Gubernatorial candidate Hutchison to hold her Senate seat through Republican primary

AUSTIN-U.S. Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison announced her intention to stay in the race to be the Republican Party of Texas' nominee for governor while continuing to serve in the Senate.

In her Nov. 14 address in Houston to the Texas Federation of Republican Women, Hutchison said she would not give up her Senate seat as long as a national health care bill and cap-and-trade energy legislation are on the

"I realize this will keep me in the Senate past the primary election," she said.

Recent polls show incumbent Gov. Rick Perry leads Hutchison by about 12 points.

Senators question commission head

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
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
