It has been discovered that wool previously saturated with a ten per cent solution of giveerine can bear a pro-longed heat of some 275 degrees with-

Experiments on the Farm. Whatever experiments are to be tried the farm two coming season, should a gentleman patient shop carefully considered bufore the busy that she's str. calling. son opens; then the farmer will have sufficient time to mature plans neces-sary to make the experiment one of value. To try an agricultural experiment in a manner to make it of any practicle value, requires careful thoughs to establish the plan upon which it is to be tried; it also requires constant watchfulness during the growing season, and a correct measurement at the barrest.

Most of experiments, to be of any value, must be so triel as to secure a comparison with methods we are familiar with, and the value of which we the noteworthy features of the coming have ascertained; if we fail to do thus he variations of seasons and soils are such that the experiment will prove to be valueless.

In field experiments the land should be divided into two parts, so that one shall be treated in a manner that w are familiar with; then we shall be able to compare the experiment with something that we have some knowledge of: thus conclusions can be drawn that may be of some practical value. If we have nothing to compare the experi ment with except our judgment as to what it ought to be, we can derive 'out very little information of any v alue,

There are so many things to come in to change the result of a 4 agricultural experiment that few persons are careful enough to try r a experiment in a manner to secure correct results. While it is import ant that farmers should be continually trying experiments, it is eque aly important that they should confir e themselves to making only such as they fully understand, and are willing to expend sufficient time to try in the most careful manner. The more difficult experiments could be left to the experiment stations; but every farmer could try sufficient experiments to convince him what is the best method of planting and cultivating his crops, and of fertil is ng the different fields on his farm. These are things that the farmer must learn himself, as no one can tell him. But in trying experiments, one trial is not sufficient to establish antyling positive; it requires several years to prove the advantage of any particular operation. Great mistakes are often made by accepting the result of a single experiment, and mistakes are frequently made by guessing at results. If a person is prejudiced in favor of any particular operation, it is very casy to guess at quantities so as to make the result coincide with the prejudice; it is only by weight and measure that the true results can be known. When the whole field is treated in any particular manner, it is not an experiment of any value, though the same field may have been treated in a different manner the year before, because the seasons are so variable, and the soil may have lost a though the same field may have been portion of some important element of plant food. It is only by planting, side by aide, crops in different ways, that information of any great value can be obtained.—Practical Farmer.






