

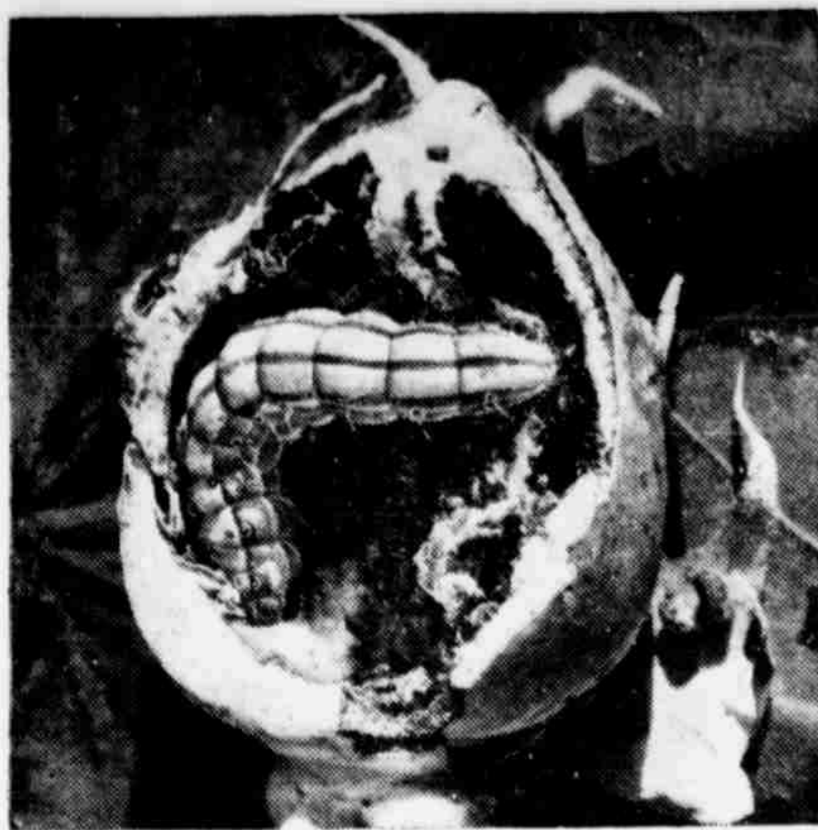

What is the best way to KILL BOLLWORM?

Close rival to the weevil as a destroyer of cotton, the bollworm has always been more difficult to control.

The mature bollworm in the illustration has been feeding inside the boll for several days. During this time the boll itself offers the protection that makes it extremely difficult to get a high kill with insecticides. For this reason, proper timing of insecticide application is essential: Early bollworm infestations must be treated as soon as worms are found; later broods should be treated within a day or two after hatching and while young worms are still feeding outside the boll. A good measure for this is when 4 to 5 small worms (or 10 to 15 eggs) are counted on 100 terminals.

As the bollworm season approaches, every cotton grower wants to know "What's the best insecticide?" Actually, no one chemical so far tried will provide top control of bollworm. But... field tests in widely separated areas prove that certain combinations of chemicals (chlorinated hydrocarbons) do give effective control. At the same time, these mixtures kill almost all other in-

sects that destroy cotton.

A mixture of dieldrin and DDT, for example, is one of the most deadly bollworm killers of all... more lethal than either insecticide alone. Used as a dust or a spray, the combination provides excellent control with relatively small dosages. The same dust or spray gets the boll weevil, flea-hopper, tarnished and rapid plant bug, grasshoppers and a host of other pests.

Where large areas of cotton must be protected from bollworm damage, and low cost is a primary consideration, aldrin-DDT mixtures provide profitable control at the lowest cost per acre.

Whichever combination is used, the timing and form of application (dust or spray) should follow the practice proved best in the area.

Black Crossing Termed Cause of Many Casualties

Reports from these 43 states show that while 3 out of 4 persons cross at intersections compared with 1 out of 4 who jaywalk and cross at mid-block or between intersections, twice as many persons are killed crossing mid-block than at corners. Compared to the 2831 killed crossing mid-block, half that number or 1,425 were killed at crossing intersections. Thus, it will be seen that in spite of the smaller numbers of people crossing in mid-block, the number of deaths was twice as many involved in the much larger number crossing at corners.

"The survey also showed that 233 people were killed at intersections crossing against the red light," Kulp added.

"Thus, it behooves pedestrians not only to obey traffic lights at intersections, but always to go to the corner to cross. The chances of staying alive are so much greater."

