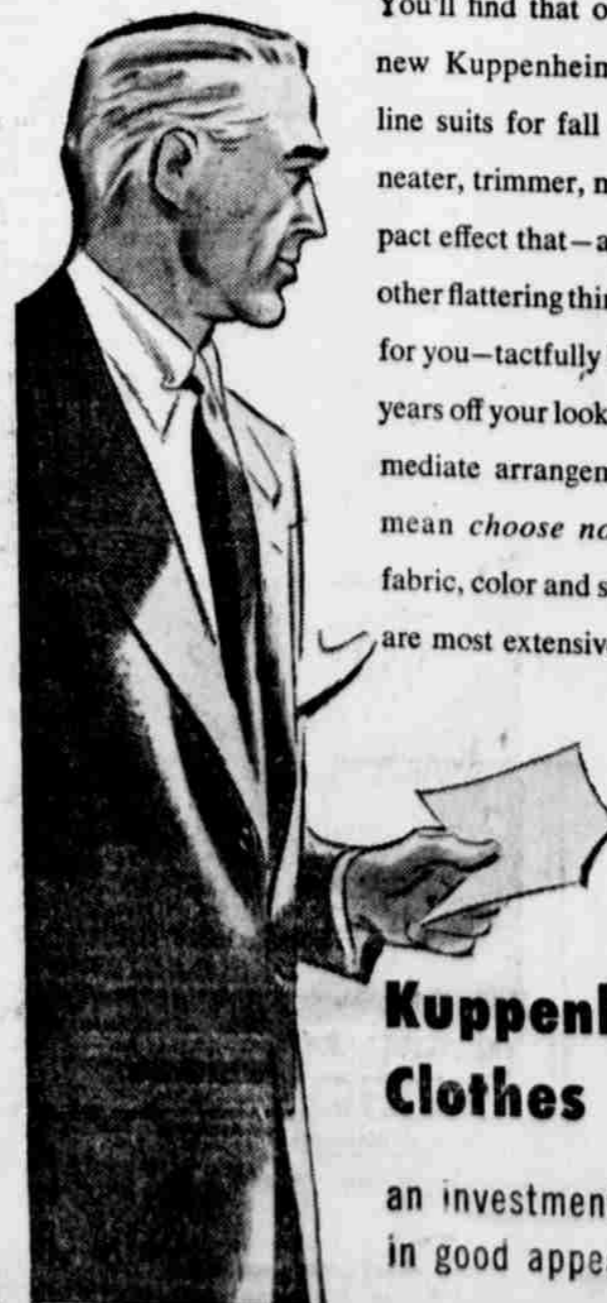

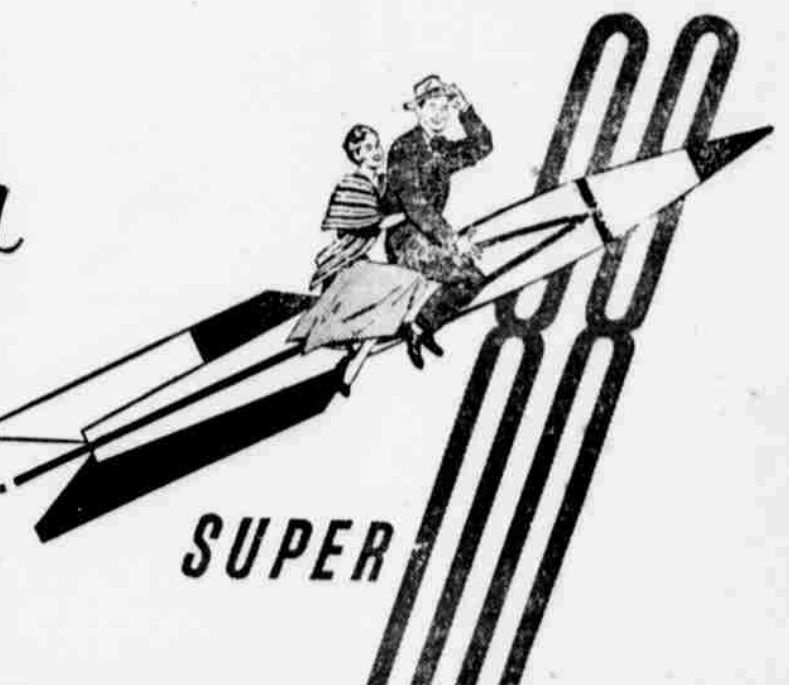
