Attendants at the Dumas hospital said he also had suffered a deflated left lung, but there were no internal injuries.

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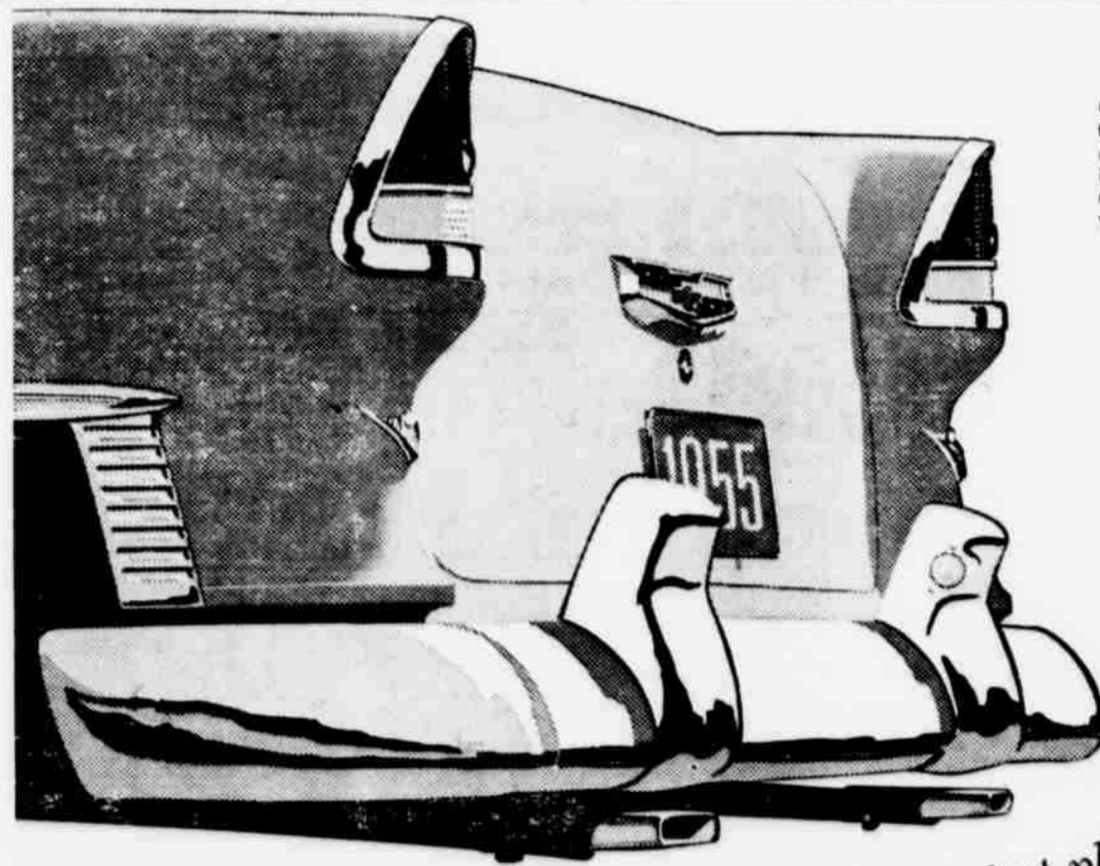

### MONTH'S TRIP FROM KAUFMAN COUNTY... Here 65 Years, Geo. B. Fields Still Considers Haskell 'Best Town of All'

A trip from Kaufman County to Haskell 65 years ago which required almost a month's travel by wagon, hack, and buggy, was well worth the time, according to George B. Fields.

He's been here ever since, and still considers this the "best place in the world" to live.

A lad at the time, he distinctly recalls June 6, 1880, as a "red letter day" in his life—the start of the trip to Haskell by three Fields' families—R. B., W. W., and N. T. Fields Household goods of the families were loaded in five wagons, and the women and children traveled in a hack and a buggy, he recalled.

