20 Years Ago--Nov. 3, 1912
 The ballot for the general election on Nov. 8 is probably the largest ever submitted to the voters, being about the size of a daily newspaper page, and with as many columns—eight in all. Also, nine amendments are listed on the ballot. Democrats get the first column, with a full ticket from presidential electors to constables. Republicans are next with clerks and state candidates, then comes the Socialist, Communist, Jacksonian, Liberty, and Independents, in the order named. The eighth column is for write-in.

Forum Sponsored by Women's Clubs Attracts Out-of-Town Visitors; Mrs. Berg and Mrs. Bryan Bradbury Discuss Rival Candidates

Members and guests of the women's clubs met at the Haskell County Democratic Committee woman of her district, as well as being a home-maker for her family and lawyer-husband.

Mrs. Bradbury, who has already spoken in debate for Governor Stevenson a number of times in this national campaign spoke in issue for debate. She presented the issues which were

stated would "appeal to your intelligence and not your emotions." First issue was personal freedom. This included freedom of assembly, worship, speech and press.

Second were the achievements and advancements under the Democratic Party. Federalizing the banks, the increase in number of homes and farms owned by occupants, the 90 per cent parity to farmers, and the increase in soil conservation districts.

Third point was in personal qualifications. Mrs. Bradbury pointed out that "the general" is 62 years old while Governor Stevenson is only 52. She stated that the Governor has become great in three ways: by being born great, having achieved greatness and having greatness thrust upon him.

She stated that the governor writes his own speeches while the general has help with his. She said that the governor was elected to his state position with the largest popular vote in the state's history, while the general has been known to have remarked after a hard day of campaigning that he didn't care whether or not he ever saw another human being. This she attributed to the fact that the general was used to having people stand at attention around him and he couldn't bear to have to mix with us "ordinary folks."

Fourth point was Stevenson's administration as governor. It consisted of a short background of his upbringing, education, and political activities prior to his governorship. As governor of Illinois, Mrs. Bradbury stated that Stevenson had not been surpassed in the history of the state, and pointed out that he has released 13,000 federal employees, doubled school aid, increased the teachers salaries, increased the aid to blind and needy, made mental hospitals a "show place," brought about a surplus in the state budget, and improved the highway system to such a large degree that our own Governor Shivers of Texas would do well to pattern our highway program after Governor Stevenson's.

In ending she asked that the

facts be weighted and "it can be seen that there are no issues." Mrs. Frank Cadenhead, Jr., of Haskell introduced Mrs. Berg. She stated that Mrs. Berg is an amateur politician. She stated that as a "Christian, American, and the mother of four small children" it is Mrs. Berg's fundamental purpose in being in politics to help preserve our homes as Christians and progressive in the American way.

Mrs. Berg's speech stressed the thought of the American woman's place in a Christian world. She cited as a pitiful situation for our status as citizens, the fact that there are over twice as many women eligible to vote as did vote in the last national election.

As a Christian she stressed the fact that Christians in government must demand and fill public offices with people of high moral standards, beginning from the bottom, or lower precincts, up. She pointed out that our ancestors were not afraid to write God in their governmental works or to have His hand in their national leadership. She likened the single vote to match struck in a darkened room.

At the National Democratic Convention, Mrs. Berg states she became "afraid, uncomfortably and felt as if I were in the wrong place, not a Democratic convention but a Socialistic one." To watch the crooked Jake Arvey machine move in support of Gov. Stevenson for the presidential nomination, and to see the motto over the entrance door which read:

