New Frontal Appearance, Mechanical Advances Feature 1953 Oldsmobile

Completely new in frontal appearance and offering other styling changes inside and out as well as many mechanical advances, the 1953 Oldsmobile models are being introduced Friday, Jan. 9, by Oldsmobile dealers throughout the country.

Among the important improvements in the new models, according to J. F. Wolfram, Oldsmobile general manager and vice president of General Motors, are further increases in efficiency of the "Rocket" engine, resulting in increased fuel economy and performance; compression ratio raised to 8 to 1, which also boosts the horsepower; a more efficient 12-volt ignition system; Frigidaire car conditioning that cools the car interior in the warmest weather, and "Pedal-Ease" power brakes to provide faster, safer stops.

The Frigidaire conditioning and power brakes are optional equipment available at extra cost. Two popular items first introduced in 1952, GM power steering and the Autronic Eye automatic headlight dimmer, also are offered again as optional extras. Hydro-matic Super Drive, the pioneer and most proven of automatic transmissions, also is on the optional list. Directional signals are standard

equipment on all 1953 series. Three series of Oldsmobile cars are presented in 1953. The Classic "98" series has been extended to 215 inches in length and is built in three body styles—the four-door sedan, Holiday coupe and convertible coupe. Four body styles are available in the popular Super "88" series—four-door sedan, Holiday coupe and convertible coupe. Both the "98" and Super "88" are powered by a 165-horsepower "Rocket" engine. The economically priced Deluxe "88" series has two body types—two-door sedan and four-door sedan—and is powered by a 150 HP version of the "Rocket" engine. Wheelbase is 124 inches on the "98" series and 120 inches on the two "88" series.

Distinguishing the 1953 Oldsmobile is a new front bumper and grille assembly. The bumper and grille have been gracefully redesigned, with two distinctive oval ornaments serving as supports for the upper bar. The name Oldsmobile is inscribed on this bar in metal letters. Parking lights under the headlights are in new round recesses.

Both the Classic "98" and the Super "88" are enhanced by a new narrow sash, stone shield and decorative chrome trim on the rear fender and quarter panel. This accentuates the long, low lines that characterize the 1953 Oldsmobiles. The rear end of the 1952 Super "88" has higher fenders and a higher contour on the deck lid that emphasize the horizontal lines of the car.

Color combinations and upholstery options on the 1953 Oldsmobiles are the most varied in the division's history. Choice of 16 solid and 49 two-tone color combinations is offered to buyers. Nylon cloth, garbardin and broadcloth are among the upholstery materials available in the "98" and Super "88" series.

Setting off the interior styling is an entirely new instrument panel, which has two circular recesses on either side. The instrument cluster is located in the left-hand recess in front of the driver giving ready visibility for the gauges, speedometer and Hydra-Matic Drive indicator. The latter has been transferred from the steering column and electrically actuated.

The right hand recess of the instrument panel houses the radio

speaker and electric clock when those accessories are ordered. The glove compartment is located in the direct center of the panel and is flanked on each side by a convenient ash receiver, which is readily accessible to any passenger. When the door of the glove compartment is down, it can serve as a handy tray. A safety-padded top for the instrument panel, made of flexible non-reflecting plastic over foam rubber, can be ordered as optional extra equipment or the "88" series.

In going from a six-volt to a 12-volt electrical system for 1953 Oldsmobile has obtained higher capacity to meet the increasing demands of the engine and the accessories that have been added in recent years. Improved cold

weather starting and better ignition are two immediate benefits of the 12-volt system. The new 12-volt, 70-ampere battery has 30 per cent greater over-all capacity than the six-volt which it supercedes. The new 30-ampere output generator has a third greater capacity. Other new components required of the electrical system for 1953 are the starter, voltage regulator, ignition coil, lights horns and wiring.

Front tread of the 1953 models has been increased in all series from 58 to 59 inches, improving stability and ride characteristics. Front frame design has been altered to meet the requirements of the wider tread. Bigger front wheel bearings have been installed to increase the safety factor



Of Farm Bureau
Slated Jan. 15**

Legislative strategy and organization plans for the Texas Farm Bureau in 1953 will be discussed at a special District 3 conference of state and local Farm Bureau leaders Jan. 15 at the YWCA in Wichita Falls, according to Loy D. Barbour, state director from this district.

The meeting is one of a series of legislative and organization conferences being held this month in 12 of the 13 Farm Bureau districts in the state. The session will begin at 10 a. m. with a report on the last state board meeting by the district director.

Legislative, organization and publicity conferences start at 11 a. m. and continue until noon.