The trip was made in a leisurely fashion, with the caravan reaching Haskell on July 1, 1880. The country was just beginning to be settled with newcomers putting land into cultivation in what had been considered strictly "ranching" country. Albany, Throckmorton, Anson, Haskell and Seymour were the only "towns" of any size in this area. Ranchers and early-day settlers from as far west as the Cap Rock came to Haskell for their supplies, Fields remembers.

Boy-like, Fields' initial impression of Haskell as a friendly place was formed the first day he was here. "We had no more than drove into town until people began telling us about a big picnic being planned for the 4th of July," he relates. "Naturally, I considered that about the nicest sort of a way to welcome newcomers," he said.

The picnic was held south of Haskell on the banks of Mule Creek, where there was plenty of shade and water. The picnic had been talked for several weeks, and people came from miles around, with many driving in the evening before in order to be on hand for the all-day affair.

The annual picnic on the 4th of July, and an occasional reunion were big events in those days, Fields recalls.

After attending Haskell schools five years, young Fields went to work in a grocery store operated by his father, R. B. Fields, and the elder Fields' brother, W. W. Fields.

Later, he worked for a time in a hardware store, then decided the barber business was to be his profession. In two years in the business, he became a "pretty fair" barber. However, he disliked inside work and gave up barbering to become a freighter. "Being out in the open was more to my liking," he declares. With Abilene, Albany and Seymour the nearest railroad points, he operated freight wagons between Haskell and Abilene, and between this place and Seymour. He continued in that business until the Wichita Valley Railway built into Haskell.

After coming of the railroad, Fields operated a drayage business here until March, 1950, when he disposed of his business and retired.

Mr. Fields has been a member and active in the work of the First Christian Church since boyhood, and has been an elder in the church for more than 15

years.

He helped organize the Haskell Volunteer Fire Department, and served as Chief of the department for several years until his retirement a few years ago. He is also a former City Alderman.

Now, aside from his work with his church, which has always been his foremost interest, Mr. Fields devotes part of his time to his favorite hobby of fishing, and in the meantime looks after his property interests which in recent years have increased to include five producing oil wells on his farm west of Haskell.

And despite the fact that he can rightly be classed as an "oil man," the pioneer citizen is still the same "Mr. George" to his friends, and that includes just about everyone in Haskell who's been here long enough to get acquainted with the genial pioneer.

### Jerry Don Mills Joins Navy; Goes To Great Lakes

Jerry Don Mills of Haskell enlisted in the U. S. Navy June 24, through the Abilene Navy recruiting station. He signed up under terms of a minority enlistment, which means he will be discharged one day before he is 21 years of age.

Jerry Don was sent to the Navy Training Center, Great Lakes, Ill. for nine weeks of boot training. At the end of that period he will be granted two weeks home liberty, pending assignment for specialized training or to a permanent station.

The Navy enlistee is the son of Mr. and Mrs. James W. Mills of this city.

### Highway Patrol To Recruit 100 Men For Training

Captain G. L. Morahan, who commands the Abilene District of the Texas Highway Patrol, told The Free Press today that he is interested in contacting young men in this area who desire a career in traffic law enforcement.

According to Capt. Morahan, the Patrol Division of the Texas Department of Public Safety plans to train 100 men in the year beginning September 1, 1955. The examination, which will be statewide, is tentatively set for early in August with the training school to begin in October. In the meantime, applicants have until midnight of July 21 to file for the positions.

Capt. Morahan said that you are eligible for one of the positions if you can meet the following conditions: You must be male, between the age of 21 and 35 years, inclusive; not less than 5 feet 8 inches in height; and weighing not less than 2 pounds or more than 3 1-2 pounds per inch of height.

You must have a high school education, and must be a citizen of the United States and a resident of Texas for at least a year immediately prior to application. Finally, you must satisfactorily pass an exhaustive character and mental examination.