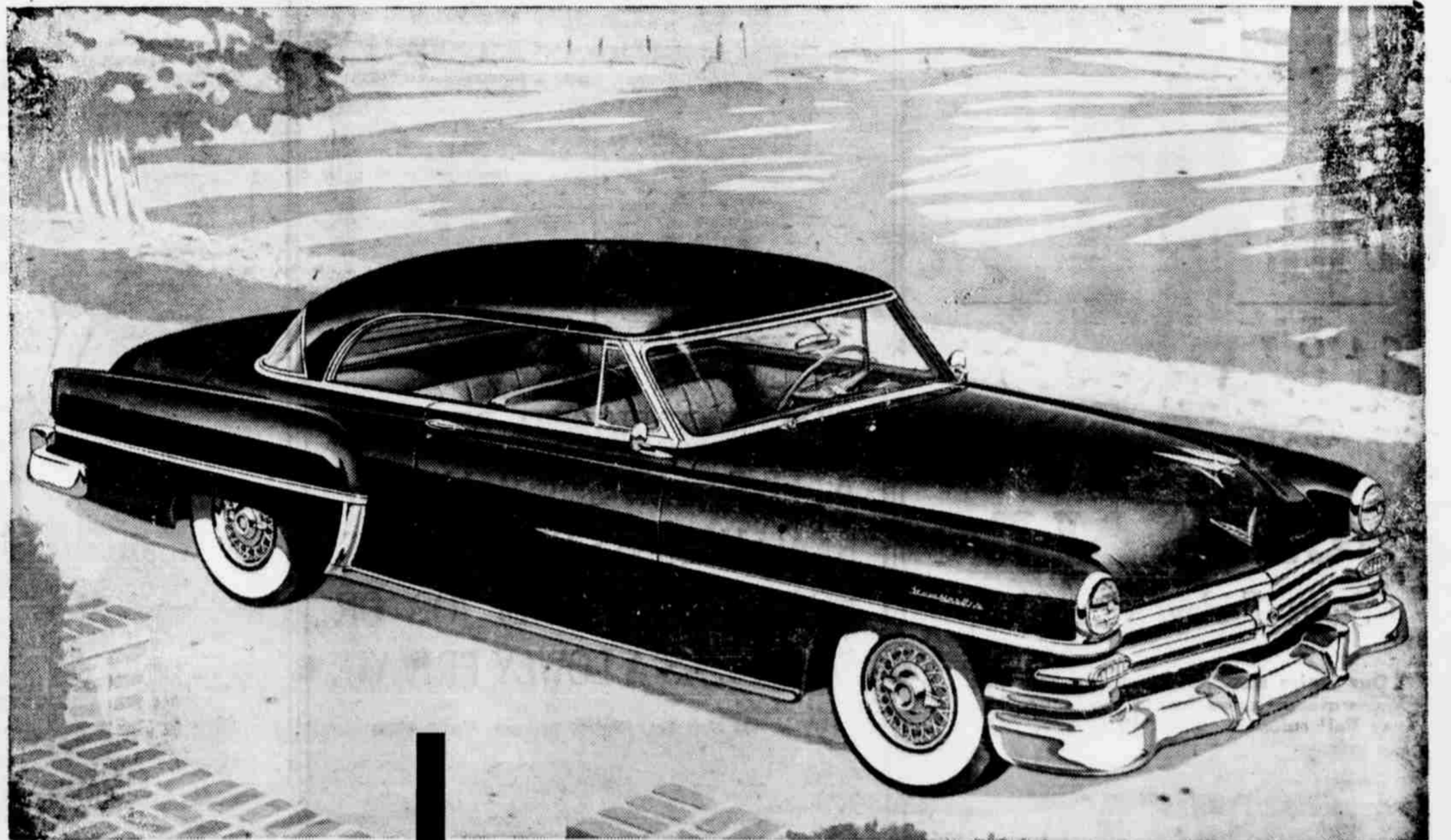

Fort Worth—Heavy movement of cattle and calves continued this week. However, a stronger stocker and feeder market and broader demand for replacement cattle and calves helped prices away to a better start at Fort Worth Monday. Fat calves shared the stronger market. Many sales of stockers and fat calves were \$1 or more above a week ago at Fort Worth. First interest in many weeks in lightweight stocker calves this week resulted in some calf sales sharply higher for their kind. Typical was a lot of 42 calves at 216 pounds at \$24.50. Hugh Rogers, Knox County, had 32 stocker steer yearlings at \$21 lbs. at \$22.50, with 31 heifers at

493 lbs. at \$18. G. R. White, Brady, had cows at \$14.50 and \$15.50. Curtis Martin, Motley County sold cows at \$14 and \$16 at Fort Worth Monday; Mrs. Jessie Mae Williams, Midland, had three loads of 961 lb. cows at \$12.50; C. F. Mock, Oklahoma, had two loads of 1,152 lb. steers at \$29.

