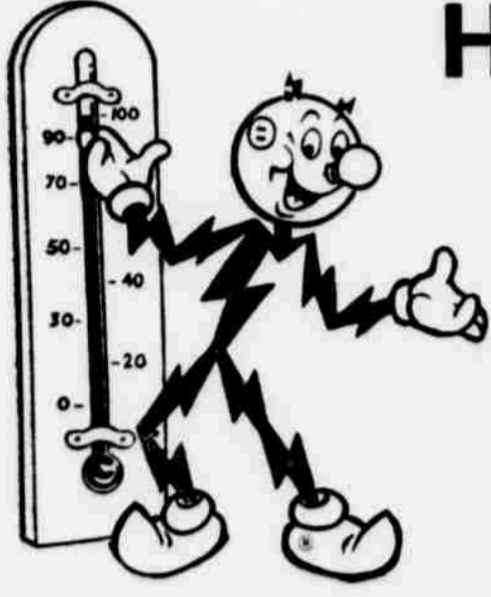

 Release of lady beetles is not recommended for bollworm control or any other injurious pest of field crops.

 Oil operators in Knox, Haskell and Stonewall Counties that were included in the recent water pollution hearing in Abilene have been warned that they must comply quickly with the Railroad Commission's directive that all salt water evaporation pits be eliminated.
 In a memorandum to all the operators, Commissioner Olin Culbertson said that an inspection will be made Sept. 1 to see that all the pits have been eliminated. He said that penalties will be imposed for failure to carry out the order of the commission and the "laws with reference to the prevention of the pollution of fresh waters."

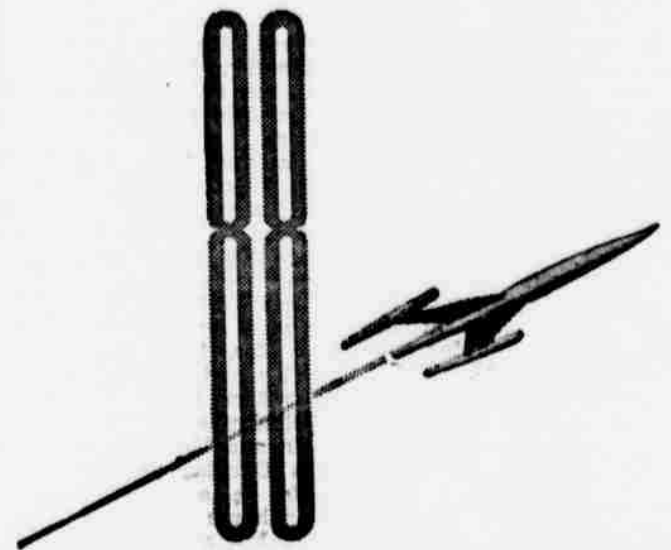
During the past several days the county agent has received several inquiries about the use of lady beetles (lady bugs) for controlling insects in cotton. The following information is from F. M. Fuller, Jr., Extension Entomologist for the Texas A&M College System.
 Certainly, we cannot overlook the value of lady beetles, other predators and parasites that feed on destructive insects. However, we should not place too much emphasis on their importance in a controlling program.
 Lady beetles are general feeders on aphids, spider mites, and may also destroy a small percentage of the eggs and very small larvae of the bollworm. The primary food supply of lady beetles is aphids, therefore when aphids are present, the beetles are not likely to feed on other insects. Before any beneficial insects increase in cotton or any other crop, there first must be an adequate food supply available. Perhaps one of the most important factors that influence the lack of abundance of beneficial insects is weather. Weather conditions may favor the increase in harmful insects but may suppress or completely stop build-ups of beneficial insects. When adequate food supplies and favorable weather conditions exist, predators and parasites will increase rapidly. Rapid increase of harmful insects will often severely damage the crop before the beneficial insects can build up or be added in sufficient numbers to control the injurious insects.
 Research data and observations by trained entomologists shows that lady beetles disperse rapidly when released in a field, and after a very few days the beetles may not be any more numerous in the fields where released than in other surrounding fields.
 Other predators such as flower bugs, lace-winged flies, spiders and wasps are much more effective in suppressing many injurious insects, especially bollworms, than are lady bugs.
 Beneficial insects are helpful in preventing increases of some pests, but remember, the lady beetle is primarily an aphid feeder and one of the least effective for bollworm control. No substitute has been found for making frequent and regular checks for destructive insect infestations and using recommended insecticides when the damaging pests build-up faster than beneficial insects to control destructive pests of cotton.

