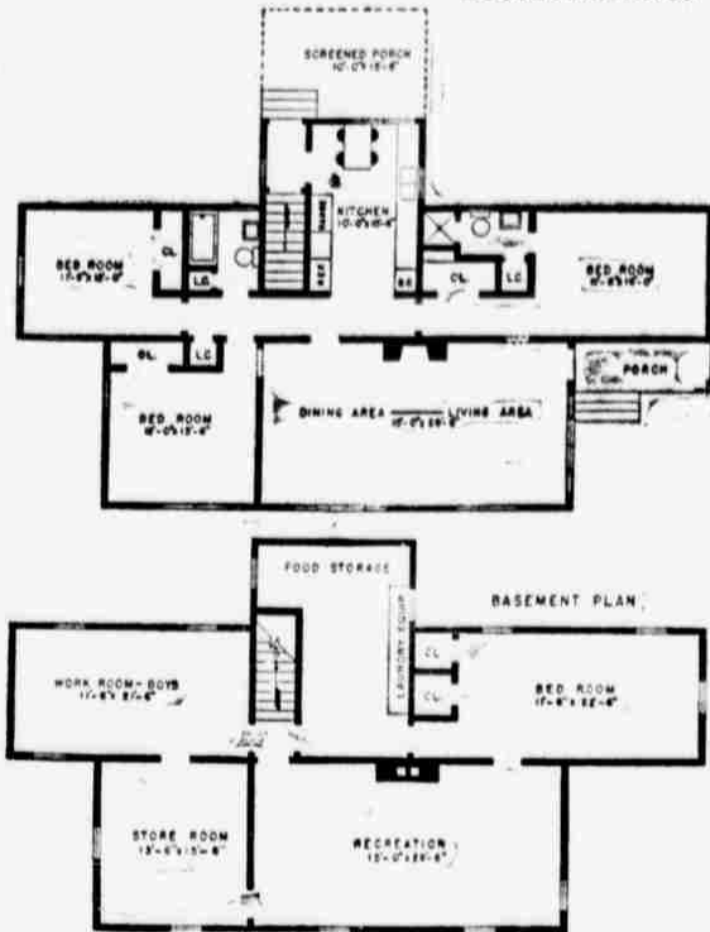

HOUSE PLAN No. 35



The lines of this Farm & Ranch House No. 5135 are simple. Economical to construct, it will be especially suited to areas of flat terrain.

This house is planned to accommodate your married children who come home for a visit and bring their children. Also, it is planned so that if there is anyone ill the housewife can take care of them and do the housework, too.

A full basement will provide a lot of low cost space for a large recreation room and a bedroom to be used in emergencies or for extra hired help. The laundry room—food storage area, has ample room for tubs, washing machine, and freezer chest, plus the storage space.

The kitchen has a nook for the family meals, and will be light and cool. Also, there is provision for a screened porch if you desire one.

You may want to divide the living-dining area into two rooms

thus making a separate dining room. If so, instead of the fireplace use a chimney which begins in the basement and can serve heating equipment both there and in the living-dining area. The doors shown by dotted lines are optional. If you want them, we suggest that they be sliding doors that will save wall and floor space.

Easy access from the kitchen to both bedroom and bathroom areas without having to go through the living-dining area will save many steps.

Larger Livestock Receipts Reported At Ft. Worth Market; Prices Stronger

Fort Worth—Receipts of all classes of livestock were considerably larger at Fort Worth and around the market circle Monday. Twelve major markets reported over 123,000 cattle and over 137,000 hogs. It was one of the largest hog runs of the season.

At Fort Worth cows were around 50 cents higher and bulls brought strong prices. Some early sales of fed yearlings were steady but most packers took a very bearish stand and before the day was over, many fed steers and yearlings cleared at 50 cents to \$1.50 lower prices. Shortfeeds fared the worst.

Choice fat calves ruled firm but others were weak. Stocker trade was again featured by some strong sales on cows and on light-weight yearlings and calves of choice grades. However, demand was still very narrow and plainer kinds draggy.