Good and choice fed steers and yearlings drew \$23 to \$31, and plain and medium sorts sold from \$14 to \$21, with cutter grades from \$10 to \$13. Fat cows cashed at \$13 to \$16, a few heiferettes to \$18. Cannors and cutters cleared at \$7 to \$13. Bulls sold from \$10 to \$18.50.

Good and choice slaughter calves sold for \$18 to \$23, with fancy heavyweight of 500 to 600 lbs. at \$23 to \$26. Plain and medium butcher sorts cashed at \$14 to \$17 with cull sorts from \$10 to \$13.

Hogs topped at \$18, lowest since April, 1952. Sows drew \$14 to \$16.50.

Good and choice stocker calves ranged from \$17 to \$24.50, some mixed steer and heifer calves averaging 216 lbs. at \$24.50, and some plain and medium kinds sold from \$13 to \$17. Stocker steer yearlings cashed at \$14 to \$22.50. Stocker cows drew \$11 to \$18. Several sizable shipments of feeder steers and heifers sold in the \$16 to \$19 bracket.

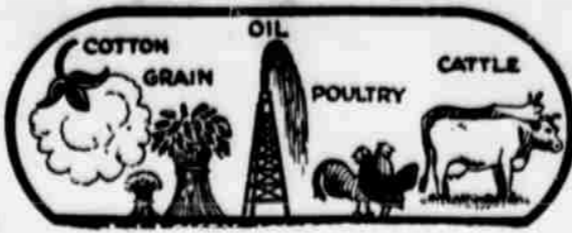

Pipe Line Company Completes Widespread Radio Communication Unit

Steady progress for East Texas, said the system comprising seven base stations and 26 mobile units had received final testing and frequency measurements and had been approved.

Service Pipe Line Co., long a transporter of crude oil in Texas, purchased gathering systems of West Central Texas counties in 1950. In 1951 a 123-mile 10-inch crude oil line was completed from Jud Station in Haskell county through Throckmorton, Young Archer, and Clay Counties to the company's Bowie Station in Montague County where it joined the main north-south system. Since then scores of wells have been connected with the company's system.

Pipe lines are the most economical method of land transportation of crude oil. The cost of shipping a barrel of oil by pipe line is one-third that of any other means of transportation. It costs less than a penny to move a gallon of oil one thousand miles.

The low cost of crude oil transportation, plus the general efficiency of the petroleum industry in producing and refining oil, means saving in cash to the consumer. For example, gasoline today is 1.8 cents per gallon cheaper than it was 25 years ago when taxes are excluded. This is a United States average taken from the Tax Economics Bulletin.

Pipe lines are the transportation arm of the oil industry. Refiners obtain their crude from distant fields through them, and distribute much of their finished products through them. Around the clock, day in and day out they keep a stream of petroleum and petroleum products flowing underground.

In Texas, the Service Pipe Line Co. is one of the largest transporters of crude oil. In Wyoming, New Mexico, North Dakota, Texas, Oklahoma, and Kansas, the oil is gathered from the wells. It is pumped into the mainline pipe systems and moved toward large refining centers. Much of the oil is delivered to refineries in the Chicago, St. Louis, Kansas City, Casper, and Gulf coast areas.