Conferences will resume at 1 p. m. and continue until 2 p. m. At this time, DeVaney will speak to the assembly on "Challenge to Farm Bureau Federation." Following his talk, Lane will speak on the topic "Now Is The Time." A discussion period is scheduled after the speeches.

To be discussed in the conference will be issues expected to come before the 53rd session of the Texas Legislature which meets Jan. 13 in Austin. These include legislation affecting rural roads, non-highway gas rebates, water and seed laws and many more issues vital to persons engaged in agriculture. The Texas Farm Bureau Federation was considered the most influential lobby at the last legislative session.

**Special Attention
Should Be Given
To School Lunch**

To assure good health for children, special attention should be paid to the school lunch, declared Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer. If good nutrition is obtained the diet must include meat, milk, butter, fruit, vegetables and whole grain and enriched cereals in proper quantities.

Inadequate lunches can deprive children of the nutrition necessary for good health and intelligent work at school. A sandwich and a soft drink are not sufficient even though the child may have a good breakfast and evening meal.

A child's lunch should provide at least one third of the daily food requirements. Whether eaten at home or at school, it should include one half pint of milk, a substantial protein food as meat, egg, cheese or peanut butter sandwich, a vegetable for fruit or both and whole grain or enriched bread with butter. While home hot food is desirable, well planned cold lunches can be both appetizing and nutritious.

In addition to being nutritious and palatable, food should be safe. Food from unsafe sources or prepared under unsanitary conditions may result in illness. Milk should be pasteurized. Attention should be paid to the selection of wholesome meat, poultry, vegetables and other foods. It is also important that perishable foods prepared and stored in school kitchens be properly refrigerated.

**Experts Scan
Hunting Data**

Austin, Jan. 6—Conclusion of the major game harvest has switched the spotlight on studies to determine the significance of trends among the various species.

The director of Wildlife Restoration for the Game and Fish Commission said his staff will be occupied for the next two months analyzing field reports based on the annual fall shoot and getting plans for 1953 into operation.

He said the data accumulated from various sources may reach record proportions by information received to date. The director cited the roundup of the big game hunt in Freestone County which was opened for a short season following the restocking program begun several years ago.

"We already have obtained a pretty good picture of the restocking operation in that county," he said, "This is to the credit of landowners and sportsmen who cooperated with our men in the field."

"We use such material as a yardstick to determine future work. We base both our short range programs and long range objectives on such harvest surveys. Therefore, it is indispensable in any modern restoration undertaking."

The director said reports on the deer season were particularly gratifying. "This is mainly because observations indicate that the deer herds continue to spread over wider areas. This progress is desirable for many obvious reasons. But one important benefit is that the herds, thus dispersed are less susceptible to unpredictable local population slumps."