Fat lambs were steady to strong with some choice fat lambs around \$1 to \$1.50 higher. Slaughter ewes opened 50 cents higher. Other sheep were fully steady. Hogs opened strong and topped Monday at \$17 to \$17.25. Sows sold for \$13.50 to \$16.

Good and choice slaughter steers and yearlings sold for \$22 to \$30. Plain and medium butcher sorts sold for \$14 to \$20, with

ranny yearlings around \$10 to \$13. Fat cows sold for \$14 to \$16. Heiferettes \$16 to \$20, and canners and cutters cashed at \$10 to \$14 in most cases. Bulls brought \$10 to \$18.50. Good and choice slaughter calves cleared at \$19 to \$25 with culls around \$10 to \$13.

Good and choice stocker calves sold from \$18 to \$23.50 and stocker steer yearlings ranged from \$23 down. Feeder steers sold mostly from \$21 down. Stocker cows drew \$10 to \$17. Heifer calves and heifer yearlings usually brought \$2 or more less than comparable steers.

Good and choice slaughter lambs sold from \$18 to \$23, a load at 92 pounds from Hill Brothers, Stanton, at \$25, a new top for the current crop. Shorn lambs with No. 1 pelts sold at \$21 downward. Feeder lambs cashed at \$10 to \$16. Slaughter yearlings sold from \$10 to \$17. Aged wethers drew \$10 down. Slaughter ewes sold from \$5.50 to \$8 and some breeding ewes sold for \$9 down. Old bucks sold around \$5 to \$6.