The company employs approximately 295 men in the East Texas Division. Many of them, with an average tenure in their jobs of 13 years each, man the pump stations. Others work on the pipe line, making repairs and changes and some hold office and technical posts. All have steady, year-round jobs. In all, the company employs about 2800 persons in 11 states, who man 115 pump stations and look after more than 12,000 miles of lines. Together they keep their stations and lines delivering more than half a million barrels of oil each day to refineries.

Farm Bureau Directors Told of Need For Strong Farm Organization

A meeting of the directors of the Haskell County Farm Bureau was held at the Haskell office with eight of the nine directors present. O. K. Hoyle, District 3 Organization Director met with the group to discuss several issues of importance to farmers and ranchers in this county.

He stressed the importance of continued strong organization in face of our drought this year more than ever. He explained that many issues that will affect the farmers in this area will be brought up in Austin next session. He pointed out that if the suggestions of the chairman of the Highway Commission, E. H. Thornton, Jr., are adopted at next session, that the Colson-Briscoe fund of \$63,013.70 appropriated for the construction of farm to market roads in Haskell County would be abolished and the Road Assumption money or a total of \$30,889.07 now coming to Haskell County would be transferred to the Highway Commission. He further advised that the Gas Tax Refund of \$117,174 which was returned to Haskell County farmers last year would be collected and turned over to the Highway Commission and that this county's portion of the Registration Fees of \$68,452.87 would be transferred to the Highway Commission. Hoyle also gave the figure of \$44,126.25 or one cent gasoline tax apportioned to Haskell County school system would also be transferred to the Highway Commission. In closing he totaled these funds of \$323,655.89 representing the amount that would be taken from Haskell County farmers and ranchers if the farmer is not represented through a strong Farm Bureau organization.

Plans were made for a membership drive to start November 4th after a county convention meeting on Nov. 3. A Resolution Committee meeting is being planned for the afternoon of Nov. 3 when resolutions will be discussed for vote that night. Some 60 members will be contacted to serve on the Resolution Committee meeting and will be notified later of this meeting. H. H. Segó, vice president reported. Joe B. Cloud and Adell Thomas were named as chairman and co-chairman of the Resolution Committee.

H. H. Segó was named as membership chairman, with each director selecting his workers for the drive. Named on the nominating committee were Coyt L. Hix, Thurman Rice and Vernay Howard. Five directors and the president and vice president of the county organization will be replaced or reelected at the county meeting.

Directors present at the meeting Monday night were Adell Thomas, Pete Mercer, Thurman Rice, Vernay Howard, Truett Alvis, Joe B. Cloud, Coyt L. Hix and Herbert Nierdieck, with H. H. Segó as presiding officer.

