—On last Friday night this place was visited by one of the greatest thunder storms ever known, it storm came up about 9 o'clock P. M., the clouds were heavy and the lighting flashed, the earth trembled, houses shook, dishes and irons suspended on the wall fell down, chandeliers, lamps vibrated in a circle and the houses trembled. During the storm, the lightning struck the Methodist parsonage, which is built in T shape. It struck flue in center of roof at the conjunction of roof of hall and south room which formed the stem of T ran down the flue to cook stove in west room and heating stove in east room. Mr. and Mrs. Harroldson were sitting by the stove in east room. Mr. Harroldson's feet were resting on the zinc under the stove, a hole was knocked through the zinc on both sides of his feet. He and his wife were both knocked over and shocked and every thing in the room demolished. All windows were broken to atoms except the one by Mrs. Harroldson. In kitchen the current left the flue entered partition wall went to north wall and tore off the west corner piling the safe and contents consisting of eggs, pickles, preserves, can fruit etc., into the center of the room. It also run down gutters and entered south room at northwest and northeast corners knocking a large hole in roof near eaves run along under plates on east and west wall burning a streak two feet wide on wall paper and going out at each corner at south tearing off corners and knocking the gable loose from sill as well as most of both sides of room, letting the boxing drop to ground, everything in room including bedstead was torn up, the floor and ceiling split. The fluid left the house at south struck the gate demolished it and burned the bottom wire of the fence into a dozen pieces.