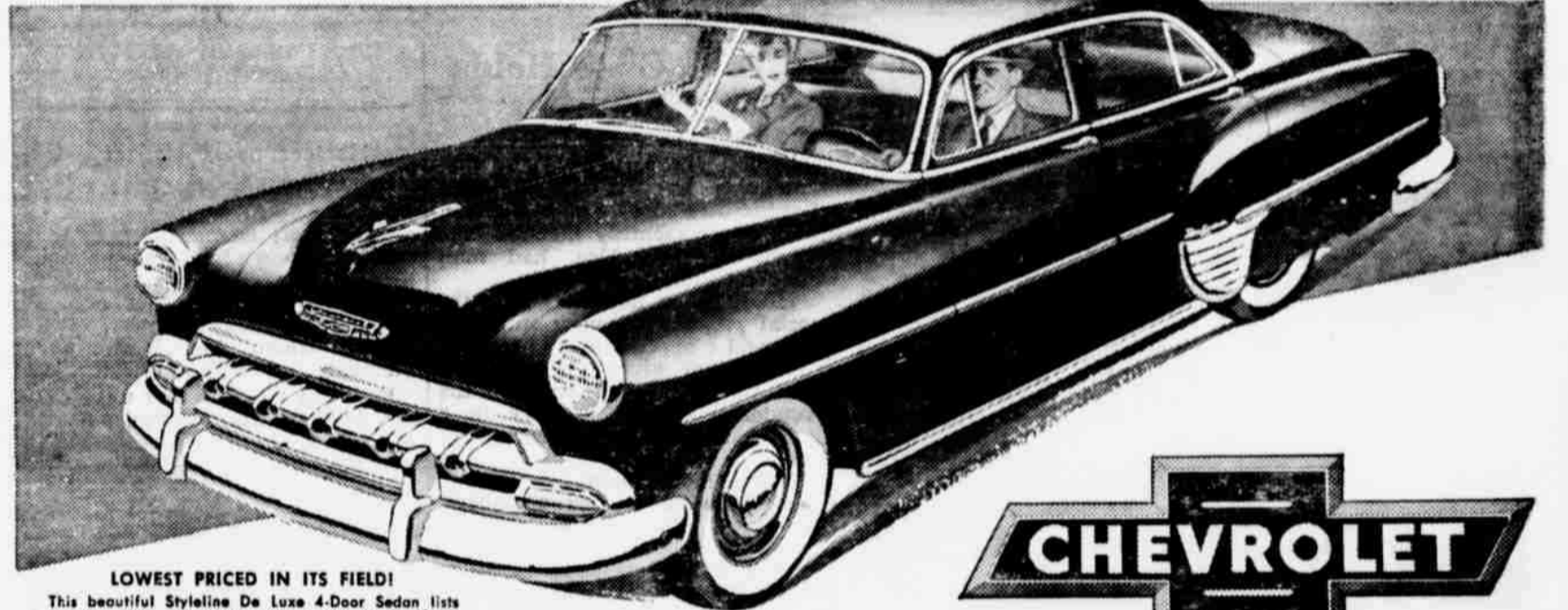

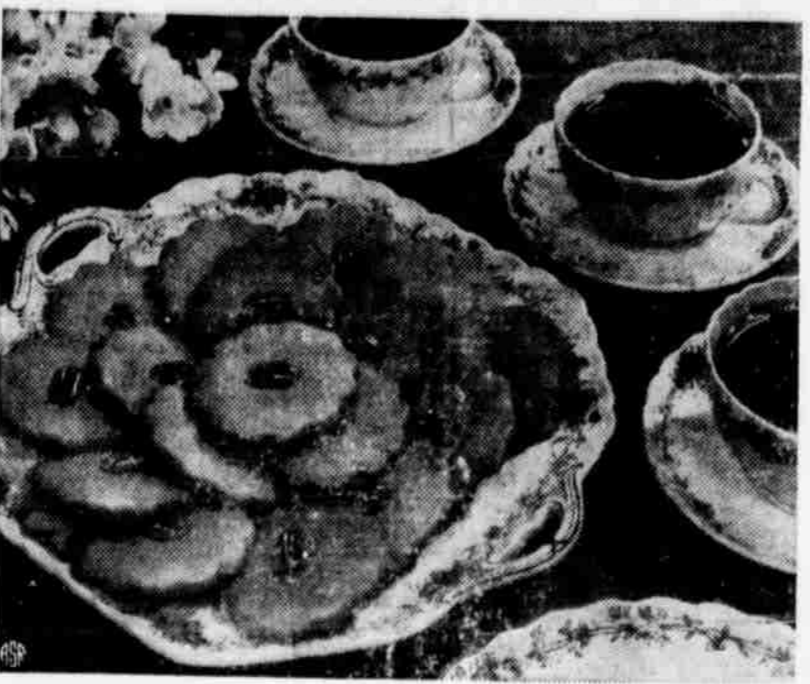

Coffee Hours Around The Clock

Coffee Rum Cookies: 2 cups sifted flour, 2 tablespoons Nescafé, 1/2 teaspoon baking powder, 1/2 teaspoon baking soda, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/2 cup shortening, 1/2 cup butter or margarine, 1/2 cup brown sugar, 1/2 cup granulated sugar, 1 egg, well beaten, 1 teaspoon imitation rum extract. Mix and sift flour, instant coffee, baking powder, baking soda and salt. Cream shortening and butter or margarine; add sugars gradually, while creaming; beat until light; add egg and rum extract. Add sifted dry ingredients; blend thoroughly. Wrap in waxed paper or aluminum foil. Chill several hours. Roll out a small amount of dough at a time about 1/4 inch thick, on lightly floured board. Cut with a 2" cookie cutter. Decorate with nutmeats, if desired. Bake on ungreased cookie sheet in hot oven, 400°F., 8-10 minutes. Yield: about 3 dozen cookies. You can make refrigerator cookies with the same recipe. Form the dough into a roll, wrap in wax paper or aluminum foil and chill overnight. Then slice thin and bake, as wanted.

Carbon Monoxide Termed Deadly, Silent Killer

"You can't see it—you can't smell it—you can't taste it and yet it can kill you," Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, referring to carbon monoxide. A silent enemy, it strikes its victims in closed rooms, garages and cars where wood, coal, gasoline, or natural gas is burning.

Some victims of this silent poisoner never knew that life was in danger. As others died, they may have realized that the killer was at hand, but were helpless to do anything about it. They were so numbed that they could not get out into the fresh air; they couldn't walk or even stand up. Those who escape death, once this silent killer permeates a closed room, garage or automobile are rescued by someone who discovers their plight.

Carbon monoxide is given off when wood, coal, gasoline or natural gas is burning, but not all the gas is burned. Its danger is greatest in cold weather because people tend to close their houses and cars so tight that no fresh air can circulate. When this happens, carbon monoxide accumulates to a dangerous concentration. It kills because it prevents the victim from getting enough oxygen.