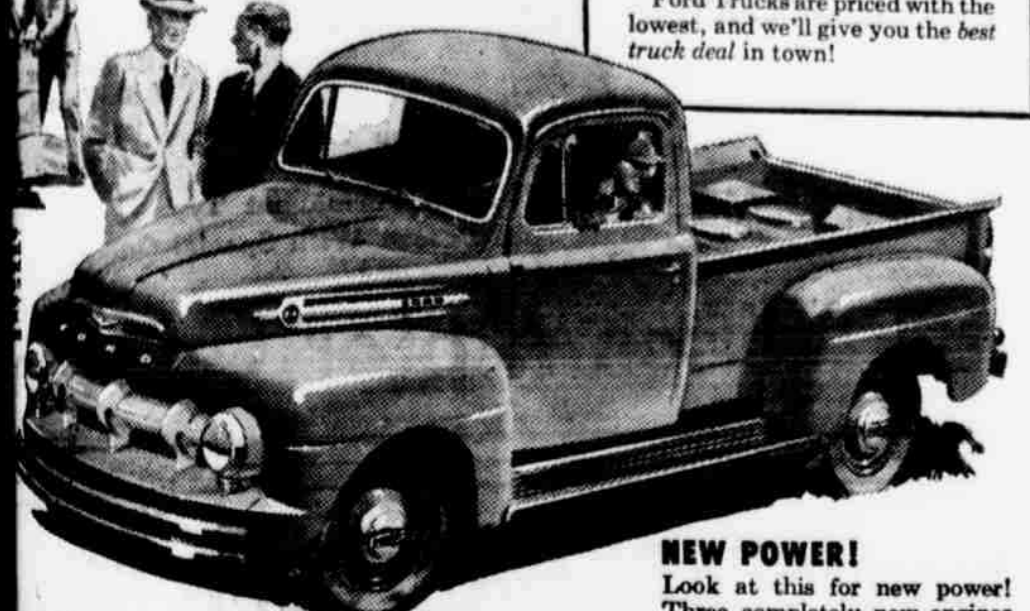

WTCC Panel Urges Defeat of Two Amendments In Tuesday's Election

Defeat of two proposed amendments of the Constitution of Texas to be voted upon Nov. 4 was urged by the taxation and legislation committee of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce at its convention in Wichita Falls last week.

Basic provisions of the two proposals are:

1. To empower the Legislature to enact laws to enable cities to provide Workman's Compensation Insurance, including the right to provide their own insurance risk for all employees, and provide suitable laws for administration of such insurance, and for payment of costs, charges premiums in insurance policies and the benefits to be paid under them (House Joint Resolution No. 20).
2. To require that the Legislature create a State Medical Education Board, establish a Medical Foundation Fund and make adequate appropriations for that fund to provide grants, loans or scholarships to persons desiring to study medicine and to practice in rural areas in Texas, upon such terms and conditions as shall be prescribed by law. The term "rural areas" would be defined by law. House (Joint Resolution No. 38.)

The WTCC committee is composed of men of many businesses and professions living in all parts of the 132 counties served by the organization.

Among reasons for opposing approval of the measure relating to Workman's Compensation for city, town and village employees were the following:

1. The Constitution already provides for passage of laws to provide Workman's Compensation Insurance for such employees. Such insurance is available from private insurance companies.
2. Language of proposed amendment may be interpreted to make it mandatory upon cities

to set up a Workman's Compensation system, unlike a present law that makes such policy voluntary for counties and their employees.

3. It would further encroach upon the legal power and authority of cities, and is a step toward centralization of government.
4. It could bring about creation of an additional State Board that would be supported by further taxation.

Among reasons for opposing the proposal to create grants loans or scholarships to students who would agree to practice medicine in rural areas, were the following:

1. It would add another to the numerous boards and commissions of the state.
2. The Constitution now prohibits the State from appropriation of public funds for "private or individual purposes" or "giving or lending of the credit of the State in aid of, or to any person or for pledging the credit of the State . . . for payment of liabilities, present or prospective, of any individual."
3. It is discriminatory in that its benefits would be limited to a single class or group.
4. Nothing is binding beyond the moral obligation of a person receiving its benefits to practice in a designated area, which would have to be defined by law.
5. All medical schools of the state are overcrowded and have long waiting lists, and additional facilities for teaching medicine would have to be provided.
6. The term "medical" is not defined. It is left to the Legislature to determine whether the term would include dentists, veterinarians, nurses, technicians, chiropractors, and doctors of osteopathy as well as doctors of medicine.

**Texas To Furnish
 2,784 In December
 Draft for Army**

Austin—State Selective Service headquarters has received a call for 2,784 men for the Army in December, biggest monthly call received by Texas in 20 months.

The national quota for December is 47,000 men, all for the Army.

Lt. Col. Morris S. Schwartz, deputy Selective Service Director, said calls to the state's 137 local boards will be mailed "later in the month." He said the call would be largely filled with men in the 20-year-old age group.

Local boards must fill the call from among men 20 years old and older at time of induction. The boards will not be able to send any men for induction below the age of 20 except delinquents and volunteers.

Local boards previously have been authorized in Texas to examine men down to the age of 19 years and 11 months, but such men cannot be inducted under present authorization. Authority will have to be received from national headquarters before men can be inducted below the age of 20.

