It has earned the approval of the American College of Surgeons and other accredit-ing agencies. It accepts patients from all over Texas, any child whose physician feels will be benefitted by the treatment program of physical medicine and rehabilitation.

In announcing the local campaign, Chairman Johnston expressed the hope that everyone in this community would join in the effort to expand the facilities of the Gonzales Foundation. A building program now under way will increase bed space by 30 per cent. Mr. Johnston pointed out, enabling the hospital to accept many more patients each year,

Stamford to Get Water From Fort Phantom

Unless it rains within the next week, Stamford will need an Falls, emergency supply of water from Lake Fort Phantom Hill, accordto the Abilene Reporter-

The newspaper reported Abilene City Manager Austin P. Hancock as saying Monday morning that Stamford officials had called him last week, saying that they will need water very soon and that they wouldn't ask for the Phantom water until absolutelly necessary.

Under an agreement between the two cities, Abilene opens the gates at Phantom when flood Stamford's reservoir on the Clear Fork near Lueders becomes too low to use.

The contract between Abilene and Stamford was signed when Abilene set up a pumping station to catch flood water on the Clear Fork and pour it over into Fort Phantom Hill Lake, major source of Abilene's water supply. Stamford relinquished its priority rights to Clear Fork water with the agreement that Abilene fill the Stamford reservoir yearly until Stamford's new lake on Paint

Creek is completed. Stamford officials now report that the Lueders reservoir is very low and the Stamford City Counlast week decided to notify the City of Abilene. The council estimated Stamford will be out of drinking water by Sept. 5.
