C-C Asks Listings Of Apartments And Houses

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Announcement of the meeting was made Tuesday by John W. Brock, chairman of the Haskell County Agricultural Mobilization Committee. In addition to bankers and livestock producers, farmers and merchants of all leading agencies, have been invited.

Purpose of the meeting will be to discuss the possibility of securing Government assistance to purchase emergency feed. Related needs of farm and livestock industry that have arisen because of the prolonged drouth, will also be discussed.

At this meeting initial steps will be taken to place Haskell County in line for purchase of hay, and William E. Lawson of the Farmers Home Administration will explain the financing of the purchase program.

If some type of Government emergency program is found advisable, plans for working out details to make the program operative will be outlined at the meeting.

Mr. Lawson and George Pool of Rule, attended a meeting in Abilene Monday, where area farmers and livestock men discussed drouth conditions in this section, and the availability of funds to relieve the situation. They were told by L. J. Cappleman, State FHA director, that funds would be available for helping finance the 1953 crop, if the program is approved for Texas.

Social Security Representative Here Today

Ralph T. Fisher, manager of the Abilene office of the Social Security Administration, was in Haskell today. He spent most of the morning at the Chamber of Commerce office, where he assisted persons wishing to file retirement claims or survivor's claims under the Social Security Act. Fisher called attention to the fact that increases in retirement payments and survivor's payments recently voted by Congress do not go into effect until September 1. The checks received in August and those received in September will be at present rates. The first checks that will include the increased amounts will be those mailed October 3. These increases are automatic and no action is necessary for the retired worker or the survivor to receive the increase. Increases for the retired workers will average about \$6.00 a month.

