One Hunared and Twelve Bales of Cotton Burnea at Houston.

Houston, Tex., Jan. 7.-Yesterday morning the International and Great Northern sheds were found to be ablaze. Despite the efforts of the fire department to extinguish the fire the building was nearly destroyed. On the platform adjacent to the shed were sixty-three bales of cotton belonging to Davis. Watts & Co. and insured with the Hartford insurance company, which were entirely consumed. Two cars containing forty-nine bales of cotton, standing on the track, were also burned, together with their contents. Two passenger coaches standing on the sidetrack were entirey consumed and two baggae cars partially destroyed. The train dispatcher's office was also slightly damaged by fire and water. OUR ST. LOUIS LETTER. The Growth of a Teny-The New Water Works Conduit Completed-A Musical Success.

Sr. Louis, Mo., Jan. 5, 1893.—Between years of census-taking, one who wants accurate information about the population of a city can get it much better from the reports of the watertax collectors than from the voting lists. People cannot dodge the pay-ment of a water tax as they can the taxes on real and personal property.
If the water tax is not paid the water is shut off promptly. Water is used in every house, and the receipts increase in a steady ratio with the population. The water collections of St. Louis went over those of the year preceding in 1809 by more than a quarter of a million dolfars, and this is interpreted by the statisticians to mean that the city has gained in the last year about a hundred thousand people, who live in dwellings and pay their taxes. These figures, are borne out by the reports for last year from other departments whose work increases with the population. The building of new houses last year put twenty-three million dollars in the pockets of mechanics, and demanded the lighting of many more miles of streets by electricity. On the last day of the year the city paid bills for the lighting of 418 miles of streets and

Water Commissioner Holman made the city a New Year's gift by completing the million dollar conduit which is to conduct the water from the river water-works. This conduit was the most difficult and important part of the whole system. It was begin two years ago, and work on it has been going on, night and day, ever since. It will easily carry the one hundred and fifty million gallons of water a day which the new engines are to pump. The building of the conduit was the engineering feat of the work, and its completion relieves the Commissioner of all anxiety. By next fall, when the sight-seers begin to arrive for the festivities here, a drive over the Broadway Boulevard to the Chain of Rocks, where the new works are, will be a

The soil is an alluvial loam of great depth and fertility, varying in color from a red to a dark chocolate, and by reason of its porosity and friable nature, when thoroughly plowed, readily drinks in the rainfall and for the like reason the soil readily drains itself of the surplus water, thereby preventing stagnation of the water and the baking of the soil, and the germination of misams. It is those peculiar qualities of soil that enables vegetation to withstand all varieties of weather.

Except mesquite grubs and stemps which are easily extracted, there are no obstructions to plows and the land being level or generally rolling and easy worked, the use of labor-saying implements are profitable. One man with machinery and a little hired help has been known to cultivate over an 100 scree in grain and cotton.
