### ATTENTION VETERANS

The Veterans Administration will soon be mailing out Form 8-4175 to Veterans who are receiving compensation at the rate of 50% or more and who are receiving additional compensation for dependents. The information given in this form will determine if they are still entitled to receive compensation for dependents.

This notice is to call to the attention of the veterans that this form VB 8-4175 must be completed and returned within thirty (30) days from the date of mailing by the Veterans Administration or the veterans compensation will be adjusted to exclude the additional compensation for dependents.

The form will have no bearing on the veterans present disability percentage rating.

### S. S. OFFICER AT COURTHOUSE FRIDAYS

C. M. Vaden Jr. of the Abilene office of Social Security Administration will be at the courthouse in Baird on Friday morning Oct. 26, Nov. 30 and Dec. 21.

"Every self-employed farm operator past the age of 65 should find out from his social security office whether it would be better for him to file his claim now or wait until after January 1, 1957," says R. R. Tuley Jr., Abilene district manager for the Social Security Administration.

In brief, according to Tuley, if the amount of farm income creditable for social security purposes in 1956 is going to be less than was the 1955 amount, filing a claim for benefits now will result in a higher benefit figure than would be true after January 1, 1957, outside of minimum benefit situations where neither year's income is much over \$500.

Such differences could range from 10c to several dollars, and comes about because a claim filed in 1956 may have the benefit computed on the 1955 income plus half of the 1956 income averaged over 18 months. On the other hand, a claim filed in 1957 will take into account the 1955 income and all of the 1956 income averaged over a 24 month period. This latter course would result in a lower average monthly earnings figure when 1956 income is not as large as was the 1955 income. All benefit amounts stem from the insured person's average monthly wages or earnings.

Tuley added that women farm operators should remember that the age figure for them to keep in mind is age 62 rather than age 65.

Since a brief article such as this cannot give all possibilities, he urges readers of this newspaper to get in touch with a representative of his office when he makes his next visit to this part of the sixteen county district serviced by the Abilene office.

### County Meets Quota For Savings Bonds

Mr. Howard Farmer, County Savings Bond Chairman, reported today that Series "E" Savings Bonds sales in Texas for September had increased 9 percent above sales of September 1955. But sales in Texas must be increased if we are to make our quota, Mr. Farmer continued.

The Series "E" sales for September were \$12,853,819; Series "H" sales were \$1,811,000. These figures compare with Series "E" sales of \$11,716,088 and Series "H" of \$2,378,000 for September 1955.

Sales in Callahan County for September were \$29,393. Sales in Callahan County for the nine months were \$231,343. This represents 110.2 percent of the quota for Callahan County.

Mr. Farmer stressed the importance of the Savings Bonds Program to the individual, the community and the nation. He stated that 2 million Texans have \$2 billion dollars invested in Savings Bonds. That much stored up buying power is reassuring for the future of our economy, he concluded.

The couple was then tied and bound with rope and adhesive tape. After remaining tied for approximately one hour and forty-five minutes, they managed to work free.

### Halloween Safety

"See and be seen on Halloween!"

That prescription for safe "haunting" was given to youngsters and their parents today by E. C. McFadden, Vice President, Employers Casualty Company, Dallas, and President of the Texas Safety Association, who urged support of the safety dark program of TSA and the National Safety Council.

"Make-believe spooks and other pranks who venture out in traffic at night wearing dark costumes are running a risk of becoming honest-to-goodness ghosts," McFadden said. "Dark objects blend with the dark background and cannot be seen by passing motorists."

He appealed to parents to see that their children's halloween costumes are made of light colored material or are trimmed with light colored or reflectorized strips. Since such costumes are usually more dramatic than dark ones, he said youngsters will probably find them more attractive.

McFadden also warned against the dangerous practice of wearing masks.

"A mask cuts down the wearer's vision and a child wearing one will have difficulty seeing approaching cars," he said. "If youngsters insist on hiding their faces, they can do it with makeup—which is more exciting, anyway."

McFadden believes that the best Halloween traffic accident prevention is to keep children off the street at night. He admits this is no easy matter, but says some communities have accomplished it by organizing indoor parties at school halls or community centers. If this can't be arranged, he suggests that individual parents give parties for the youngsters in their homes.

McFadden also called upon motorists to do their share to make this a safe Halloween. He urged them to drive slowly and carefully, keeping a constant lookout for youngsters—especially near schools, parks, and in residential districts.

