### THE ALLIANCE'S CHOICE.

#### AS THE LESSER OF TWO EVILS THEY WOULD TAKE HOGG

The Governor's Message Will Catch Some of the Alliance Men—Culbertson Preferred for the Senate.

J. S. Brownson, editor of the Advance, the third party and Alliance organ of this city, was interviewed yesterday by a Gazette reporter relative to the position the Alliance would take with reference to the state campaign and also to ascertain their preferences. If any, between the various candidates for governor, senator, etc., and the following is the result:

"Who is the preference of the Alliance for governor, Hogg or Clark?"  
We have no choice. It would be like choosing between the two, rotten eggs, but if forced to choose between the two, would choose Hogg as being the least of two evils. Clark is thought to stand in with the corporations too much to suit us, and the stand he took in the past rail,

road strike several years ago has alienated from him the labor vote. Evan Jones is the Alliance choice, and would certainly make a good race."

"How do you regard the message of Governor Hogg to the legislature?"  
"It was an able document, and tells too much truth to be acceptable to the great mass of the Democrats. It is just what the Alliance has been telling and reiterating for years. It will probably draw a small percentage of the Alliance vote, but not enough to count. The mess brands Governor Hogg as a calamity howler of the most approved pattern."

"How about the senatorial race? Has the alliance, so far as you know, any choice?"  
"Well, between Chilton, Culbertson and Mills, my choice personally would be Culbertson. I could not speak for the Alliance, but think they favor him in preference to either Mills or Chilton; but we don't expect to be put in that kind of a corner. Mills has killed himself with the Alliance on account of his

GEO. CLARK attacks Gov. Hogg for suppressing gambling hells and the open saloons on Sunday in San Antonio. To those christian gentlemen who support Clark in his position, we will cite the laws of this state and the example of our Savior recorded in sacred writing. Read these authorities and see if Hogg was not justified.

Gov. HOGG has dropped Horace. He may sink "to the bottom of the sea." The firm of "Me and Horace" is dissolved. Horace is done up and "Me" has to look out for "Me."—Abilene Reporter.

The Reporter should have said that Gov. Hogg has been vindicated and the facts have given the lie to the statement that he has made a personal effort to elect Chilton, and that one by one the predictions and charges made by the opposition are being proven false.

ONE of Haskell's leading stock men who attended the convention at Fort Worth in conversation with the Free Press stated that when Geo. Clark was at Fort Worth the stockmen and every body else felt good and joined Clark's procession for the fun of the thing and whooped and yelled whether they were for Clark or Hogg, and that though Clark and his friends took it for a compliment to him it didn't spell anything. He has been verified in his statement by the failure in the attempt to organize a Clark club at Fort Worth the other night.

And we humbly submit that if Clark's friends could not organize a club in Fort Worth on the heels of his great ovation he had better "throw up the sponge." Though governor-maker he be, he has selected too shoddy material. This time the people are going to make the governor.

CLARK is against Hogg because he prosecuted a cold blooded murder. He is against him for closing the saloons and gambling houses of San Antonio on the Sabbath day. He opposes him because he has tried to suppress mob violence and insure the right guaranteed by the Constitution to the citizen that he shall not be deprived of life, liberty or property without due cause of law.

Clark says down such a man, turn loose the murderer, turn loose the gambling hells, turn loose the saloons to desecrate the Sabbath day, turn loose the mad mob, let the mob administer the law, withdraw that paternalism that protect the citizens from the bloody hand of the murderer and let the victim look out for himself, turn loose the corporate commorant to prey upon the helpless poor. May God save the people from such a man!

The time has come in the history of Texas that men should lay aside every prejudice and carefully, and coolly consider the platform laid down by this man!

A warwick in politics he proudly poses as the man who had defeated the will of the people and named the governor of a great state, and as the self acknowledged agent of "all the railroads" in the state except two, he has started out on his missions to defeat by covert attack the policies inaugurated by the people two years ago and so faithfully carried out by the peoples governor and legislature. He has met with Hogg, he knows his strength of nerve and judgement and he knows that to succeed he must have Hogg out of the way, as a lobbyist he tells you he could not get his schemes through the legislature as long as Hogg has the veto in his power. He has tried that.

What next, Hogg has a record, he has been fearless in making it. He has done some things the people do not understand. Then the idea comes to Clark, start a mid-winter campaign, misconstruing every official act and utterance of Hogg. The people are easily gulled and the majority of them can be gotten to join Clark Clubs, and though Hogg may fully explain his conduct after the legislature adjourns, yet those who have joined the clubs will not have the courage to come out and support Hogg. Under the managers of his trained leaders in the little towns they can be coajoled and bulldozed into delivering the goods at the primaries.

We would say to the citizens of Haskell, keep out of Clark clubs until you have thoroughly considered the consequences of electing such a man. Look for the motives behind the premature campaign.

address the convention, to which he responded in advisory remarks urging among Democrats unity and harmony.

The committee on credentials reported, and asked that the delegates be seated in eighteen precincts, giving the number of votes each precinct was entitled to.

J. M. Richards was unanimously elected chairman, and delegates selected to go to the state convention to select delegates to the national convention.

Following is the vote on choice for governor and senator to-day: Mills, 85; Chilton, 25; Culbertson, 3. Resolutions were adopted instructing for Mills. The convention also heartily indorsed the Hogg administration, declared he had faithfully kept his pledges and fearlessly executed them, and favored the establishment of a court of appeals—first at Weatherford, second at Fort Worth, and requested its representatives to so labor.

## THE CLARK CLUB

At Fort Worth—A General Row.

In answer to a call to organize a Clark club, eighteen men met at the city hall last night.

F. W. Childs called the meeting to order and it was found that all city wards were represented by an average of two each, except the Ninth. Early said he guessed he could represent that ward.

Then the question came up, should a Clark club be organized. The small attendance was a damper to enthusiasm, and there was opposition to organization of a strictly Clark club. Early and Bailey contended against organization on the ground that the campaign was in its incipency, and other developments were looked for as it progressed. Early suggested that Fort Worth might have a first choice as against both Clark and Hogg in Dick Wynne.

J. B. Roberts demanded that a Clark club be organized at once.

Early put his hands on Roberts' shoulder and said: "Here's a man who is getting \$22.50 a week for organizing Clark clubs, and he is too much interested to be a safe adviser."

"You're an—inposter!" shouted Roberts. And then the cats broke loose and the fur began to fly. Every man was on his feet, and some of them were on some other man's feet, shouting and gesticulating, until finally they tired and became quiet.

But the no-club men carried the day—or rather the night—and the meeting broke up without doing anything, except resolving to meet again and do the same thing.

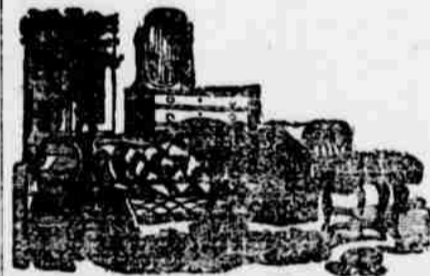
