TEXAS WORLD'S FAIR EXHIBITION CONVENTION.

HOUSTON TEX., OCT. 17th, 1890.
To Free Press,
Haskell Texas,
Dear Sirs:
Your attention is respectfully requested to the following call:
TO THE PEOPLE OF TEXAS:
The great Columbian Exposition takes place in Chicago in 1892 and promises to be the most stupendous affair of the kind in the world's history. It is of the supreme importance to Texas that our state, with its unlimited wealth and incomparable resources should be adequately, intelligently and systematically represented and portrayed at the great world's Fair. Much time and labor, expense and preparation will be required to accomplish this object. Recognizing these facts, and recognizing for dear that an initiatory movement looking to this desirable end was necessary, the citizens of Houston have resolved to put the ball in motion. In accordance with this determination a mass meeting was held and the undersigned committee appointed to issue the call for a State convention to be held in the city of Houston, December 10, 1890, for the purpose of taking concerted State action looking to Texas' interests and representations at the great World's Fair. WAS DOING THE TOWN.

The Day Gone by When Drunks Can Ride Their Horses Into Saloons in Texas.
LAREDO, Tex.; Oct. 27.—About 9 o'clock this evening a young man named Thomas Ferrera was taking to the town on horseback and rode into a saloon in the lower end of town. A deputy sheriff attempted to arrest him and the horseman stood him off with a six shooter. An affidavit was made against the offender and two officers started to execute it. They found him in front of another saloon and an altercation followed. The evidence conflicts as to who fired the first shot. Ferrera was shot through the body and through the wrist. Officers E. J. Hall and Thomas Garcia were the parties who attempted to make the arrest. Hall received a bullet through the parietal sinus and went to the residence of his uncle, where he was cared for by relatives and a physician. He made a dying declaration to the effect that the officers fired upon him first before he drew his pistol. Other witnesses contradict this. The affair is liable to cause bad blood, but it is hoped that the matter may be settled in the courts without causing bloodshed. Both the participants, Ferrera and Hall are members of large families and have many relatives in the city.

HURRAH for Cockrell.

The cheap circular racket failed to gull the people.

The supposed short comings of Judge Cockrell is not a safe platform to run for office on. Taint wide enough.

The Election at this place passed off quietly. All the contests were well fought but it is generally conceded that the canvass was a fair one.

The State democratic ticket was elected by a large majority. The railroad amendment is running way behind Hogg and the balance of the ticket.

The Packing House Company at Fort Worth gave an exhibition the other day and killed and prepared ten hogs for the smoke house in twelve minutes.

The taxable values of Haskell county for the year 1890 was \$1,225,000 that of 1891 the \$2,150,192 the increase in ten years was \$2,148,967. The increase will exceed \$8,000,000 at least in the next ten years.

Ed. Free Press: Every legislator ought to see that a law will be made to enforce the rendering of all lands notes, stocks and bonds and that no foreclosure on deeds of trust can be had unless tax receipts are attached to the vendor lien. Let every corporation be taxed to the full amount of capital their charter called for.

Some of our neighbors have onions, potatoes, tomatoes snap beans, beets, lettuce etc., growing in their garden.

We regret very much to lose Mr. Law and Dr. Walker and their amiable families from our community, but, owing to the untimely condition of their lands they leave us for a home in Dickens county.

The bridge on the Brazos completed and the forces are bridging the Wichita on the Benjamin and Vernon road. While Mrs. W. A. Bailey was gathering water-melons to put up for winter use she was bitten by a rattlesnake. Notwithstanding the almost immediate application of fire and ammonia she has suffered, for a week under close medical attention.

THE SCHOOL QUESTION.

A few facts bearing upon the School Question.

The question of incorporating being up for discussion the Free Press takes liberty to make a statement of the steps to be taken to accomplish such an end as no one has yet touched upon the mode of procedure and the probable resources upon which we depend for results desired.

To incorporate, a petition with twenty qualified voters names subscribed will have to be presented to the county Judge for an election for incorporation. If successful five trustees will have to be elected, next a tax not to exceed 50 cents on the hundred dollars valuation would have to be levied by a vote of two-thirds majority.

While the statute is not altogether clear we believe the further rate of 25 cents on the hundred dollars valuation could be levied and coupon interest bearing (not more than 6 per cent per annum.) Bonds could be issued to build a school building.

It will be noticed that a better

rate of tax for school purposes is allowed than under the district system which does not allow but 20 cents on the hundred dollars valuation and nothing for building purposes. From our knowledge of values and the territory subject to incorporation for this purpose, we would estimate the total values that would be included by the incorporation not to exceed \$250,000. Jan. 1st 1891 the assessment for Jan. 1st 1890 as shown by the tax rolls being \$80885. We place the values of 1891 to be greatly in excess of these of 1890 because property in Haskell has advanced since Jan. 1st 1890 at least four hundred per cent not taking into consideration the numerous addition to the town of Haskell proper made since Jan. 1st 1890.

