early Monday, were followed by a heavy downpour Wednesday night to bring more than three and one-half inches of additional moisture to Haskell County crop and pasture lands, and for the first time in more than five years sent total rainfall far above normal for the year to date.

According to records kept by observer, total rainfall to date this year is 11.80 inches. Normal for January through May is 8.99

May rainfall stands at 8.46 inches to date, more than two and one-half times the average 3.34 inches of rain for May over

50-year period. Sunday night and Monday's rain was measured at 2.09 inches on the Government gauge in the northwest part of town. At the City Hall, precipitation was 2.40 inches. Hardest rain came between 2 and 3 a. m. Monday, and the downpour flooded streets and intersections in several parts of

Wednesday night's rain was a companied by high winds which damaged grain in some sections where the crop had matured and was ready to harvest. Precipitation was measured at 1.55 inches during the night.

Farmers in the Sagerton area had reported considerable damage to wheat in that section from the hard rains the first of the week, and further loss was expected from last night's rain and windstorm.

Farmers generally welcomed the rains as added proof that the prolonged drouth had definitely been ended, although the downpours will further delay cotton planting which was just getting