Old-Age Aid To Be Increased In September

Increased old-age payments will begin in September under a ruling which has been announced by Attorney General John Ben Shepperd.

The recent Legislature provided an additional 7 million dollars for the state's welfare program, as authorized by a constitutional amendment adopted at the polls last fall.

The money was intended for use beginning in September but because the bill was passed by voice vote it ran into a constitutional snag. Such bills cannot go into effect until 90 days after the session ends, which would be September 6.

That raised the question as to whether the increase could go in effect prior to Oct. 1, since the state aid payments are on a monthly basis.

State Welfare Director John H. Winters asked Shepperd to decide.

The attorney general ruled the increased allocations for September could be made effective as of Sept. 6.

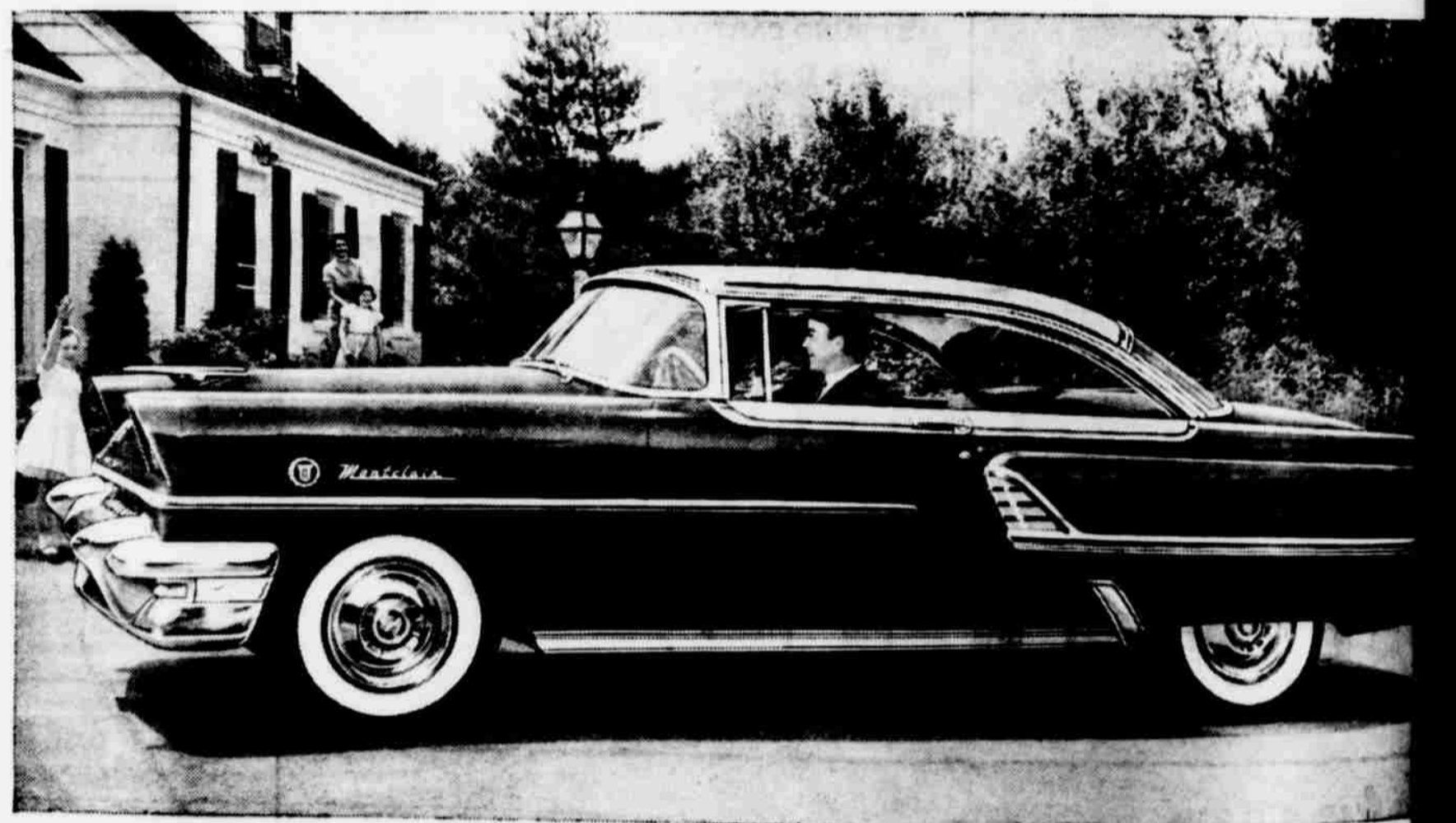