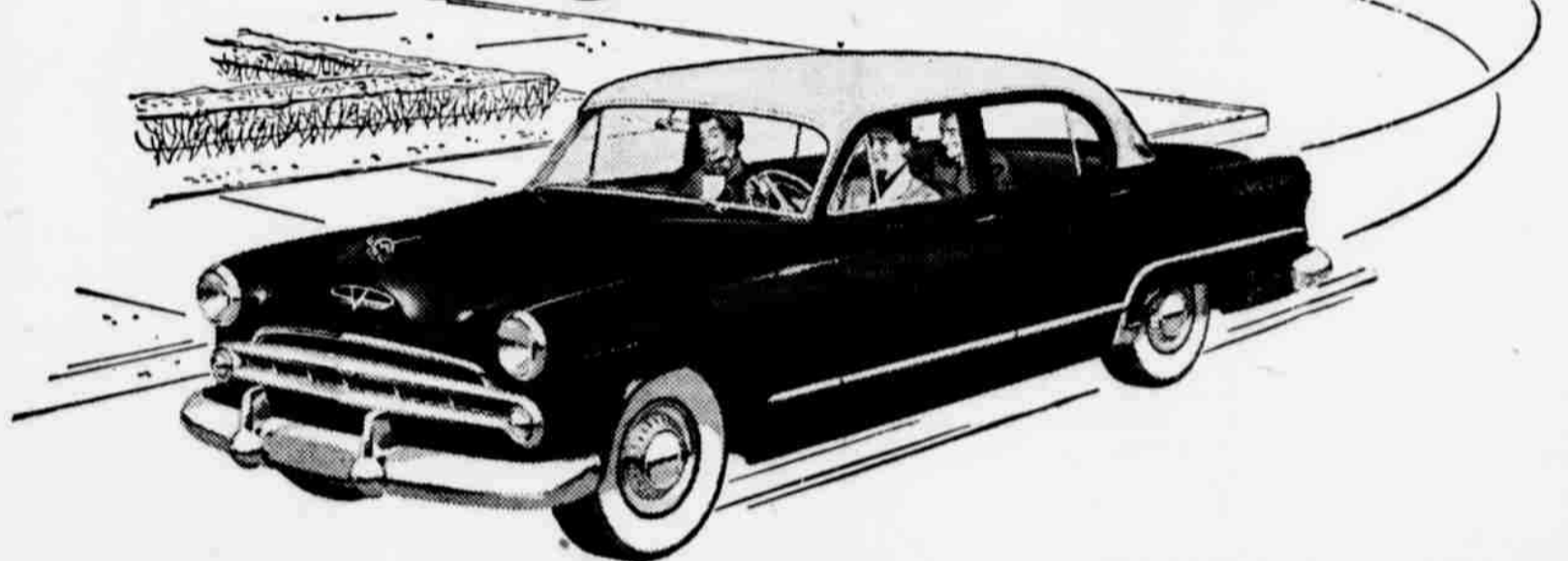

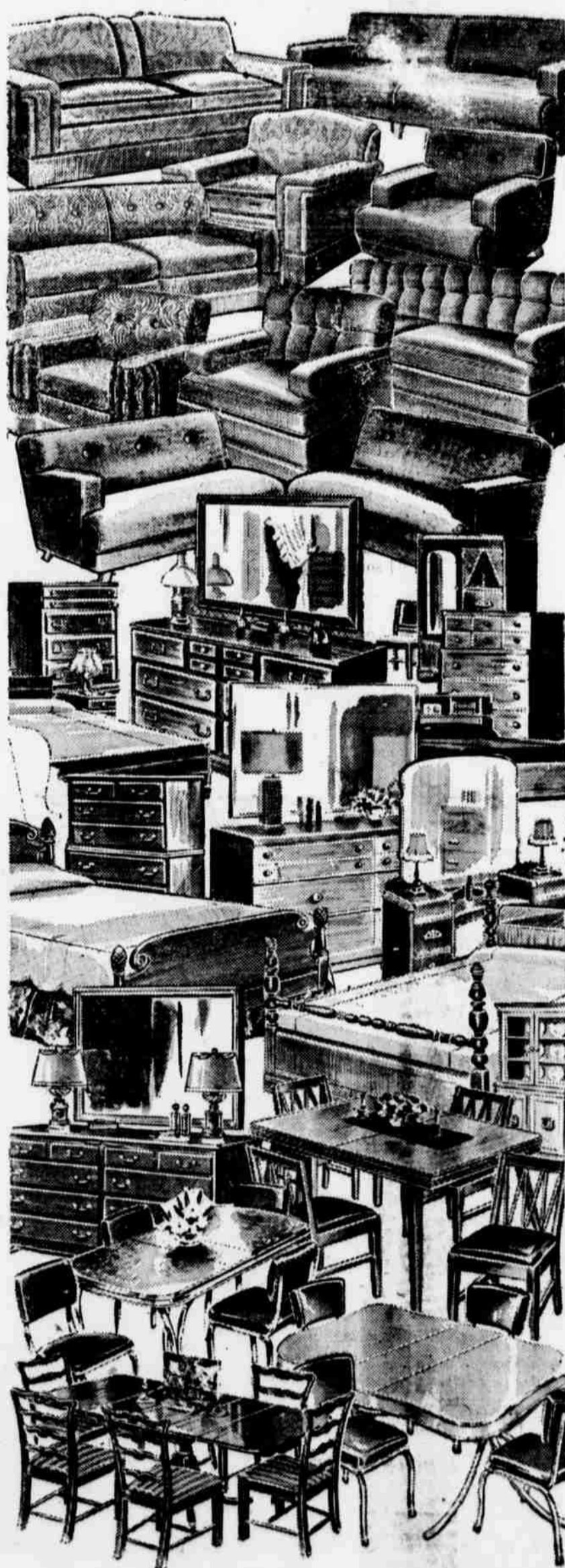

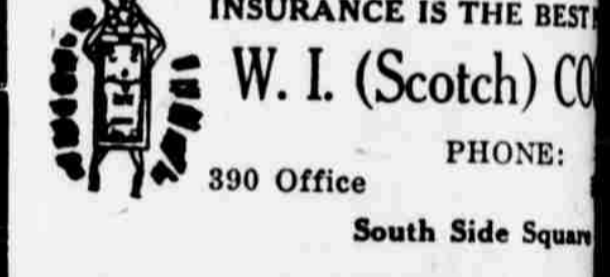
