D. 1888 against Mrs. R. H. Hanna and her husband R. H. Hanna, and all other persons interested in the estate of the said Hubert DeFazaz dec'd and alleging in substance as follows to-wit:

W. cor. of this survey. Thence east 1900 vrs a stake. Thence north 1900 vrs a stake from which a mesquite brs N. 71 W. 112 vrs a mesquite brs N. 85° W. 16 vrs.

Thence west 1900 vrs to the beginning. That the said Hubert DeFazaz was the person last lawfully seized of the said estate and that the said Hubert DeFazaz died without any devise of said estate, and without having heirs of him the said Hubert DeFazaz deceased that there are no persons in actual possession of said estate and that the said Mrs. R. The Belle Starr Murder.

Fort Smith, Ark., Feb. 20.—Jim Starr, husband of the late Belle Starr, and Pearl Younger her daughter, arrived here to-day accompanied by ten witnesses against E. A. Watson the man now in jail charged with the murder of the bandit queen. Starr says he has sufficient evidence to bind Watson over and can procure more evidence if necessary. The case will come up for examination before United States Commissioner Brisolara to-morrow or next day.

WHITECAPISM.

A Panin County School Teacher Boston Until His Life is Despaired of.

Bonham, Tex., Feb. 23.—Merge information reached town this evening of an outrage occurring at the village of Randolph, ten miles from here last night, bordering on white capism. Professor Roeger, who was teaching the school at Randolph, was taken from his house by ten or twelve unknown men and beaten until his life is despaired of. No reason is assigned for the outrage Professor Roeger was formerly a teacher in the College at this place is an inoffensive man and liked by all who know him. Officers left this evening to investigate.

A TRAIN ROBBED.

One Man Killed and Another Badly Wounded By the Robbers.

DELANO, CAL., Feb. 23.—As train No. 17 left Pixley last evening five men boarded it. They went on the engine and two of them covered the engineer and fireman with revolvers, and when about two miles from the station the train was brought to a stop. The other three men then went to the express car and ordered the messenger to open his box, covering him at the same time with revolvers. Dynamite bombs were exploded under the car, and during the excitement several passengers ran toward the front. Two of them were shot, E. S. Bently of Modesto probably fatally wounded and Charles Gilbert of Roso killed instantly. The train ran back to Pixley, where the news was left. The passenger coaches were not molested.

Another account states that but two men were concerned in the robbery, and that while one remained on the engine the other made his way to the express car, and by exploding the bombs under the car so frightened the messengers that they speedily opened the door. The amount secured by the robbers is unknown. A posse will pursue them from here.
