House passes \$178 billion budget for fiscal years 2010-2011

AUSTIN-The Texas House of Representatives spent Friday and Saturday, April 17-18, amending and finally passing SB 1, the upper chamber's proposal for the 2010-2011 state budget.

The House version of SB 1 totals \$178 billion while the Senate version totals \$182.2 billion. The House version represents a 2.5 precent annual increase for the two years, a rate below projected rates of inflation and population growth for Texas.

Now, SB 1 goes back to the Senate, where the body either can accept or reject changes made by the House. If any of the House version's more than 400 amendments rubs senators the wrong way, the bill will go to a conference committee of senators and House members. Differences must be reconciled before the bill can be forwarded to the governor.

The tax-writing House Committee on Ways and Means is working on legislation to fund the appropriations.

Committee eyes smoking ban

Two dozen other states have outlawed smoking in public venues. Texas would join them if SB 544, considered April 14 by the Senate Health and Human Services Committee,

The bill, by Sen. Rodney Ellis, D-Houston, would extend the ban to all cities in the state. Already, 28 cities in Texas have public places.

In laying out his bill for consideration, Ellis said there is no safe level of exposure second-hand smoke p public health risk.

"Our state and our state's employers need to embrace policies and programs that will truly clear the air, improve health for every Texan, and make a positive contribution to managing rising health care costs in Texas," he said.

Tobacco purchase age may rise

The Texas Senate on April 15 approved a bill by Sen. Carlos Uresti, D-San Antonio, raising the minimum legal age to purchase cigarettes and other tobacco products from 18 to 19 years of age.

Senate bill analysts say Uresti's SB 1049 may cost the state about \$12 million in tax revenue from tobacco sales. But Sen. Jane Nelson, R-Lewisville, pointed out, "You are going to save the state multiple times this amount of money in tobacco

related illnesses that we would see on down the line."

State grants to stem tobacco use

Grants available from the Texas comptroller's office are intended to help keep tobacco away from underage users.

Grants ranging from \$1,000 to \$150,000 can be used for tobacco education, keeping schools and school events tobacco free and sting operations to catch retailers selling tobacco products to minors.

Texas teen-agers illegally buy or smoke more than 67 million packs of cigarettes each year, and combating the threat to children's health is critical, Texas Comptroller Susan Combs said.

The deadline to apply for 2009-10 grants is May 4 for schools with on-campus law enforcement and May 11 for police departments, sheriffs, constables and district attorneys.

Senate passes mesothelioma bill

Following a four-hour floor debate, the Senate on April 16 tentatively approved CSSB 1123 by Sen. Robert Duncan, R-Lubbock.

The bill would expedite the process of lawsuits filed by patients with mesothelioma, a type of lung cancer related to exposure to asbestos.

Duncan said a recent Texas Supreme Court ruling made it too difficult for mesothelioma patients to prove the source of their cancer

Duncan's bill is subject to a vote by the full Senate before ordinances against smoking in it can move to the House for consideration.

Cuba policy changes are asked

The White House on April to second-hand smoke, and 14 announced the relaxing of restrictions on travel to Cuba and on sending money to the Caribbean island nation that has been under communist rule since 1959.

Upon that news, Texas Agriculture Commissioner Todd Staples wrote a letter to President Obama asking for two more changes:

- 1. The easing of travel restrictions for Cubans seeking trade opportunities with the U.S. and those traveling for educational purposes; and
- 2. The authorization of a Texas-based air service that will offer direct flights to Cuba.

"While I disagree with Cuba's political philosophy, Staples said, "I believe by expanding trade, Cubans can see the success of democracy and embrace a free market society, and at the same time, Texans will benefit through job growth.'

April sales tax receipts reported

Texas Comptroller Susan Combs said the state received \$1.58 billion in sales tax revenue in March, down 3.8 percent compared to March

"Continued weakness in many important sectors, such as retail trade, mining and construction, resulted in a significant decrease in March sales tax collections," Combs said. "While year to date sales tax revenue is up 1.9 percent for fiscal 2009, further declines are expected this year."

Cities, counties, transit systems and special purpose taxing districts will receive \$409.9 million in April sales tax allocations, a 2.2 percent decrease compared to April 2008. So far in 2009, monthly sales tax allocations to local governments remain up by 1.2 percent.

Comptroller Combs will send April sales tax allocations of \$275.7 million to Texas cities, down 1.9 percent compared to April 2008. Calendar year-to-date, city sales tax allocations are running 0.8 percent higher than last year. Texas counties will receive sales tax payments of \$26 million, up 0.4 percent compared to one year ago. Calendar year-to-date, county sales tax allocations are 5.7 percent higher than last year.