New Corn Hybrid Announced by Texas A. & M. Station

Seed of Texas 15W, a new white corn hybrid developed by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, will be available for planting by Texas farmers in 1953.

Under comparative tests in experimental plots over the State the past two years, Texas 15W has produced higher yields than any white hybrid now sold.

The new hybrid was developed by Dr. John S. Rogers and his co-workers in the corn breeding program, according to Station Director R. D. Lewis. Rogers also developed Texas 11W, heretofore the most popular white hybrid for Texas growing conditions, and Texas 26, 28 and 30, high-yielding yellow hybrids.

Since Texas 15W does not have as good shuck coverage as Texas 11W, it is better adapted to the Blackland Prairie than it is to the more humid area of East Texas and the Gulf Coast. However, it is not objectionable to either of these areas and has produced yields as high or higher than 11W in both locations. Texas 15W is not as resistant to ear worms and ear rots as Texas 11W but the stalks will stand up slightly better in the field.

Most white corn in Texas is produced in the Blackland Prairie and Texas 15W should replace 11W in this area as the seed becomes available to farmers, Lewis said.

their place of residence as being in the Antelope voting precinct No. 6, but had voted at Girard for convenience.
Some 30 witnesses were placed on the stand Monday.
Approximately 40 of 75 witnesses were called Tuesday and gave their testimony before Commissioner Williams. He termed their testimony as "repetitious" to that given in Monday's hearings.
Several witnesses scheduled to testify Tuesday failed to appear and many of those who were examined never took the stand because of lack of time.
The majority of those heard Tuesday were ones who had voted to move the courthouse from Claremont to Jayton and were placed on the stand by Dallas Scarborough, Abilene attorney for the contestants.
Commissioner Williams said that testimony showed a few instances where voters had left their money and name with the sheriff or the druggist to pay their poll taxes and had relied on them to obtain their poll tax receipts.
One of Tuesday's witnesses said that he did not pay for a poll tax but that he and his wife, nevertheless, received one through the mail. But in this case, the voter said he had not cast a ballot in the courthouse election.
A total of 918 votes were cast in the March 29 election and the county paid poll tax list showed 286 paid poll taxes, the 52 additional votes being attributed to voters exempted from payment of polls.

together and does not allow the moisture to penetrate to deep-rooted crops. He said this could be prevented through crop rotation, thereby restoring life to the soil.
"Banks are in a position to encourage soil conservation," stated Chas. D. Morrison, manager, Agriculture Department, City National Bank, Wichita Falls, using as his topic, "Conservation and Agriculture Loans."
He said it took between \$8,000 and \$10,000 for a young man to begin farming and this is disregarding the price of land. "Conservation is a sound business," he said, "and its up to the bankers to help the farmers."
"If the bankers don't help them, socialized credit will," Morrison added.
R. W. Herren, Haskell county farmer, concluded the program with "What We Farmers Expect of Our Banks."
Herren listed five suggestions to improve the relationship between the farmers and the bankers. They were: The farmer doesn't always feel his business is kept in confidence by the banker. They feel that employees and directors sometime talk too much about other people's accounts, etc.
The banks need an agricultural contact man to appraise the farmers' securities, etc.
Farmers sometime have an inferiority complex around banks and they seek loans from other sources.
Because agriculture is a sound business, the good farmer has a right to expect credit to be extended when needed. Herren reminded the bankers.
The annual meeting of the Sev-

en-County Bankers Association was held in the Haskell High School auditorium. The association was organized in 1927 and was known as Haskell-Knox Bankers Association.

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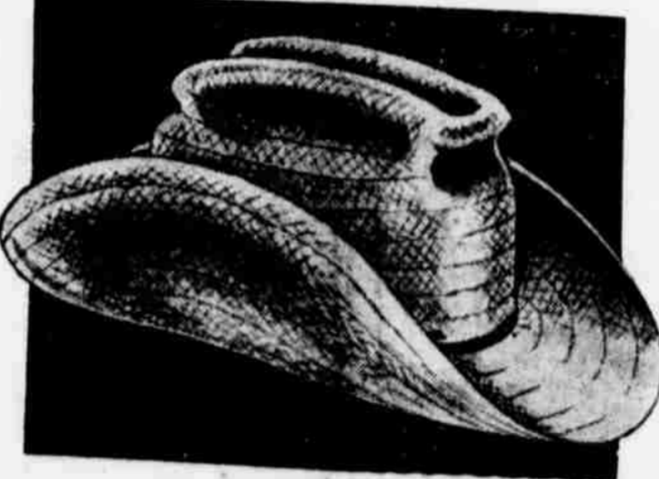