To help prevent such deaths all stoves should be vented, keep heated rooms ventilated, do not leave gas heaters burning while you and your family are asleep, do not entirely close all the windows in your car and do not run your car in a closed garage. Whether your stoves, heaters and your car serves you and fam-

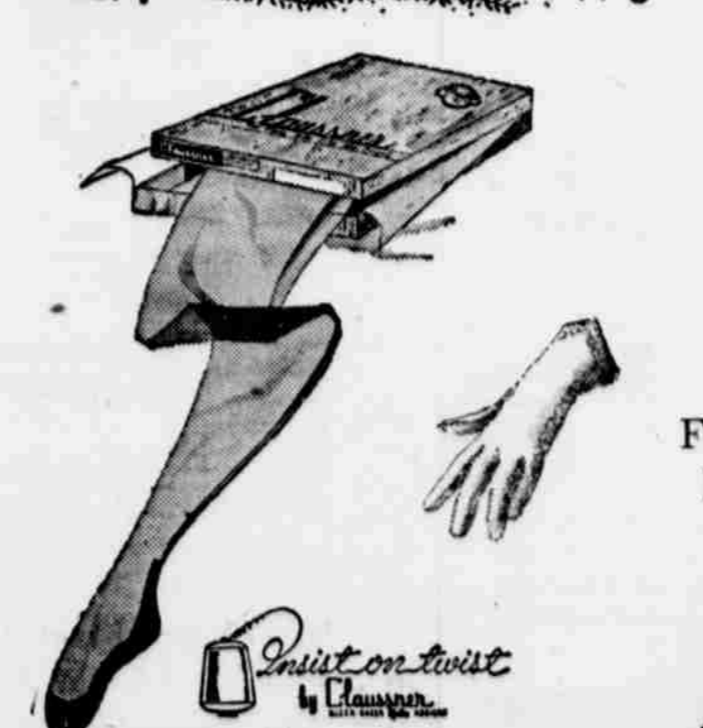

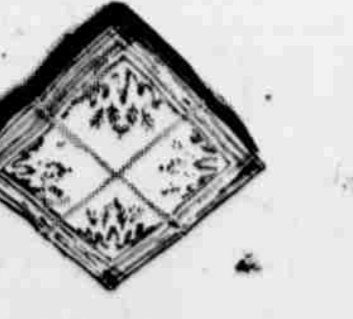

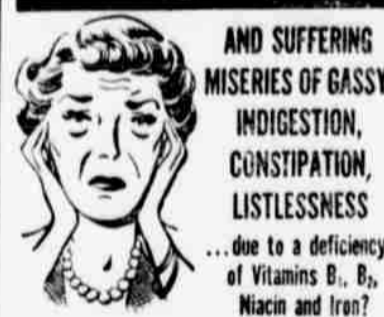

An estimated crowd of 3,000 fans braved freezing temperatures and a chill wind to witness the game, in which the Indians mixed power with deception and used about every formation in the book to overcome a 7 to 6 deficit at halftime and earn a decisive victory over the stunned Lions.

Dublin scored first in the middle of the initial quarter, but never threatened thereafter. The touchdown came on a 38-yard pass from Quarterback Marvin Salyer to Fullback Darwin Ellis after the Indians had stopped the Lions' ground game cold. Ellis kicked the extra point.

But in the second frame, the Indians locked and barred the door, went to work and denied the Lions any chance to score while they proceeded to roll up 33 points.

The Indians got the ball early in the second quarter when Fullback James Berna was badly rushed after taking a handoff on the five. The oval spurted out of his arms and Center Tommy Robinson recovered.

From six yards out the Indians' sterling Fullback Walter Holley split the middle of the line for six points. Back Tom Holland's kick for point was wide and the halftime score stood at 7-6.

The Indians kicked to Dublin to open the second half and forced them to punt after the Lions had picked up one first down. From his own 48, Back Holley found a nice hole in the middle of the Lion line and scampered 15 yards.