"Don't make a fatal Halloween mistake that will haunt you for the rest of your life," McFadden warned. "Be your little brother's keeper!"



FEEDER LAMBS 50 CENTS HIGHER; KILLERS STEADY

Stocker and feeder lambs reflected stronger demand resulting from the recent rains and some sales to go into North and East Texas were at prices strong to 50 cents above last week's close. Northern orders were still limited to mostly fleshy to fat feeders with quality and some weight, but these also got away better.

Slaughter types of lambs and older sheep were generally steady. Good and choice fat lambs sold from \$18 to \$20, and cull to medium sorts sold from \$10 to \$17. Stocker and feeder lambs sold from \$.10 to \$16.50, with replacement lambs selling above \$15.50 usually carrying good shearing pelts and some good flesh.

Slaughter ewes were quoted from \$3.50 to \$5.50, most sales \$4 to \$5. Old wethers drew \$8 to \$12. Yearling muttons sold from \$10 to \$15.

stand what you sign, why you are signing it, and what the consequences may be. It is rarely possible for a person who has signed a document to avoid its legal effects.

You can decrease your legal risks by always taking these precautions before you sign anything: Know what you are signing and what the document contains. Understand clearly what it means. Don't be confused by its title—a "statement" may be a release of all your claims, or a "contract" may be a negotiable promissory note. "Co-signing" a note may result in your having to pay it.

Read EVERYTHING in any document. Clauses in fine print may be important. Remember, too, that oral promises not included in writing may be unenforceable. Take nothing for granted.

Check and verify the document. Be sure the dates, prices, names and conditions filled in are correct. You are bound by what it says, not by what you thought it said.

Ask Questions. Inquire about conditions and items of importance to you. Don't sign unless you understand what it means. Language clearly stating what you want can be inserted. If substantial sums are involved, consult with your attorney.

Retain a copy. Be sure the proper persons sign. Request and retain a copy. Record it, if necessary, with the proper public official.

Like your fingerprint, your signature is unique. No one else has one exactly like it. Only you can sign it, and affixing it may set into motion events of great legal consequence. Treat it with the importance it deserves, and do not bestow it carelessly. If in doubt, seek information and advice.

A total of 3,850 cattle and calves sold in the special Hereford stocker and feeder show and sale at Fort Worth October 19. The event was the final such affair of the year at the stockyards, and had attracted an entry of about 4,200.

The average per head, straight across, was \$77.64. Gross money paid to cattlemen was \$298,919.33. Entry was lowered by the recent rains in much of the territory but this factor also served to strengthen the outlets, and a big portion of the supply went back to ranges and feeder lots in the Southwest. The largest single consignment was 1,403 calves and yearlings from the A. C. Ward Cattle Company, Seminole, Texas. The string sold with steer calves at \$21, heifer calves at \$18, steer yearlings at \$18 and heifer yearlings at \$14, straight without any sort whatever. They went into Southern Oklahoma to pasture.

Most of the good and choice steer calves ranged from \$16.50 to \$21, with extreme top \$24 paid for the grand champion pen of ten head shown by J. A. Matthews Ranch Company of Albany. Grand champion pen of heifers sold for \$18.50 and came from H. Parrish of Hamilton County.

COWS OPEN 25 TO 50 CENTS HIGHER AT FORT WORTH

Supplies of cattle and calves were reduced at Fort Worth following rains the previous week in much of the territory. The trade was very active on cows and prices were 25 to 50 cents higher. Other classes of cattle and calves reflected mixed prices and little change from the previous weeks closing prices.

Comparative prices included: Good and choice fed steers and yearlings \$16.50-24.00; fed heifers \$23.50 down; common and medium steers and yearlings \$10.00-16.00. Fat cows \$9.00-12.00; canners and cutters \$5.50-9.00; bulls \$8.00-11.50, odd head \$12.00. Good and choice slaughter calves most \$14.50-17.50; fancy heavies to \$18.50 and above. Common and medium butcher calves \$10.00-14.00; culls \$3.00-10.00; stocker calves of medium to good grades \$13.00-18.50, choice scarce; steer yearlings \$17.50 down; stocker heifers \$2.00-3.00 under similar steers.

HOGS OPEN WITH TOP OF \$16.50 TO \$16.75

Choice butcher hogs scored strong to 25 cents higher prices at Fort Worth Monday as they topped at \$16.50 to \$16.75. The less desirable eights and grades scored \$13.00 to \$16.00. Sows were unchanged at \$13 to \$15.