In addition, 149 special purpose taxing districts around the state are getting \$16 million in sales tax, up 12.7 percent compared to last April. Ten local transit systems will receive \$92.2 million in sales tax rebates, down 5.8 percent compared to a year ago.

March state sales tax revenue and April payments made to local governments represent sales that occurred in February.

The Comptroller's next sales tax allocation will be made on Friday, May 8.

"The June Area Survey is one of the largest and most comprehensive surveys conducted each year by NASS," explained Doug Rundle, director of the NASS Texas Field Office. "By providing an in-depth look at land uses and agricultural activities, the survey provides the most timely, accurate and useful information on the current condition of U.S. agriculture.

"Understanding that the information we gather is only as good as the source it comes from, we are counting on the most reliable, frontline source of stated Rundle. All reports are information for this survey-the available on the NASS web site approved. producers themselves," added Rundle.

During the first two weeks of June, NASS representatives will visit predetermined areas of land

During the upcoming in Texas and conduct personal interviews with the owners and operators of any farm or ranch on that land. NASS will collect information on farm numbers, crop acreage, genetically modified crop acreage, grain stocks, livestock inventory, cash rents and land values, and the value of sales.

> The information from the June Area Survey will be used extensively by NASS in its ongoing survey and estimation programs. The survey provides direct data, or is a critical component, for a host of NASS reports, including: the monthly Crop Production report, annual Acreage report and inventory reports for Cattle, Hogs and Pigs, and Sheep and Goats.

As with all NASS surveys, information provided by respondents is confidential by law. "NASS safeguards the confidentiality of all responses and publishes only state- and national-level data, ensuring that no individual operation or producer can be identified," www.nass,usda.gov. Why is fiber important to nutrition?

One of the most important effects of fiber is to provide bulk to help the body get rid of waste products. Fiber absorbs many times its own weight in liquid, helping to keep feces soft and bulky and to prevent constipation. Soluble fiber also has been shown to help control blood sugar levels, to change the way the body digests fats, and to lower blood cholesterol levels.

Fiber makes a person feel full even though it does not contribute calories. Thus, it is important in controlling weight. There also is some evidence that a high-fiber diet may lessen the risk of heart attack, adult diabetes, and certain cancers, but these benefits have not yet been proved.

ACRE enrollment opens April 27

County Executive Director of USDA's Farm Service Agency in Haskell announced that producers can elect and enroll in the Average Crop Revenue Election (ACRE) program beginning April 27. ACRE is a provision of the 2008 Farm

"The Average Crop Revenue Election program is an innovative alternative to the traditional farm safety," Brzozowski said. "This new option presents an opportunity for producers to review both programs and decide which one will work best for their operation."

Producers have until Aug. 14, 2009, to make their decision for the 2009 crop. USDA will not accept any late-filed applications.

Producers who elect the ACRE program for a farm agree to:

forgo counter-cyclical payments;

accept a 20-percent reduction of the direct payments; and

accept a 30-percent reduction in loan rates for all commodities produced on the

Commodities eligible for ACRE payments are wheat, corn, grain sorghum, barley, oats, upland cotton, long grain rice, medium and short grain rice, peanuts, soybeans, sunflower seed, canola, flaxseed, safflower, mustard

Glenn R. Brzozowski, seed, rapeseed, sesame seed, crambe, dry peas, lentils, small chickpeas and large chickpeas.

The ACRE program was created in the 2008 Farm Bill to give producers an option in lieu of traditional countercyclical payments. Producers may elect and enroll in ACRE for the 2009 crop year even if they have already accepted advance direct payments under the Direct and Countercyclical Program.

To elect ACRE for a farm, producers must complete Form CCC-509 ACRE, which irrevocably elects ACRE for the farm through crop year 2012. Form CCC-509, the contract to participate in ACRE, must then be completed each year the producer intends to participate and receive benefits.

"This analysis will give them an excellent idea of where they currently stand," Thompson said. "Comparing their findings with others helps them establish both to register contact Thompson at short- and-long term goals for their herd."

"We've enjoyed relatively good calf prices over the last several years, but history and current economic conditions tell us that may not last forever," Thompson said. "That's why developing a sound ranch plan and overall efficiency overview is so important now."

Event organizers ask participants to register as early as possible, so they can gather and organize the records and data needed to complete the analysis.

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

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