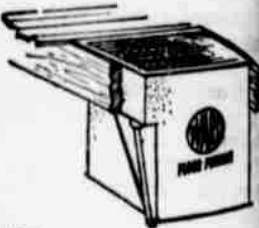

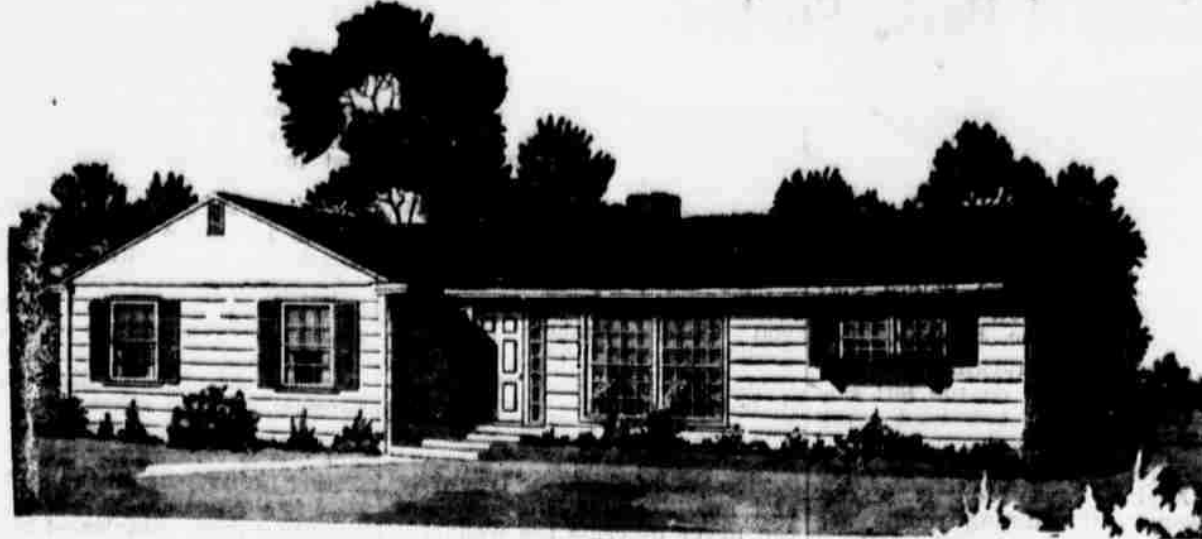

New Home Features Novel Space Arrangement



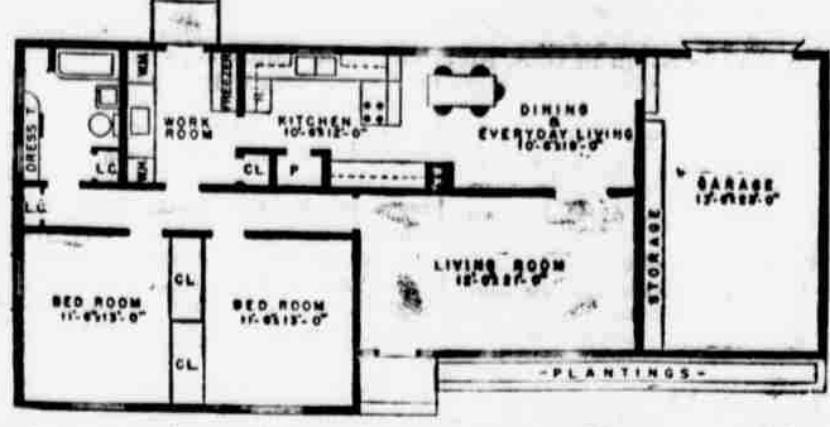
HOUSE PLAN No. 39

Texas Called On For 2,733 Men In October Draft

AUSTIN.—State Selective Service headquarters was called on Thursday to furnish 2,733 men for the armed forces in October, the state's share of a national call of 47,000. This is the heaviest call placed on Texas since March 1951 and all inductees will be utilized by the Army.

Lt. Col. Morris C. Schwartz deputy state Selective Service director, said quotas for local boards will be computed and put in the mail next week.

The October quota will be filled with men 20 years old or older. State Selective Service headquarters said that at present it appears Texas can furnish around 400 men in October who will be 21 or older. The remainder of the quota will have to come from the 20-year-old group.

The local boards will not be able to send any man for induction in October below the age of 20 with the exception of delinquents and volunteers.

The October call compares with a September call of 1,188, previously announced. The October 1951 call was for only 807 men

Average Income In Texas Under National Level

The average Texan is taking home a fatter pay envelope. But his income is still lower than the national average.

U. S. Department of Commerce figures showed this week that the per capita income in Texas rose from \$1,276 in 1950 to \$1,412 in 1951—up 14 per cent.

But the national per capita income in 1951 was \$1,584, which is 11 per cent more than the per capita income in Texas.

The figures were released by Ernest Tutt, regional director at Dallas for the Commerce Department.

The income figures include income from all sources, including wages, salaries, sale of farm products, dividends, interest, rents, social insurance benefits, pensions and even relief payments.

Fresh Pears Bring Tasty Addition to Family Menu

Pears can be served either fresh, cooked or preserved, according to the foods and nutrition specialists with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. This makes the new crop now on the market good

news to the family menu planners.

Pear producers in the western region of the United States are harvesting 19 million bushels which should be plentiful for the next few weeks. The southern crop which will follow should give everyone a chance to enjoy the fruit at a nominal cost.

To the diet conscious the specialists point out that a medium size pear only has 70 calories. They suggest baked pears to eat on to eat. Select the small sweet early pears and bake in the oven just as you do apples.

To can baked pears, remove from the oven while hot and pack in hot sterilized containers. Fill jars full with boiling medium syrup. Seal. Then process in the water bath 10 minutes.

The leaflet L-19, It's Pear Time which has other pear recipes, is free for the asking at the office of the county home demonstration agent.

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Ann Katherine Rike, Nancy Burton, Home After Tour of Europe With Group of Baylor Students

Two Haskell students in Baylor University, Ann Katherine Rike and Nancy Burton, returned home last week end after a several weeks tour of Europe with a party of 22 Baylor students.

Accompanying the students on the tour were Dean Carroll of the University, and Mrs. Carroll. The trip across the Atlantic and return was made on the liner Queen Mary and the homecoming landing was August 13 at the port of New York.

Highlights of the European tour are told in the following excerpts from post cards and letters by the Haskell students:

"We landed in England with all our pomp and dignity, June 10. They had been sitting up—and taking notice."

"Sulgrave Manor, the home of our own George Washington's ancestors, and Warwick Castle with their gardens were fabulous—reminds you of the movies: dining room done in gold; in another room Queen Anne's own furniture. Warwick Castle was used as a setting for 'The Black Rose,' a recent novel. In the gardens were peacocks, Grecian urns of the 4th Century, and Oliver Cromwell's helmet."