With the values of 1891 as indicated and we do not think it exaggerated, \$1250 could be added to the present school fund, and \$625 for building purposes. Bonds could be issued for \$5000 due in twenty years, and \$5000 could be raised by private subscription.

In this connection it would be proper to state that of the \$1875 \$93 would have to be paid for assessing and collecting the tax.

\$10,000 would build a commodious addition to the present building, that would answer for several years for school purposes. The \$625 would pay the interest and create a sufficient sinking fund. The local taxpayers have been contributing yearly three to ten times as much by voluntary subscription as their taxes would be.

The non-resident reaps the benefit and does but little to help build up these institutions which alone make it possible for their land to find a market. We favor the corporate assumption of control of the free school as being far superior to turning our magnificent school fund over to some private institution. We want to see an interest taken in the matter and want to see the same carefully considered. There is no use of any one taking sides in this issue until they have carefully considered same. The majority of men usually take sides as soon as an issue is presented and it is almost impossible to convince or convert as it is human nature and the virtue of fools it is said, to be consistent even if they have to do a known wrong act, to the injury of themselves.

Undoubted Democratic Victories.

NEW YORK, Nov. 5 2 a. m.—Returns thus far received indicate the election to the state assembly of sixty-eight Democrats and sixty Republicans.

In Pennsylvania, twenty four counties, including Allegheny, but not including Philadelphia, give Pattison (D.) for governor a net plurality of 7165, a Democratic gain over the last gubernatorial election of 19735. Philadelphia gives a Republican majority of about 19,000. At the Democratic state headquarters it is claimed Pattison is elected by a 10,000 majority.

Returns from Illinois show that ten Republicans and six Democrats congressmen are surely elected. The remaining four districts remain in doubt.

In Florida the Democratic state ticket has 15,000 majority.

In Tennessee the Democratic majority for governor is about 25,000. The third congressional district, which was in doubt elected a Democrat.

The New York legislature is undoubtedly Democratic on a joint ballot, this insures the election of Democratic United States senator.

The Democratic state central committee of Missouri claims a solid congressional delegation from that state, as also does the state committee of Maryland.

From California the returns are very meagre, but indicate the election of Markham (R.) for governor.

The counties as far as heard from, give the following majorities; Haskell 100, Jones 25, Throckmorton 40, Baylor 135, Knox 180 for Cockrell. Stonewall 12 for Cunningham. Cockrell's friends claim the district by 600 to 1000 majority, but the Cunningham men say it will not exceed 500.

For District attorney, Wilfong carried Haskell, Craig carried Jones Stonewall and Throckmorton by a large majority, Campbell carried Knox and Baylor by a handsome majority.

The present reports show Craig to have been elected. Little general interest was felt in the election except in the race for county and district officers.

The clerk's race was close and exciting. The friends of both candidates took quite an active part in the election.

Four More Indictments.
Graham Leader.
Yesterday afternoon, Oct. 30, after the Leader had gone to press with its regular edition, the federal grand jury made their final report to the court.
As they solemnly filed into court, headed by their foreman, a dead silence fell upon the officers and spectators present. The bundle of paper in the hand of the foreman proved that they had been at work. Passing the documents up to the court the foreman announced that there was no further business before the grand jury, and Judge McCormack discharged them, thanking them for their prompt and patient attendance upon the court.
In a short time deputy marshals were scouring the town with warrants for the men indicted, and the work of arresting defendants began.
David Allen, commonly called Dink Allen, was the first man arrested, and then followed the arrests of Robert Holman, T. B. Collier, Marlon Walker and John Y. Leavell in quick succession. The deputies then got a fresh supply of warrants and the next time they issued forth they brought in Sam Waggoner, W. R. Benedict, E. W. Johnson, Pink Brook, Dick Brook and Will Hollis. Later in the afternoon they arrested Jack Wilkins.

The prisoners were taken to the federal court house and pleased under a strong guard. They were all arrested under a charge of conspiracy to deprive citizens of their rights under the constitution and laws of the United States and murder in the first degree in pursuance of the conspiracy.
Several of the defendants have been arrested heretofore for offenses growing out of the same transaction and were on bail but were reindicted on a charge of murder. The cases against Robert Holman, Dink Allen, E. W. Johnson and W. C. Hollis are all new cases, these parties having never heretofore been indicted for the Marlow killing.
Mr. Hollis was one of the guards at the time of the killing. Dink Allen is a farmer who resides near Belknap.
The sheriff and constable both being under arrest, the duties of the sheriff are now performed by Deputy sheriff I. H. Carmichael, who was appointed by Sheriff Collier some days ago. Had it not been for his presence in town we would have been without a peace officer in Graham last night.
Other arrests are expected today, but it is not known as yet whether others were indicted or not.
Excitement runs pretty high over the matter and various opinions are expressed as to the course the authorities will take. It is thought that the most of them will be allowed bail by the court. To-day is the day set for trial of the consolidated cases, but it will probably be postponed until the new cases can be consolidated with them and all can be tried together.
