The FREE PRESS was purchased by us in May 1886, and has been under our management ever since.

When we assumed the responsibility of editing the paper, that was to assist in shaping the future morals of a new town and county we, realized the great responsibility, and undertook the work with the hope that the truth and right would point us to success.

No one will ever know the great difficulties we had to encounter and the opposition we had to meet, and when we take a retrospective view of the past, and see the result of seven years labor, we are fired with new ambition and inspired with new hope.

We have during these years of constant labor, witnessed the building of a new town and the settlement of the same with the most progressive and enlightened people of the age. We look around and see the evidence of thrift and prosperity on every hand, a perfect net work of wire fences inclosing broad acres of growing wheat and fresh turned sod, farm houses shimmering in the mirage in every direction, where only a few short years ago, herds of wild antelope galloped away or rested peacefully upon the plains.

In the Georgia legislature the bill was before the committee of the whole for the establishment of a confederate home by the state. The only negro in the house, M. H. Styles, arose and said:

"Although I am not a confederate soldier, I was a confederate soldier's servant, and I have nothing but praise for those who fought for what they thought was right. In their own places I would have done the same thing. I believe that a monument ought to be erected in Georgia to the bravery of the men who bore part in the great struggle. We are willing notwithstanding our color, to be taxed for the support of the home. Whatever is for the glory of Georgia we are for it. I have not got much to say on this question, because it is a white folks' question. I was raised with those who are now in their graves; for those who have died on the battle-field, I lived and went to school, except that I only took the books to school and they studied the lessons."

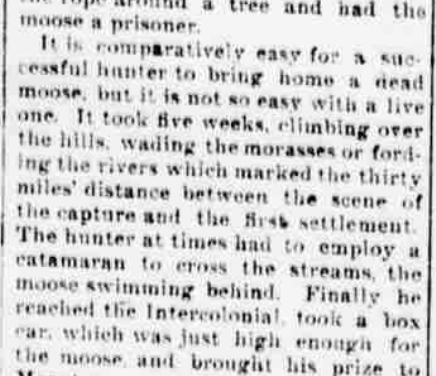