Quarterback White, then put his teammates into a spread formation, kept on one down for a nice gain, tossed an incomplete pass to loosen the Lion line then sent Holley up the slot again to the eight yard line.

Larry Stratton hit the left side for a four yard gain then on the next play climbed over the line into the end zone. White missed the conversion attempt but the play was nullified by a penalty and on the second attempt he split the uprights.

The Indians kicked to the dismayed Lions and on the first play Salyer dropped the ball again on his eight yard line, and an alert Indian, Tackle Mabry Brock, recovered. White made four yards on a keeper then sent Holley the other four yards to pay dirt. Lion End Cal Tucker blocked White's conversion attempt.

Trailing 13-7 the Lions desperately tried the air route but cold weather and an aggressive tribe of Indians kept them from doing more than threaten.

To clinch the bi-district win the Indians scored twice in the final frame. Holley had the partisan fans on their feet when he scampered from his 44 to the Lions' eight after powering right through the middle of the opponent's line for 48 yards. Then Stratton fumbled but recovered the ball. Holley raked the Lions' line but gained nothing, and Back Bill Thomas scampered five yard around his right end. Thomas then went over and White kicked good.

White and Fullback Lynn Coleman marched the ball down from the Lions' 32-yard stripe with White going 15 yards on one spurt, then plowing over from one yard out. Quarterback Tom Holland kicked good for the final Indian counter.

After winning 10 games, including the District 1A-7 championship, the Lions were unable to shake loose their elusive Scat-back Marvin Salyer.

Holley, who had plenty of help from hard-blocking teammates, headed the Indians' ground attack, sharing honors with Larry Stratton, Quarterback Jimmy White, and a pair of reserve backs, Bill Thomas and Lynn Coleman, who saw plenty of action in the final quarter.

Defensive stalwarts such as Don Payne, Don Dendy, Bobby Boutwell and Tommy Robinson held Dublin to short gains and only three first downs.

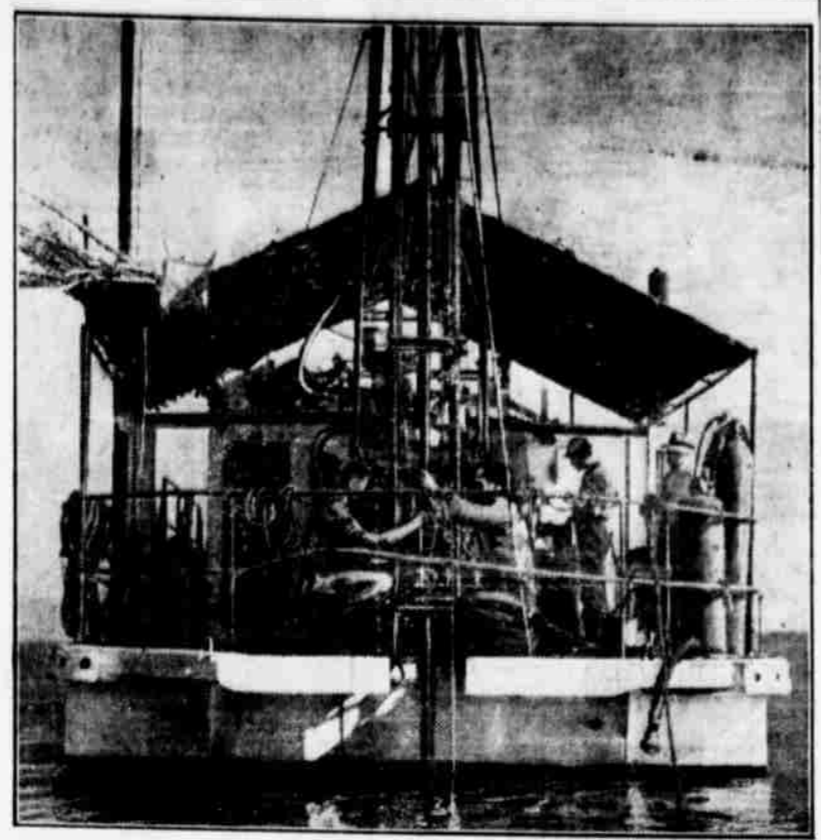