"The biggest headache of the trip is the money-changing as you go from country to country."

"The towers of London with the Big Ben clock on the Parliament Building. The Crown Jewels were here and such magnificent sparkling I've never seen."

"St. James Palace where they proclaimed the new Queen Elizabeth II from the balcony."

"It was nerve-racking when the bus driver drove on the left side of the road—we screamed every time we passed a car."

"A lot of food is still rationed to England and food is scarce. However, the dining rooms are swank; waiters in white collars; silver, crystal and linens galore; three piece orchestras—all formality is used in serving. Reminds one of the Old South in U. S. History—they still cling to Southern traditions."

"The reason you failed to get my cablegram: I failed to put name and number of street on the address. 'Texas is so big, you know!'"

"We saw the church Elizabeth and Robert Browning were married in—have learned more history in the past week than I

learned in high school and college. The real thing makes it vivid and interesting. Did I tell you things are cheaper on the boat than they are at home? And all the European hotels polish your shoes when you put them out at night?"

"We are crazy about Scotland and her people—they love to tell you Queen Elizabeth II is of Scotch descent. They are so friendly. Their land is without high lines or sign boards. They give credit to Oliver Cromwell for the British Empire."

"We wished for a typewriter and movie camera for eyes—we can never describe the wonderful time we are having."

"Truly Holland is the land of bicycles, canals, and windmills. The little Dutch boys are dressed in long, baggy pants, and have blonde hair. Their food is not rationed—at the banquet last night the food was fit for a king."

"The hotel at Reedesheen is way up in the hills, with the Rhine flowing between. Here we ate lunch on the terrace. Some American soldiers began screaming: 'American girls, American girls!'—the first they had seen in over a year!"

"Well, Switzerland is out of this world! As we walked into our room, the door opened on to a balcony—we stood petrified—right below was Lake Lucerne. The sun made a glow behind three huge mountains going right down into the blue waters. It was like fairyland!"

"We went to a famous restaurant in Milan and a cathedral with little statues on top, built in 1300."

Spain reminds one of Wyoming and West Texas. The olive trees look very much like our mesquites."

"Tangier was so different to the other countries—you'll have to wait till I get home to tell you. Intriguing describes it. Very narrow streets with sneaky looking people staring at you. Most fabulous was the Sultan's palace where cushions were used instead of chairs. A huge patio with marble floors—fountains and plants growing everywhere—with open roof—chandeliers and painted tile walls. The garden was in keeping with the palace—altogether lovely. Men in Arabic dress—women with veils. The people Arabian, Moslems, Negroes and Spaniards."

"In Italy we saw many paintings and sculpture by the master artists. Italy still leads the world in art and painting."

Vetch Seed Lab At A&M College Swamped

One of the busiest places on the Texas A&M College campus these days is the Vetch Seed Laboratory. According to C. E. Watson, analyst for the laboratory which is operated by the agronomy department, samples are arriving at a rate in excess of what can be handled by the facilities available.

The laboratory is operating full time and extra personnel has been added to help relieve the congestion says Watson, but only 40 samples can be handled daily. Samples, on the other hand, are arriving at the rate of 50 per day and this is causing some delay in getting the reports on the samples back to the producers. Watson reports that more samples—1,200 up to August 11—have already been received than have been submitted for testing in any other season. He hopes producers will keep this in mind when reports on their samples are slow in reaching them.

He reports that generally germination tests are running a little lower than in previous years due to diseases that killed many vetch plants. More seed will thus need to be planted to make up the difference which he points out is small.

The greatly increased arrival of samples at the lab indicate that more farmers are producing vetch planting seed and that the crop continues to gain favor with farmers. Vetch seed producers are

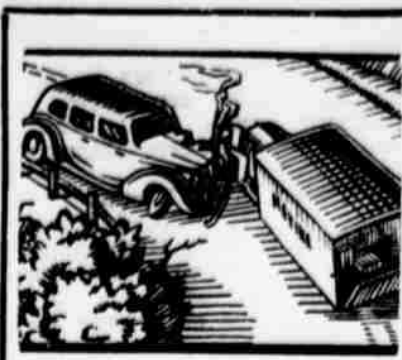
