Economic conditions makes budget bill crafting tough

AUSTIN-Some Texans prefer swift action by the state Legislature because they want to see progress.

Then there are those who don't mind a slow pace and maybe want lawmakers to create as few new laws as possible.

We're now half way through the 140-day 81st regular session of the Texas Legislature and no substantive legislation has been debated on the House floor, although lawmakers filed a record number of bills before the March 13 bill-filing deadline.

Bills that have passed in the Senate and are waiting for House approval are in a waiting line

There's a reason for it. It's a complicated puzzle to create a budget with the state economy slowing down and disagreement about how, where or if the \$16 billion in federal stimulus dollars should be spent.

One also could factor in that there's an extra learning curve with a new speaker, new committee chairs and new members learning to work as a unit.

Lawmakers want to be sure they understand exactly what is on the table before they offer up a 2010-2011 budget that could cost taxpayers \$170 billion. That is the work of the House Appropriations and Senate Finance committees.

The House Committee on Ways and Means will have to figure out where the money will come from to fund the budget. That's a rough task when sales and use taxes won't be nearly as high as projected, property values have decreased and the state business activity tax is not it is based on businesses' profit margins. There's a superstition that it's not a good idea to mention the possibility of a special session because it increases chances that the governor will call one, and that kind of talk is percolating. But Jim Pitts, R-Waxahachie, chair of House Appropriations, and Rep. Garnet Coleman, D-Houston, chair of House County Affairs, seemed to deliver a different message when they talked to reporters March 20 about the progress of the session. Coleman expressed confidence that the House can and will pass a budget during the regular session.

The Texas Senate on March 18 passed Horseshoe Bay Sen. Troy Fraser's voter ID bill on a 19-12 party line vote, with Republicans in favor and Democrats against.

If the House approves SB 362 in its present form, in order to cast a ballot, voters would present their current voter registration certificate and driver's license. A state or U.S. military-issued ID card could be used to substitute for a driver's license

For those who don't have a driver's license or other government-issued ID, they could use two other forms of identification, such as a library years. card and a utility bill.

Austin growth faster than most

When Texans visit their capital and sense that it's grown recently, there are new statistics to back up the sensation.

The U.S. Census Bureau on March 19 reported Raleigh-Cary, N.C., and Austin-Round Rock, Texas, were the nation's fastestgrowing metro areas between 2007 and 2008, based on July 1, 2008, population estimates for the nation's metropolitan and "micropolitan" statistical areas and counties.

Raleigh-Cary saw its population climb 4.3 percent between July 1, 2007, and July 1, 2008, to 1.1 million. Austin-Round Rock experienced a 3.8 percent increase, to 1.7 million

Stiffer penalties



NEED MORE TIME TO FILE YOUR RETURN?

If you need more time to file your 2008 income tax return, you can get an extension-and no explanation is necessary.

You may have a very good reason for wanting more time to file your 2008 individual income tax return. For instance, you might want to hold off funding a retirement plan such as a Keogh or SEP until you can save more money. Perhaps you're waiting for a tax form from a trust, a partnership, or an S corporation. Or maybe you've just been busy.

It doesn't matter. Whatever the cause or motivation, you can usually put off filing for up to six months beyond April 15. That means you could have until October 15, 2009, to finalize your return-assuming you follow the rules.

Here's what you need to do:

Estimate your total tax liability for 2008, subtract what you've already paid in withholding or estimated payments and remit most or all of the balance by April 15, and

File an extension request form (generally Form 4868 for an individual return) by April 15.

You can file the extension request form electronically, by phone, or by mailing it to the IRS. If you owe taxes, you can pay with an electronic funds transfer, your credit card, or a check.

Requesting an extension for your personal return also gives you additional time to file a gift tax return for 2008. The gift tax return extension is automatically included. You don't even have to check a box. But if you owe gift tax (or generation skipping transfer tax), or are requesting an extension only for a gift tax return, you'll need to use Form 8892.

One more quirk: If you live and work outside the United States, you may qualify for an automatic two-month extension of time to file without having to send in a form. Other rules apply for special circumstances (such as military service). For more information or filing assistance, please contact our office.

Burgess to retire

Brian Burgess, local State Farm Insurance Agent, will be retiring at the end of March, after thirty-two years of service to his customers.

In 1976, while Burgess was teaching school at Lueders-Avoca, State Farm area manager Clifford Floeck approached him about becoming an insurance agent and taking over the office in Munday. It seems, State Farm Agent Leo Fetsch was considering retirement after twenty years in business.

Circumstances changed however, and State Farm opened an office in Haskell instead. Equipped with a twodrawer filing cabinet from college, a desk borrowed from Floeck, chairs and a manual typewriter borrowed from his in-laws and a porch swing purchased for \$56 from Sears, Burgess opened his office on April 1, 1977.

That first State Farm office, located on the south side of Pogue's Grocery Store, incurred monthly expenses of about one hundred dollars. Starting from scratch, and seeing the need to "fill those two cabinet drawers" with customers, Burgess hit the streets. In his friendly, outgoing manner, he went door to door, introducing himself and asking if he could help people with their insurance needs. At the same time wife, Jennifer, was calling through the phone book, telling people of the new business and inviting them to stop by the office.

He recalls one of the "perks" of that particular location was getting to visit with the out of town husbands parked on the curb, waiting while their wives spent the day in Lane-Felker.

As the business grew, Burgess bought the building across the street and remodeled it. He set up office in the north side and rented out the south side to the Soil Conservation Service. Later while remodeling their present home, they moved their family, which now included two small children, into the south side of the office building.