The December induction call is the biggest received in Texas since March 1951, when 4,145 men were inducted into the Army. Only 362 men were inducted in December 1951.

Induction of men in December will take place from December 1 through December 13 because of customary armed forces holiday leaves and furloughs at Christmas time. Normally, inductions and pre-induction examinations are spread more fully throughout a month.

State Selective Service headquarters Monday also received a call for 14 doctors and six dentists for the armed services in November. This is the state's share of a national quota of 341 doctors and 200 dentists for both the Army and Air Force.

**Present Drouth Exceeds All Previous
 Ones In Severity, SCS Records Show**

The Soil Conservation Service regional office today announced results of a study of drouth conditions and reported that the drouth in Texas, from the standpoint of area involved, duration, effect on land cover, persistent high temperatures and in the scantiness of effective rainfall the present drouth exceeds all previous ones in severity.

The survey shows that conditions in the Lubbock area have improved materially since April and considerable relief has come to the Marfa-Ft. Davis country in southwestern Texas. The recent heavy rains in the Colorado River watershed may be the forerunner of a break in the drouth in that area. Still, it may be only a duplication of heavy storms at Alice in 1951 and near Dublin in 1952, both of which interrupted the going drouth only briefly.

In the eight widely separated locations the estimated duration of the present drouth is as follows: Lubbock 29 months (to April 1); Haskell, Stamford, Fort Worth and San Angelo 23 months; Big Spring 24 months; Fort Stockton 22 months; Del Rio 32 months and Fairburn 34 1-2 months.

The report to Regional Director Louis P. Merrill of SCS from 440 field offices, show that in many of the drouth-ridden western, southwestern and southern portions of the state, crops have been a complete failure. District supervisors estimate 1200 bales of cotton will be made in the Jones county portion of California Creek Soil Conservation District. In ranching areas range cover, except where good management practices have given protection has largely disappeared. Stockmen have sold or moved out large percentages of the normal livestock populations of their counties.

Stock water conditions generally are not yet critical although ponds in some areas have dried up and water wells are failing. In some sections stockmen have been hauling water for their animals for months.

Plant cover crop residue, important in the practice of conservation farming and ranching, no longer exist in some drouth areas. Here in the California Creek Soil Conservation District, water conserving practices such as leaving the maize stubble on top of the soil, terraces and tanks for livestock water are being given a great amount of interest by farmers and ranchers. This can be shown by the amount of new terracing going on and the number of tanks built. In the first six months of this year there were 564 miles of terraces constructed and 9 tanks constructed.

Planting of grasses and summer legumes was passed over during the summer as the land remained too dry. District supervisors estimate 10,000 acres of winter wheat have already been dry planted and that another 20,000 acres will be planted for cover to help control soil blowing this spring.

Extent of damage from the drouth in Texas range areas cannot be measured immediately. Merrill pointed out. Forage losses can be determined only after enough rainfall has occurred to bring surviving plants back into growing condition. Recent rains in a few drouth-hit areas show that ranges on which conservation management has been practiced have come through the dry weather in best condition.

Generally ranges with good stands of vigorous grasses have come through with only 23 to 30 per cent loss in ground cover. In contrast, ranges with poor grass stands at the start of the drouth have lost 30 to 60 per cent of ground cover. On ranges with slight or no litter of stubble, evaporation is high and little rain is stored in the ground.

The California Creek Soil Conservation District supervisors recommends careful use of range lands after they begin recovery following rains. A years light use following this drouth would help heal the scars of this 24 month old struggle, but even a two month deferment or rest would give the range lands a boost it needs to get started.

In comparing the current drouth with those of 1916-18 and 1933-36, Merrill said the present drouth has prevailed for an average of nearly 27 months at key locations in the area. The drouth of 1916-18 using the same yardstick, ran 24 months and the 1933-36 spell lasted 24.4 months. If good management practices are followed on range as well as cropland, such as planting cover crops residue management and deferred grazing the healing process that follows this drouth will be speeded up.
